The pamphlet ar. gues that some authority now vested in the Congress should be transferred to the President in order that the United States might act more swiftly to meet sudden challenges at home and abroad. I'm strongly opposed to any such change — to any move to reduce the power of the Congress, the people's most direct voice in their government.




