BEHIND THE CIVIL RIGHTS SCENE

The civil rights wrangle in the House and Senate has degenerat_ ed into a sectional spitball fight Yankees against Yankees. Too many of the Nation's elected representatives - from both parties — are yapping at each other about who is going to get the credit or blame for what is done or isn't done. You don't hear much talk in the Capitol cloakrooms about the merits of proposed civil rights legislation; the issue has succumbed to a heady brand of politics in which Northern Republicans and Democrats are pointing their fingers at each other and engaging in fishwifely argument.

Civil rights advocates in the Democratic Party are trying to: corral Republican votes for the coming showdown. The Democrats are having trouble because the Republicans can't simply go along with the opposition party proposals — they want to be able to claim some pride of au-thorship. "After all," they argue, "we're the party of Lincoln — and we ought to have some bigger role in this thing. Democrats behind the legislation want the whole hog if they can grab it — but the hog is well greased in the kind of politics that defies analysis on party



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


JEAN MATHIS TO ATTEND McMURRY


