Panthers In Regional Tourney

Quitaque's Panthers shot their way into the Regional Basketball Tournament at Canyon for the third consecutive year by taking an 87-74 bidistrict win over a stubborn Quail crew before a standing room only crowd Tuesday night in the Wellington gym.

The Panthers will meet Shallowater at 3:30 P. M. Friday in the West Texas State University Field at Canyon in their first round of play in the regional playoff.

Although the Panthers were

able to rise to whatever occasion was needed in Tuesday's game they weren't exactly the sharpest looking team in the world at times.

Both teams were wild at the beginning and couldn't find the handle on the ball. Four minutes of running up and down the court, with a lot of wild passing, rebounds booted, and shots missed, before either team was able to dent the scoreboard and it was the Quails who broke the scoring ice. Once that happened, however, both teams started popping the nets with the score being tied or swapping back and forth for the next few minutes.

Quitaque went ahead 16-15 in the last minute of the first quarter and were never behind again, although the Quails pulled to within a couple of points on two occasions but were never able to tie or go ahead. Quitaque led 20-17 at the end of the first quarter, 45-34 at half

time, 63-53 at the end of three periods and widened the gap to 13 as time ran out.

Several times during the course of the game the Panthers indicated that they were about to blow the game wide open but were never able to do it as the Quails kept battling and hitting their jump shots from 'way out, about the only offense they were able to mount.

Every one of the Panther starting five scored in double figures, with Jim Saul leading the way with 24 points. Jack Johnson hit for 22, Bobo Morrison 16, Butch Brown 13 and Terry Woods 12 points. Scoring honors for the evening, however, went to the Quail's Morris, who scored 30 points with his fantastic jump shot. The young fellow is only 5'9" and he was forcing 6-6 Jack Johnson to jump his best in order to control the tip. Groom has a 6-4 center in last week's playoff game Morris was out-jumping him most of the night.

The Panthers will probably enter the regional tourney fav-

ored to go to the finals and oppose defending state champion McAdoo, who is in the opposite bracket. Both teams are due to get rugged testing and both could get knocked off before reaching the finals.

Quitaque's first round foe, Shallowater, will give the Panthers all they can handle, more than likely. They reportedly play a more deliberate style of basketball, preferring not to run and shoot as do Quitaque and McAdoo. Earlier in the season Shallowater played McAdoo a fairly close game and the Panthers probably will need to play a better game than that turned in against Quail. The Panthers carry very fine 31-3 record into regional play, the same record, incidentally, the Panthers had in 1962 when they won the regional title and went to the state tourney in Austin. Included in this record are wins over McAdoo, Floydada, Phillips, Wellington and Aspermont, all district champions, except the Floydada Whirlwinds, who tied Canyon for the district and lost a close playoff series.

After the Plainview tourney we did not think they could do it but since that time the Panthers have picked up a lot of know-how and are in better condition to go all out on a big floor. The development of some of the younger players might mean the difference, too, and right now Coach King can probably match any team in bench strength. One thing is probable, though. The Panthers cannot win if they have as many mental lapses and make the mistakes they did against Quail Tuesday. We do believe that they will be sharp and ready for this tourney. It is the one that everyone has been pointing to for a year.

Pantherettes Win Third At District

Quitaque's Pantherettes slamed past Turkey 67-44 to win third place in the District basketball tournament which was held at Estelline last Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

The Pantherettes beat the Lakeview Eaglettes 45-40 to advance to the second round of play against Estelline on Friday night. The Quitaque lassies started well against the Estelline crew, built up a ten point lead, then lost their touch and went down 32-43.

Although the Pantherettes had to settle for third place, Saturday night's win over the Turkettes was a very satisfying one for Quitaque had lost both games to Turkey in the round robin part of the schedule, the only team in the district the Pantherettes had been unable to beat at least once. Saturday night's defeat of

Turkey also forced the race into a playoff, since Turkey won the round robin portion of the district race.

Estelline downed Matador in the tournament finals Saturday and they will meet Turkey in Memphis tonight (Thursday) to determine the district champion.

Janice Dudley captured scoring honors for the Panthers in the Lakeview contest with 34 points; Jennifer Whittington, who has been doing a very fine job at guard in these final weeks of the season, was called to help out at her old forward spot and she dropped in 6 points for runner-up honors; Deborah McKay chipped in with 3 points and Patricia Brunson made 2 points. Verden was high for Lakeview with 25 points. In the Estelline game Janice Dudley scored 14 points, Deborah McKay 11 and Patricia Brun-

son 8. In the Turkey game Janice Dudley wound up her high school basketball career by hitting the baskets for 29 points while Deborah McKay was tossing in 20 and Patricia Brunson added 18 to complete the rout of the Turkettes. The Pantherettes seemed to grow stronger as the game progressed. Margie Mullin of Turkey, however won scoring honors in the game with 40 points.

Janice Dudley was selected for a place on the all-tournament team.

The season is over for the Pantherettes. Over the full season the Pantherettes won 15 and lost 18 games, playing a few of the top girls teams in the Panhandle, such as Spearman, Wellington, Floydada, Paducah, Silverton, Hedley and Samnorwood. In district play the Pantherettes won 9 and

lost 4, beating Flomot twice, Lakeview three times, Matador twice, Estelline once and Turkey once. They lost to Estelline twice and Turkey twice. Not a real fine season, but one that furnished a lot of good ball games here in their own district where they were in contention until the next-to-last night of action.

Two seniors played their last games as Pantherettes Saturday night, Jennifer Whittington and Janice Dudley. These two will be hard to replace. Janice Dudley was one of the highest scoring forwards to play for QHS in recent years. Jennifer Whittington, who played forward most of her career, and though she didn't score a lot of points, Jennifer was a steady player, a good rebounder and above all, she hustled every minute of the game. After switching to guard

later in the season, she did a very fine job. She should have been selected on the all-tournament team last week.

The rest of the squad will be back for action again next season and the Pantherettes may be the team to watch. Back to lead the way next year will be this year's starting guards, Donna Bedwell, Brenda Whittington and Charlene Bailey. Brenda saw no action in the last several games due to a leg injury. It is hoped that it will be healed by next year. Starting forwards Deborah McKay and Patricia Brunson return, also, Jill Johnson and Barbara Reagan saw quite a bit of action this season, at both forward and guard; Jerry Beth Grundy, Renee McKay and Ginger Anderson are the other members of the squad who will be back battling for a spot on the starting lineup.
