Irrigation Workshop and Agri. - Clinic Set At Memphis Next Tuesday, Feb. 4

Farmers of this vicinity have an invitation to attend an irrigation workshop and agricultural clinic at the American Legion Hall in Memphis, Texas on Tuesday, February 4, from 9:30 A. M. til 4:00 P. M.

J. W. Coppedge manager of the Hall County Elec. Co., one of the sponsors of the program, was in town Tuesday in promotion of the program.

Russell Mount, from the Texas Water Commission in Austin, will speak on Ground Water Sources during the morning session. Also scheduled for the morning session is a talk by R. V. Thurmond, Conservation Eng., Portland Cement Association, also from Austin. His topic will be Well Construction and Pump Design.

At noon will be lunch and inspection of exhibits.

During the afternoon Wayne Keese, Irrigation Specialist with the Texas Extension Service

will discuss Sprinkler System design. Following this will be a talk by Billy Gunter, Area Agronomist with the Extension Service in Lubbock. His subject will be Benefits from Cotton Burs and Other Crop Residues. Midland Bermuda for Livestock Grazing will be subject discussed by Bob Gordon of the Memphis SCS. The next feature on the program will be a Panel of Agricultural Specialists, moderated by John Shanklin, Irrigation Specialist from Albuquerque, N. M.

Just before the meeting is to be adjourned a drawing will be held for door prizes.

This will be a very worthwhile program for all farmers to sit in on, and especially so for farmers who have irrigation wells on their farms.

All interested farmers are urged to drive over to Memphis Tuesday for the program.

PANTHERS ROLL TO RECORD SCORE

The High School basketball team won a doubleheader from Flomot here last Friday night. Then on Tuesday night the Turkey High teams invaded the Panther's den and split a pair with the locals, the Panthers winning and the Pantherettes dropping another important district contest.

The Pantherettes, behind the 26 outburst of freshman Patricia Brunson, downed the Longhornettes 62-35. All three of the starting forwards of the Quitaque team scored in double figures; Janice Dudley made 24 points for runnerup honors. Devorah McKay added an even 10 points and Jill Johnson dropped in a single field goal for 2

points to round out the scoring. Sandra Barham of Flomot won scoring honors for her team with 19 points.

The Panthers took an easy 93-29 win over the Longhorns. Jamie Johnson led the scoring parade for the Panthers, marking up 23 points as the entire squad saw action in the contest. Jim Saul tallied 14 before being sent to the bench along with the other starters.

Tuesday night caught everyone of the Pantherette forwards cold scoring wise—only to find the Turkettes' Margie Mullins hitting from all over the place as she tallied 37 points to lead her team to a 55-41 victory. The two teams were tied for second place in the hot district race, but the Turkey lasses are roosting all alone on the second rung of the ladder.

The Panthers made news in winning over the Turks—not in winning but the score by which they won, 111-54. And this success was gained without really trying. According to the Amarillo Daily News in the Wednesday morning edition, the 111 points scored by the Panthers was the highest total made by a high school team in the past ten years in this part of Texas and might be an all-time record here in the Panther's den. As mentioned earlier the Panthers and Coach King were not trying to set any scoring records—it just sort of happened. Coach King let his starters play the entire first half and 5 minutes deep in the third period before nulling them. The count was 82-39 when the reserves took over. Jack Johnson run up 33 points to lead the starting five in scoring. Jamie Johnson topped the second unit with 10 points.

The Panthers were themselves victims of a 109-69 strapping at the hands of the McAdoo Eagles the third game of the season.

Friday night the locals host the Estelline eagles, and Tuesday night drive to Lakeview for the next-to-last game of the regular season. The district tournament is just two weeks away.

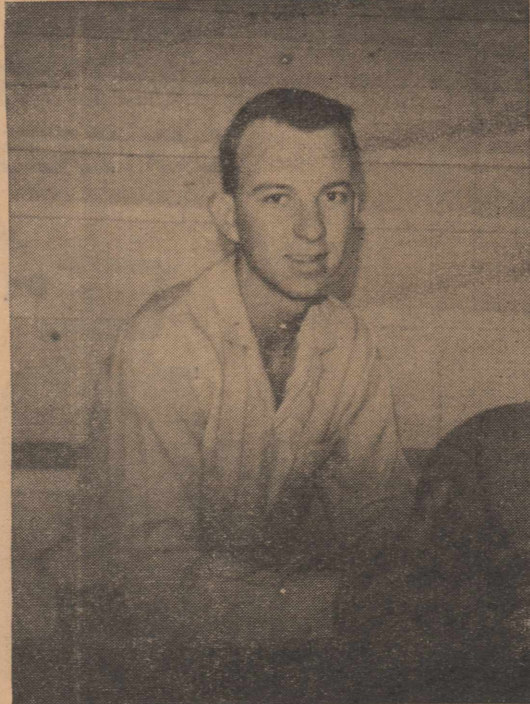

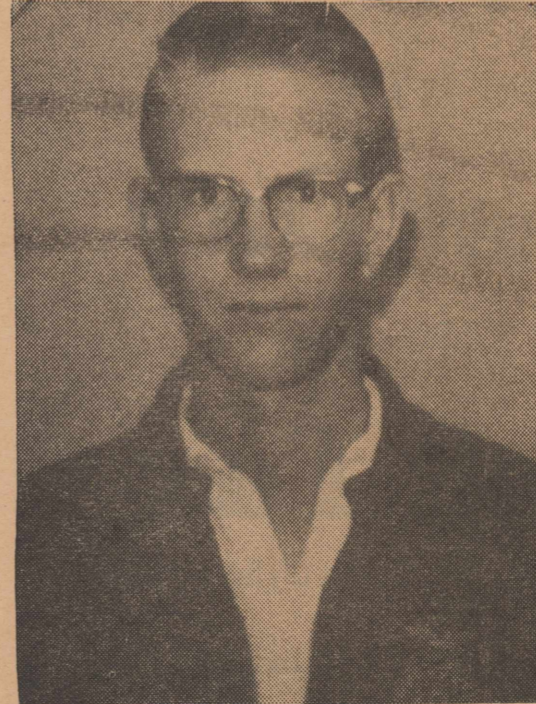

SOIL BANK CONTRACTS EXPIRE ON HALF MILLION ACRES IN TEXAS

College Station — Contracts
 expired in Texas, December 31,
 1963, on a total of 566,571
 Soil Bank acres. Now, points
 out C. H. Bates, farm manage-
 ment specialist for the Texas
 Agricultural Extension Service,
 owners of these acres must de-
 cide what to do with them.

No two owners will have the
 same situation, says Bates, there-
 fore, each must study the alter-
 natives available. Some choices
 are to sell, rent, hire work done,
 leave the acreage in a conserving
 use, or participate in a govern-
 ment diversion program.

If the farm has a feed grain
 base, for example, the owner
 may want to consider partici-
 pating in the 1964 Feed Grain
 Program. For owners with part
 of their farms coming out of the
 Soil Bank, any feed grain base
 included in the Soil Bank land
 will become a part of the farm's
 total base, explains the special-
 ist. Information on the Feed
 Grain Program is available from
 county Agricultural Stabiliza-
 tion and Conservation and Ex-
 tension offices, according to
 Bates.

Individual situations, exist-
 ing cover, possible use of the
 land, yield prospects, and such
 considerations as credit, equip-
 ment and livestock available
 will need careful study, says Mr.
 Bates.

Bates points out that Con-
 servation Reserve contracts, to-
 taling 24,068, were in effect in
 1963 in 230 Texas counties.
 Acreage under these contracts
 totaled 2,680,286 with 566,-
 571 acres released from con-
 tracts on December 31, 1963.

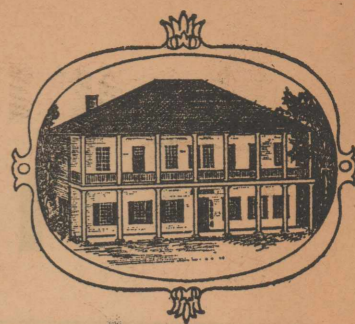

MELVIN COBB CREDITED WITH SAVING LIVES OF FIVE PERSONS IN WICHITA FALLS FIRE

Melvin Cobb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orval Cobb, an x-ray technician and student at Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, was credited with the saving of five lives from a fire in Wichita Falls early Sunday.

The following description of the fire was taken from the Monday edition of the Record News:

"A fire of undetermined origin broke out at 1819 Tenth early Sunday, spread to the two two-story houses on each side and burned all three to a pile of rubble and ashes despite the efforts of nine fire fighting units.

Loss was estimated at \$75,000 but no lives were lost.

Wichita Falls Fire Department officials credited saving the lives of the five persons asleep in the houses to a 22-year-old X-ray technician, Melvin Cobb, who had an apartment in the house where the fire began.

Cobb said he roomed and boarded with Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Fenstermacher, owners of the home at 1819 Tenth, and had arrived at the residence from a date shortly after 3 A. M.

He said, "I saw fire coming from the house and opened a side door but when I tried to go in, the flames and heat pushed me back out. It burned my hair too.

I ran next door to the Lucas' house (the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Lucas) and roused them and they called the fire department.

I ran back outside and as I did I noticed that the fire had jumped to both the Lucas' house and Brownings' (the home of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Browning) house and were on fire. I woke up the Brownings and all of us got outside as quickly as we could.

None of us got out with more than the clothes on our backs. Everything else is gone now.

The Fenstermachers were visiting friends in Lawton, Okla. and were still away Sunday night.

Both neighbors reported they lost valuables and antiques in the fire which could never be replaced but they surely would have lost their lives were it not for Melvin Cobb."
