





Now in 1963, over 80 percent of the wells have a pumping lift of over 125 feet. This has use of the rainfall. increased the cost of an acre-

It takes a good productive soil to grow high yielding crops, and in turn, good soil without water is unproductive. Producers cannot continue to irrigate loping lands down the slope. Not only are they wasting water, but they are removing topsoil by erosion. It has taken nature hundreds of years to build this topsoil that can be removed by man in a few short years. Land forming can be practiced by man to improve irrigation according to the stage the soil, or it can be neglected of plant development, which is
