Muleshoe Citizens Plan To Organize Phone Company

New Baptist Pastor On Field

A large congregation greeted Rev. A. W. Blaine, the new pastor of the First Baptist church of Muleshoe, Sunday when he preached his first sermon after accepting the local work. The church auditorium was filled.

Sunday school also was largely attended. The Men's Bible class especially proud of its attendance. There were 30 men present to hear the teacher, Ray Griffiths, give the day's lesson, and they overflowed their class room and held the class in the main auditorium.

Other classes of the Sunday school were singled out for special mention by Superintendent Hoyt Morgan.

Rev. Blaine expressed his pleasure at taking up the work here. His wife and their children will join him here in the next few days, and they will devote their entire time to the work of the church, and in visiting the sick, welcoming new families to the city, and in general becoming full fledged citizens.

The First Methodist church of Muleshoe omitted its evening services so that members of the congregation might attend the services at the Baptist church and hear the new minister preach.

Rev. Blaine came here from Mineral Wells, where he had been city missionary. He served during the war as a major in the Army Chaplain Corps.

Lt. Witherspoon On USS Barnstable

Lt. Francis J. Witherspoon, Muleshoe, Texas, served during the war on the attack transport USS Barnstable, which saw action from Guadalcanal to Japan, and which is engaged at the present time in serving with the "Magic Carpet" fleet, helping to return high point veterans to the States.

More than 250 aircraft carriers, battleships, cruisers and transports have been assigned to the Magic Carpet fleet, which is picking up prospective draftees from various points in the Pacific.

The Barnstable, while assigned to occupation tasks, made two runs to Japan from Sept. 20 to Nov. 1, the first from Lingayen Gulf, in the Philippines, to Wakayama, Honshu, and the second from Mindanao, Philippines, to Hiro Wan in the Kure area of Honshu.

OPA Director Thanks Workers

E. B. Holloway, Fort Worth, district director of the Office of Price Administration, has written a letter to members of the various ration boards and panels of Bailey County thanking them for their patriotic service in connection with the rationing program. Most of these people have been relieved of their duties, with the exception of those dealing with tires and some food items.

"As you know," the director wrote, the need for rationing of scarce commodities is gradually becoming less acute and has already been possible to cease rationing gasoline, processed foods, shoes, rubber footwear, fats, meats and oils. This leaves us with only tires and sugar to ration. I am not making any prediction as to when the two above mentioned items will be terminated, but you may be sure that just as soon as possible the remainder of the program will be liquidated.

"With this thought in mind I wish to personally thank each and every member who has served on any board, any panel, or any committee of the Office of Price Administration. Mere words cannot truly express the gratitude of this office for your unselfish efforts toward making the various rationing and price programs the success they have been to date.

"Your community also owes you a vote of thanks for the contribution you have made to its economic stability. At the same time, while thanking you for your past services, I also want to ask that you continue or renew your efforts to make possible the victorious fight against our arch enemy, INFLATION."

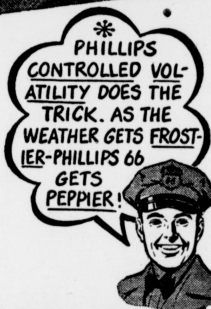

Facts Of Interest To War Veterans

Q. May a veteran who has been a prisoner of war convert the gratuitous insurance he was granted into a permanent policy?

A. This gratuitous insurance was granted to those in active service who were captured on or after Dec. 7, 1941, and prior to April 20, 1942. The law provides that such insurance shall be in force and all premiums waived while such person is a prisoner and for six months thereafter. The veteran may continue his policy at the expiration of this period by making application and timely payment of premiums. Same may be converted at any time later prior to the expiration of the 5-year period.

Q. How soon after discharge must a veteran start to school if he attends under the provisions of the Serviceman's Readjustment Act?

A. The veteran may make application for this provision within two years of his discharge or with-

In two years of the termination of the war.

Q. May a veteran receive hospital treatment for disabilities due to his own willful misconduct?

A. A veteran will not be denied hospital treatment for such disability if he is otherwise eligible and need for hospitalization is shown.

Sidelights From Washington

By Congressman Geo. Mahon

There is every indication that the labor-management conference in Washington is getting nowhere. In the meantime, the reconversion program is being definitely retarded by dissension and strikes.

There are usually two sides to every controversy, but it is regrettable that labor and management ignore the safety of our fighting men, refuse to compose their differences

and thereby promote the public interest.

Legislation designed to improve the situation and make both labor and management accountable has been recommended by a Congressional Committee. What may be done will depend upon developments. President Truman has requested that no legislation involving the situation be passed during the Labor-Management Conference.

Unfortunately, during the war period a few racketeers ran rough shod over the public, fomenting strikes in war industries, hampering the war effort, and jeopardizing the safety of our fighting men. They did a great disservice to the

war effort, particularly to the men of the armed forces. They should have been stopped, but despite the efforts, protests and votes of some of us who were referred to as "Southern Democrats," these racketeers were not stopped in their tracks as they should have been. The failure to stop them at that time and fix a definite labor-management policy only makes the solution of the present problem more difficult.

If labor and management will give a little more thought to the public welfare, their own best interest will be better served. I do not mean that the present controversies are one-sided; that only labor is at fault; that only management is at fault. I mean that the people are sick and tired of strife and controversy that is retarding essential production and feel that they have a right to expect better performance. Organized labor—and I firmly believe in organized labor and collective bargaining—together with an enlightened management, is confronted with the greatest opportunity in history for promoting the public welfare.

Good wages and reasonable profits and good prices for agricultural

products would produce an era of good will and great prosperity in America. It is hoped that despite the unpromising present outlook, the prospects may definitely improve in the future.

There is so much happening both at home and abroad that it is impossible for anyone to keep abreast of the news. China is far away and little known to us, but colorful Pat Hurley put the Chinese situation in the spotlight last week by issuing a blast and resigning as Ambassador to China. The president of the National Press Club in Washington invited me to a luncheon where Mr. Hurley spoke to the newsmen for two hours about the controversy.

In September I had spent two nights with Mr. Hurley in Chungking. The first night he took our group out to a dinner at the home of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek. The Generalissimo was evidently sincere in his praise of Ambassador Hurley and General Al Wedemeyer, the commanding general of the Chinese theatre. Moreover, Chiang seemed to be a man of great sincerity of purpose, though there were rumors that his family had profited financially during the war. At the dinner a Mr. Frank Price, the son of an American missionary, told me he had complete faith in the Generalissimo; that he believed him to be a devout Christian gentleman. Mr. Price told me of an incident that occurred during the darkest days of the war when it seemed that Japan would completely engulf China. He said that the Generalissimo sent for him and asked him to make a list of scripture references that would give strength and guidance to the Generalissimo during these trying times.

Ambassador Hurley also introduced us to General Mao Tsz-Tung, the head of the Communists, and his staff, who had come to Chungking at Hurley's request for conferences with the Generalissimo.

All Chinese more or less look alike to me and those Communist military leaders were no exception. They were dressed in plain blue denim without brass buttons. General "Joe" as one of them was called, could speak English, and with him and an interpreter, a bright young Chinese official who was a graduate of Princeton University, we carried on a conversation.

However, we learned but little. Everything about China is confusing. It is a country that seems hopelessly enmeshed in tradition, ignorance and poverty.

There appears to be little hope for stability and real democracy in China for a long time to come.

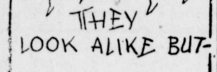

Call, all of the members thereof being present, to-wit: R. L. BROWN, Mayor, W. M. POOL, Jr., Commissioner EARL LADD, Commissioner, and among other proceedings had by said board was the following:

Commissioner W. M. Pool, Jr. introduced a resolution and order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Earl Ladd.

The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order prevailed by the following vote: Mayor Brown and Commissioners Pool and Ladd voting "AYE" and none voting "NO."

The resolution and order follows: WHEREAS, it is considered to be to the best interests of the City that the bonds of said City shall be issued for the purposes hereinafter stated, and that there is a necessity for the issuance of said bonds; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS:

I That an election be held on the 15th day of December, 1945, and which is not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this RESOLUTION AND ORDER, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Proposition Number 1
"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City in the principal sum of ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000.00), maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof bearing interest at the maximum rate of THREE PER CENTUM (3%) per annum, for the purpose of paying off, refunding and cancelling not exceeding FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$15,000.00) of the bonded indebtedness of the city's sanitary sewer system, and for the purpose of improving, enlarging, extending, and repairing the City's water system and the City's sanitary sewer system at a cost of not exceeding EIGHTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$85,000.00), as authorized by the

general laws of the State of Texas, particularly Articles 1111 et seq., Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended; said bonds to be special obligations of the City of Muleshoe, Texas payable as to both principal and interest, solely from the revenues of the City's combined water and sewer system; and shall the Board of Commissioners be authorized to encumber the City's combined water and sewer system, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest on said bonds, said encumbrance on said revenues to be an exclusive first lien on and the pledge of said revenues, after deduction of reasonable expenses of operating and maintaining said combined water and sewer system, as said expenses are defined by statute, and all bonds of said series are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond of said series; the indebtedness to be paid off, refunded and cancelled not being in the principal sum of FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$15,000.00) represented by "City of Muleshoe, Texas, Sanitary Sewer Revenue Bonds" dated November 1, 1935, bearing interest at the rate of 4% per annum, due serially on November 1st in each of the years 1946 to 1965, both inclusive, which bonds were authorized and issued pursuant to an ordinance adopted by the Board of Commissioners of said City on November 26, 1935, recorded in the ordinance records of said City, and to which ordinance reference is here made for further description of said bonded indebtedness?"

Proposition Number 2
"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, be authorized to issue the general obligation tax bonds of said City in the principal sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00), maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof bearing interest at the maximum rate of THREE PER CENTUM (3%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

Proposition Number 3
"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, be authorized to issue the general obligation tax bonds of said City in the principal sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00), maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof bearing interest at the maximum rate of THREE PER CENTUM (3%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing a municipal auditorium in and for said City and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

II In no event shall the issuance of bonds for or the proceeds of the proposed propositions or purposes be dependent upon the authorization or issuance of bonds for any of the other propositions or purposes, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of three (3) bond debts, each separate and independent of the other.

III In event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said City, voting in said election and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such revenue bonds shall never have the right to demand payment

thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

IV. Said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Muleshoe, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: J. L. Alsop, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Walter Witte, Judge, Rufus Gibrath, Clerk and T. C. Young, Clerk.

V. That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas; and only qualified electors who own taxable property in the City, and who have rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

VI. That the ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
"For the issuance of water and Sewer System Revenue Bonds and encumbering the City's combined water and sewer system, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the payment of same."

"For the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"For the issuance of Municipal Auditorium Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of Municipal Auditorium Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his

or her vote on the three propositions respectively.

VII. That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Clerk, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

VIII. That said notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order at the top of which shall appear the words, "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at the CITY HALL, the election precinct herein designated, and at two other public places in said City, not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in The Muleshoe Journal, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Muleshoe, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

The District Supervisors met in the office of the Soil Conservation Service December 3 at 8 p. m. to complete plans for purchasing terracing equipment.

The Board decided to purchase one shop made 28 inch disc terracer attachment for tractors from Hall County Conservation District. This machine will be used as a pattern for building other machines in a local shop. This type of terracer has met with much favor among the farmers of Hall County, according to John Sharp, secretary-treasurer of the Hall County Soil Conservation District.

"This equipment will be made available to cooperators of the District within a very short time at a reasonable cost and the farmers will want to take advantage of this opportunity," said Ray Carter, the chairman of the Board. "There are several thousand acres of land in this county or District that should be terraced and saved from erosion, Carter said.

Applications for assistance in soil conservation were received recently by the District from Bert Robinson, M. D. Lockner Roy Truebeck, T. C. Mosely, Walker F. Ramm, George Stotts, F. R. Preixon, I. W. Haney, Laura B. S. Cox, Troy Actkinson, and W. R. Young.

The farmer who wishes to obtain the technical services of the Soil Conservation Service in working out a conservation plan for his farm must do so through his Soil Conservation District which is an autonomous subdivision of his local government.

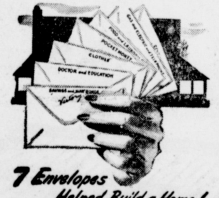
