

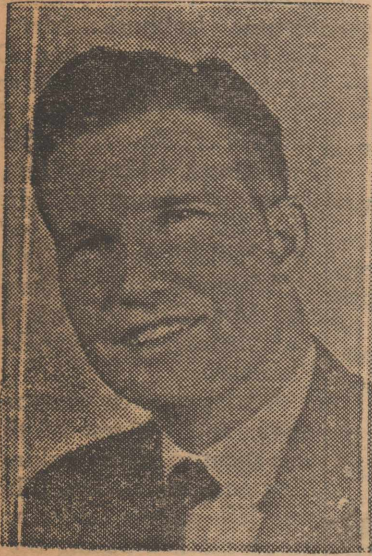

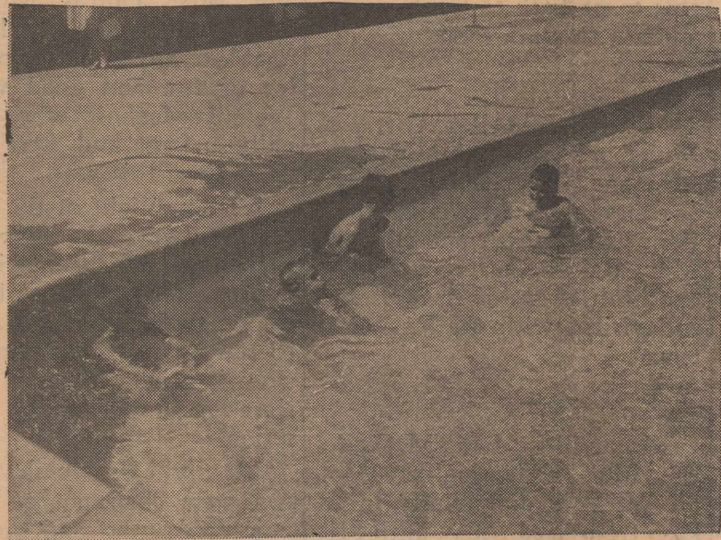
Summer Recreation Program Ends

A complete report will be run in a later issue of the Tribune, along with a list of those who had an active part in the running of the program.

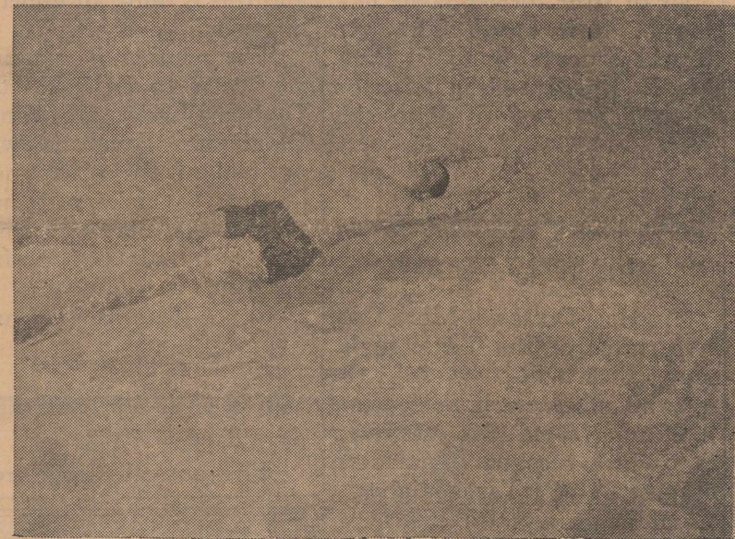
Pictured below are some of the youngsters who learned to swim this summer during the Summer Recreation Program.

FEED GRAIN PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

College Station, August 8 — Major provisions of the 1964 Feed Grain Program have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and basically will be the same as in 1963.

The major change is an increase in the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage with an increase in the rate payment for maximum diversion. This, the USDA said, is intended to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acres and to increase their income.

Under the 1964 program a producer may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage compared with a top of 40 percent in 1963. Those who divert from 40 to 50 percent will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base.

Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for payments computed by multiplying the number acres diverted times 20 percent of the normal yield times the county total price sup-

port rate for the grain diverted. For acres diverted between 20 and 40 percent of the base, payments will be based on 50 percent of the normal yield times the total county support rate. A diversion from the base between 40 and 50 percent (or 25 acres if this is larger) will earn payments for the producer of 50 percent times the normal yield times the total acres times the total county support rate. Payments may not exceed 20 percent of the value of the land diverted.

The total national average price support levels in 1964 will be the same as in 1963, but a slightly larger proportion of the support will be made available through loans. Payments-in-kind for both diversion and the non-loan part of price support will again be made in the form of negotiable certificates. The signup period for both fall and spring sown crops is expected to be early in 1964.

SPEED LIMITS TO BE RAISED ON MANY TEXAS HIGHWAYS

Austin, Texas — More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective on August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70 - miles - per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies which were conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70-mph maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

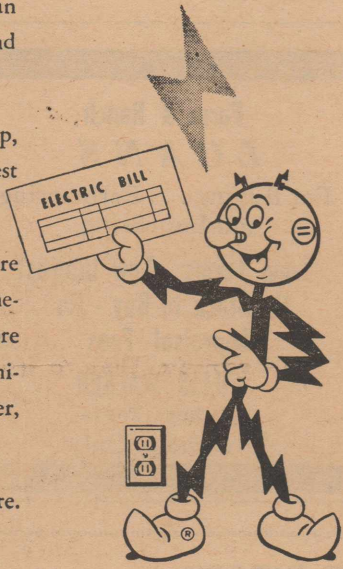

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
