Defense Appropriations

After 2 days of debate, which one would characterize as a record, the House recently passed the major defense appropriation measure for the next fiscal year — a bill calling for expenditures totaling \$47 billion. The sum represents more than half of all money to be spent by the government in the year which began July 1. After cuts were made in Appropriations Committee sessions and on the floor during debate, the appropriated amount was \$1.9 billion less than the President had requested in his budget message and \$1.25 billion under the actual similar expenditures for the fiscal year just ended.

The vote on passage in the House was 410 to 1. That the debate was so routinely conducted and the final vote overwhelmingly bears out what every American knows anyway: That there is simply no way around the Nation's vital need to maintain its military forces at unequalled strength. There is no alternative if we are to preserve our sovereignty.

As my colleague from the South Plains, George Mahon, said as the debate opened: "All the bills which Congress passes are important to somebody. The bill before us today is important to everybody—to everybody in the United States, and to all the peace-loving people of the entire world. This is true, because this is the legislation which, more than any other, enables the United States to maintain its position of military superiority over the Soviet Union."

Congressman Mahon said: "Our military strength will not necessarily insure peace, but insofar as military strength can avert and deter war, this Government has what it takes."

During the debate, one Congressman presented the 1962 Department of Defense payroll, military and civilian, and Department of Defense total expenditures for each state. The figures spell out just what military spending means to the Texas economy.

In Texas, the military payroll totaled \$778,798,000 and the payroll of civilian workers for the Defense Department was \$361,742,000—for a combined total of \$1,006,253,000. Total Defense Department expenditures in Texas were \$2,146,793,000. Only one other state exceeded the Texas totals. California, with its heavy concentration of aircraft manufacturers, had a combined Defense Department payroll of \$1,709,585,000, and that figure coupled with the enormous sums spent in California for procurement sent the total of Defense Department expenditures in that state to a staggering \$7,702,829,000.

Military installations were placed in these states and military procurement contracts assigned to manufacturers there for good reasons. No one would argue that the economics of Texas and California do not benefit greatly from this situation, spent by the federal government in these two states—for defense purposes only—as is taken out in total taxes. The taxes paid into the federal treasury from Texas, for example, totaled in 1962 \$3,329,247.00 on defense payrolls and contracts.

Elmer Berryhill To Attend Austin Meet Next Month

Austin, Texas—Elmer Berryhill, Vocational Ag Teacher in the Quitaque High School, will participate in the State-wide In-Service Education Workshop for Teachers of Vocational Agricultural August 6-9, 1963, according to George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture. The four-day meeting will be held in Dallas as a part of the program in Vocational Agriculture to further improve the professional competency of the state's teachers.

Vocational Education Teachers in the areas of Homemaking, Trade and Industrial and Distributive Education will also be participating in in-service education workshops and the 3700 vocational educators will have a combined general session on Tuesday, August 6th. The principal address of the combined group will be delivered by Dr. Walter M. Arnold, Assistant Commissioner for Vocational Education, U. S. Office of Education in Washington. The general conference will be under the direction of M. A. Browning, Assistant Commissioner for Vocational Educational Agency, Austin.

Vocational Agriculture teachers will hear an address by R. B. Hulslen, vice-president, Moorman Mfg. Co., and he has taken for his topic, "Success." The Tri-State FFA Public Speaking Contest will give Texas teachers an opportunity to observe the best in FFA Public Speaking.

The State Vocational Agriculture Education Staff will direct workshops, and the workshops this year will be staffed by Vocational Agriculture teachers who are especially well qualified in their respective areas. The full day of workshops is an important phase of the training session.

According to Ralph S. Moser, President of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers of Texas, the organization will conduct several meetings at times not in conflict with the workshop program. The Honorable Charles F. Herring, State Senator of Austin, will address the membership meeting. Officers and Board members will be selected and a program of work for 1963-64 will be adopted by the organization.

The Texas Vocational Association will conduct a meeting of all Vocational Education Teachers, according to C. Earle Wolfe, president of Houston. Dr. M. D. Mobley, Executive Secretary of the American Vocational Association of Washington, will address the group.

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Midge Threatens Grain Sorghum In Texas

Delbert Langford, Associate Agronomist of the High Plains Research Foundation, located on the High Plains of Texas, announced that Midge is now infesting grain sorghum throughout the area. Langford has alerted farmers to take measures to protect their crops. This insect can completely eliminate a grain sorghum crop.

Midge infestations have invaded the High Plains Research Foundation. July 9 is the first this insect has put in an appearance here this year. The adult Midge itself will not do any

damage, but will lay eggs in the bloom of the grain sorghum head. As the larva grows, it eats the grain; thus leaving only an empty hull.

Control of Midge can best be brought about by spraying with insecticides prior to and during the blooming stage. The first application should be made about two days after the head emerges from the boot. Some of the chemicals recommended for spraying are Endrin, Sevin, and Toxaphene. Farmers should contact local dealers for application rates and methods.

In years past with plantings of May 15, and earlier, there has been no damage to grain sorghum by Midge due to an early blooming date, and harvesting the crop into a hard grain stage by the time Midge arrived. Some farmers have planted early this year in the attempt to get the grain sorghum past the Midge. The present infestation is about one month earlier than in 1962.

Langford says the infestation will keep building up and gaining momentum until the last grain has bloomed.

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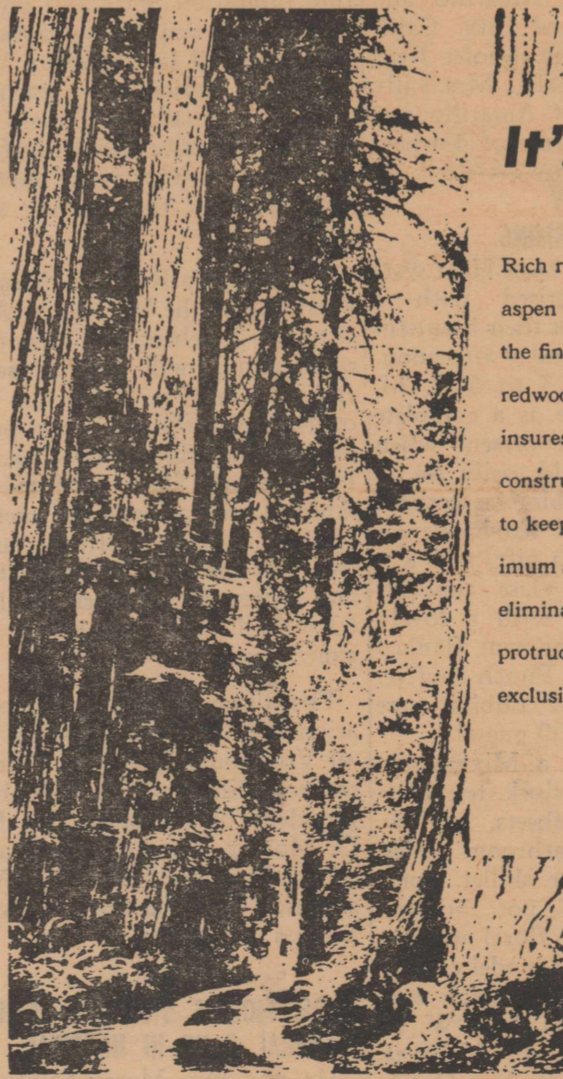
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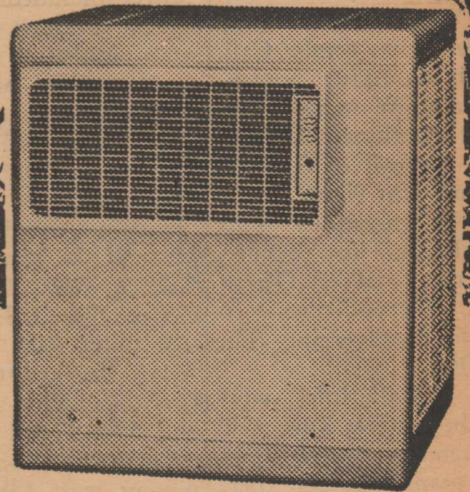

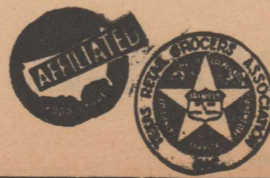
