The importance of proposals regarded as purely domestic is heightened by the absolute necessity of the United States to maintain its economic stability so as to be able to work in the world from a position of strength.

But foreign affairs policies, programs, and strategies are paramount considerations for a President who, by the Consti tution, is charged to function as the chief architect of American foreign policy. With the other Presidents who have held that lonely post in the years since World War II, President Lyndon Johnson is well aware that a serious mistake in foreign policy could mean the incineration of the Northern Hemisphere. Despite a phalanx of advisors and staff assistants and experts of every kind, the final decisions in the foreign policy area remain the President's to make. It is hard, hard, hardand very lonely work.

I would urge all Americans regardess of political party or political convictions to respect the President and his office and the enormity of his duties; to recognize the Constitutional obligation that is his o formulate a program of legislation and to lead the Nation's foreign policy; to acknowledge the love he shares with us for our country; to acknowledge his boundless desire to see our country prosper in continued safety and full sovereignty; to support those programs we can support, to reject those we can not support—but to support or reject in a spirit of good will and with a willingness to examine the opposing point of view; and, of course, to pray to Divine Providence that our President will continue to have His guidance and be strengthened
