


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A New Year's party game might be "Resolution Charades," an adaptation of the old Chinese Custom of telling fortunes with bamboo sticks.

Sanitation means clean quarters for calving. A clean pasture is fine during good weather, but buildings should be dry, well-ventilated and free of drafts.

Nutrition means a well-nourished cow which will pass along adequate nutrition and diseasefighting antibodies to her calf.

Immunization means having a veterinarian administer preventive biologicals to the cow one or two months before calving. This may enable the cow to pass some protection on to her calf through the colostrum. A preventive biological may also be given the calf immediately after birth.

Surprisingly, the cost of this calf scours preventive program is only about one-fifth of the price of a day-old grade calf. That's a small price to pay to insure against the loss of a year's profit.

IN DAYS OF OLD

Researchers say that early Greeks and Romans were quite particular about New Year toasts-who made them, who poured, and what was said. The right to make a toast at some gathering or ceremony was reserved for an official or other important personage.

2 tablespoons powdered sugar
Few drops almond extract
The malt 1 tables

Drain peaches. In each of two 9-inch layer pans, melt 1 tablespoon butter and sprinkle with ½ cup brown sugar. Arrange peaches pinwheel-fashion in each pan. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Prepare cake mix as package directs. Spoon batter over peaches. Bake in 350-degree (moderate) oven 40 to 45 minutes, or until tops of cakes spring back when touched lightly. Cool on racks. Turn out one layer on serving plate peach-side up. Whip cream with powdered sugar and almond extract until stiff. Spread over cake layer on plate; top with remaining layer peach-side up. Chill 1 hour before serving. Makes 12 servings

## **Don't Waste** Resolutions

We don't help ourselves when we make up a list of New Year resolutions we cannot keep. We'd be much better off if we made no resolutions at all.

This is the advice of Dr. George I. Smith, professor of psychology at Rutgers (N.J. Newark College of Arts and Sciences).

Dr. Smith says we should make resolutions aimed at self improvement, rather than promising to do things which would require a sharp change in our habits or ac-

### Four Rules

The State University psychologist offers the following rules for successful self improvement reso-

1. Don't resolve to do anything under the pressure of a calendar date or a friend's nudge to do "something to improve yourself."

2. Do take serious stock of your problems. Try to define the source of the trouble, not merely the symptom. If you are overweight and it is due to boredom or feeling sorry for yourself, solve the problem and weight loss will be easier. If necessary, get professional advice.

3. Once you have located the source of your difficulty, find out how important a change is to you. Is it a project you can really put yourself into? If you are not convinced you really want to overcome a situation as a personal goal, your resolution probably will be worthless. Other people's prodding is a poor substitute for a personal comitment.

4. Finally, keep your goals reasonable. Many mental problems and lost resolutions are results of unreasonable, unattaina-
