Hemisphere, but progress is Hemisphere, but progress is be
ing made to bring about th economic and political isolatio of the Castro regime, to mak Cuba an increasingly expensiv burden for the Sino - Sovie bloc to maintain, and to pre
vent the spread or Castro-direct ed subversion in Latin America Guerrillas within Cuba a becoming more active.. Hit-andrun actions by small bands of Cuban patriots will not in themselves bring down the Castro regime. But they keep it off
balance. They keep the Red mibalance. They keep the Red mi-
litia under arms and out of more productive endeavors that could bolster the faltering Cuban ec onomy. They provide a nucleus around which a more active re sistance movemest may someda form. These anti-Castro activ

I am in favor of every action we can take, alone and in concert with our allies, to restore continuing to Cuba. I believe that ontinuing pressure on the eco-
nomic and political front can one day bring this result without the need for overt military action.
Here are the facts pointing up the economic problems aflicting the Castro regime: Cu ban trade to the Free World has
slowed to a trickle. Free worll exports to Cuba in 1959, Casro's first year in power, totaled $\$ 680$ million; in 1962 they were $\$ 85$ million and are depurchases from Cuba, primarily sugar, have similarly declined Cuba's trade with the Communist bloc (Cuba now does more than four-fifths of her trade with the Communist world) Winl total about $\$ 1$ billion,
$\$ 600$ million in bloc exports to Cuba and about $\$ 400$ million Cuba and about $\$ 400$ million
in Cuban shipments to the bloc This trade gap must be financed by the Soviets, and it's expectec to be equally large next year The Cuban gross national pro
duct last year was estimated duct last year was estimated
be 25 percent below the level. With most basic food stuffs rigidly rationed, the average caloric intake of Cubans is estimated to be 15 to 25 per cent lower than it was in pre
