### MOTORISTS SHOULD HEED HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION SIGNS

Construction work is being done on Highway 86 west of town in the draw below the dam on the Johnny Cagle place.

Resident Highway Engineer O. V. Johnson reports that although speed limit signs of 40 MPH have been posted on both sides of the projects, many motorists are failing to conform to the speed limits and are driving past at unsafe rates of speed. Mr. Johnson states that the 40 mile speed limit is LAW and can be enforced.

He said that heavy earth-moving equipment is passing back and forth across the road at all time and an auto or truck operator who moves into the area too fast is certainly taking his life into his own hands and also endangers the lives of the men working in the area.

Mr. Johnson sincerely requests that everyone take the proper precautions when approaching working areas. Obey all speed limits that are posted in those areas. They are there for your safety. You or your auto would not make a very big dent in the side of one of large earth-moving giants.

### NEPHEW OF MRS. JAKE MERRELL KILLED IN AUTO-TRUCK ACCIDENT

Funeral services for Jerry Lane Smith, 26, of the Plaska community in Hall County, were held last Friday afternoon at 2:30 P. M. in the First Baptist Church of Memphis. Burial was in the Lakeview Cemetery.

He was the nephew of Mrs. Jake Merrell. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. Paul Smith, are a prominent Hall County farm family.

Mr. Smith was killed in a car-truck accident on Highway 287 just northwest of the Memphis city limits at 4:30 P. M. on Wednesday of last week. Also killed in the accident was Beverly Houston Neal, 44 of near Lesley, who died about 2 hours following the wreck.

A third occupant of the car, Raymond Whitten, 29, of near Lakeview, was seriously injured in the accident. The driver of the truck, Edward Lack, of Amarillo, was not injured.

Smith was born December 7, 1937, in Memphis. He was married to Murietta Byars on Dec. 20, 1958 at Lesley. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Kimberly Ann and Karen Elaine, and a son, Jerry Paul, who was born the next morning after his father was killed; and his parents. The Smith infant was the first baby born in the new Hall County Hospital and the mother and baby received five days free hospital care.

Other survivors include a brother, Sandy Smith of near Plaska.

### POSTMASTER BOGAN ATTENDS ZIP CODE MEETING AT CHILDRESS

Postmaster Sid Bogan attended a Zip Code Meeting of postmasters in Childress on March 4 and reports there are several things he would like to say if time and space permitted, but one thing would possibly suffice and that is: PLEASE use your zip code number—for Quitaque that number is 79255. Postmaster Bogan says "Do not say it will not work. I am thoroughly convinced it will work. If properly used it will speed the mail, and that is what we are expecting this day and time, for we are living in a fast age. It is always important to put your return on all mail and your zip code number should be included in your return in this manner: Your name, then your box number or route, then Quitaque, Texas 79255. It is not necessary to say 'Zip Code No.,' just follow Texas with 79255. If you do not know the zip code number of your correspondent, please ask them for it and use it on your next letter or package to them."

Mr. Bogan went on to say that the Post Office Department is anxious that the proper zip code number be put on all classes of mail, and that the Department is very grateful for your full cooperation in this endeavor. It will take time, as well as the cooperation of all mailers to make this project work to the best degree.

He asks you to remember to use the outside box at all times after closing hours, on Saturday afternoons and Sunday. The mail is picked up from that box every night.

## Congressman Walter Rogers' Newsletter

### NOTES AND COMMENTS

Enactment of the tax bill this week means that the cuts will be reflected beginning next week in the take home pay of salary and wage earners. Persons in doubt about what the tax bill means to them personally will begin to see the effects for the first time. I agree with President Johnson that enactment of the tax cut is "the single most important step" taken to strengthen the economy since World War II and that the cut "will strengthen our economy and bring a better way of life to our citizens." The new law marks a most important milestone in our economic development because it constitutes a strong endorsement of the free enterprise system. Behind it is the principle that capital freed for spending by the private sector of the economy, by consumers and by business, can bring greater economic stimulus than could a higher level of spending by the public sector—by the government.

Texas Governor John Connally, his arm still in a sling as a result of the grievous wound suffered when President Kennedy was slain in Dallas, honored the Texas Delegation in Congress with a visit this week. The Governor was returning to Texas from New York, where he dedicated the Texas Pavilion at the World's Fair site. Governor Connally said he hopes it will not be necessary to call the Texas Legislature into Special Session this year on the question of redrawing the boundaries of the State's Congressional Districts. In his view, he said, redistricting is necessary and should be a priority matter for the Session of the Legislature beginning next January. But he said he hoped the matter could be better handled in a regular Session of the Legislature. The Texas Delegation expressed its unanimous conviction that the Texas Legislature is perfectly able to handle the matter in whatever situation arises.

When will Congress adjourn? Possibly in late June or early July, in time for the Republican National Convention scheduled to begin July 13 in San Francisco. At the moment there is a rush in the Senate and the House to try to clear from committee consideration bills affecting local areas in the country. Many Members feel pressed about this because the Senate is preparing to begin its debate on the civil rights bill, and this debate—accompanied by a filibuster of history-making proportions—is certain to consume weeks if not months of time on the Senate floor. The problem is this: The current Session, the Second Session of the 88th Congress, is the last of the two-year Congress. All bills introduced in this Session will die if not enacted by the time the Session concludes. Many bills have been passed by the House and are awaiting consideration in the Senate—and obviously many of them cannot be considered before the civil rights debate begins. After that debate is over, the Senate will be hard put to act upon appropriation bills acted on by the House in the meantime. It's going to be a very difficult matter for the business of the Congress, particularly that on the Senate side to be concluded in time for adjournment in early summer. It is possible that the Congress will be recessed for the Republican and Democratic National Conventions and then return to Washington in late summer or early fall. If the Congress follows this course, I predict that it will be difficult to keep the Members' minds on Congressional business; after all, this is a Presidential election year and the focus of the country's attention will be on that.

Why, I was asked this week, are \$1 silver certificates being withdrawn from circulation. They are being withdrawn over a period of years so that silver back of them can be used to coin half dollars, quarters and dimes. There is a shortage of silver that would create a prohibitive price rise if we attempted to buy it on the market. To insure against the possibility of eliminating all \$1 notes from circulation, legislation was passed last year permitting Federal Reserve Banks to issue notes below \$5. Federal Reserve Banks did not previously have that authority. Some \$2 billion in silver certificates remain in circulation, however, and they are being replaced as they wear out. That's the reason some of your money is looking different lately.

To persons writing for them, I will be glad to send copies of two publications prepared by the Congress. One is Senate Document No. 46 containing eulogies to the late President John F. Kennedy delivered in the Rotunda of the United States Capitol on November 24, 1963. The other is House Document No. 225, a most attractive reproduction of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag—and the musical accompaniment for it—as well as a history of the famous pledge. School teachers and their pupils might be particularly interested in having copies of this.

## ONE OUT OF FOUR RURAL HOMES DILAPIDATED

Massive programs of loans and grants for housing in rural America, of sufficient proportion to eliminate substandard housing, install proper sewage facilities and provide adequate plumbing was urged by the National Farmers Union today in testimony presented to the Housing Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Banking and Currency by J. I. Naman, President of the Texas Farmers Union.

It was pointed out that the rural housing loan programs administered by the Farmers Home Administration have been "spectacularly successful" in that some 80,000 families have received about \$650 million to help build or modernize their homes and farm buildings. Mr. Naman pointed out that these were families who were unable to obtain credit for their housing needs from private credit resources. Mr. Naman also voiced strong opposition to the establishment of a yearly \$300 million ceiling on Farmers Home Administration Housing loans.

"With a program as phenomenally successful as this has been, we respectfully suggest that it makes sense to provide the agency with funds to meet the need that exists without limitation or ceiling," Naman said.

The farm leader referred to the 1960 census which showed that one out of four of our rural families are living in homes that are "either deteriorated or so run down that they were classified as dilapidated. One-third do not even have complete plumbing."

"Around every city there are rural slums or shack towns. The Congress has wisely extended the housing loan program of the Farmers Home Administration to these areas. It should be realized, however, that loans are of little or no benefit because the residents do not have the ability to repay loans or to pay rent in the amount required to pay the cost of decent housing."

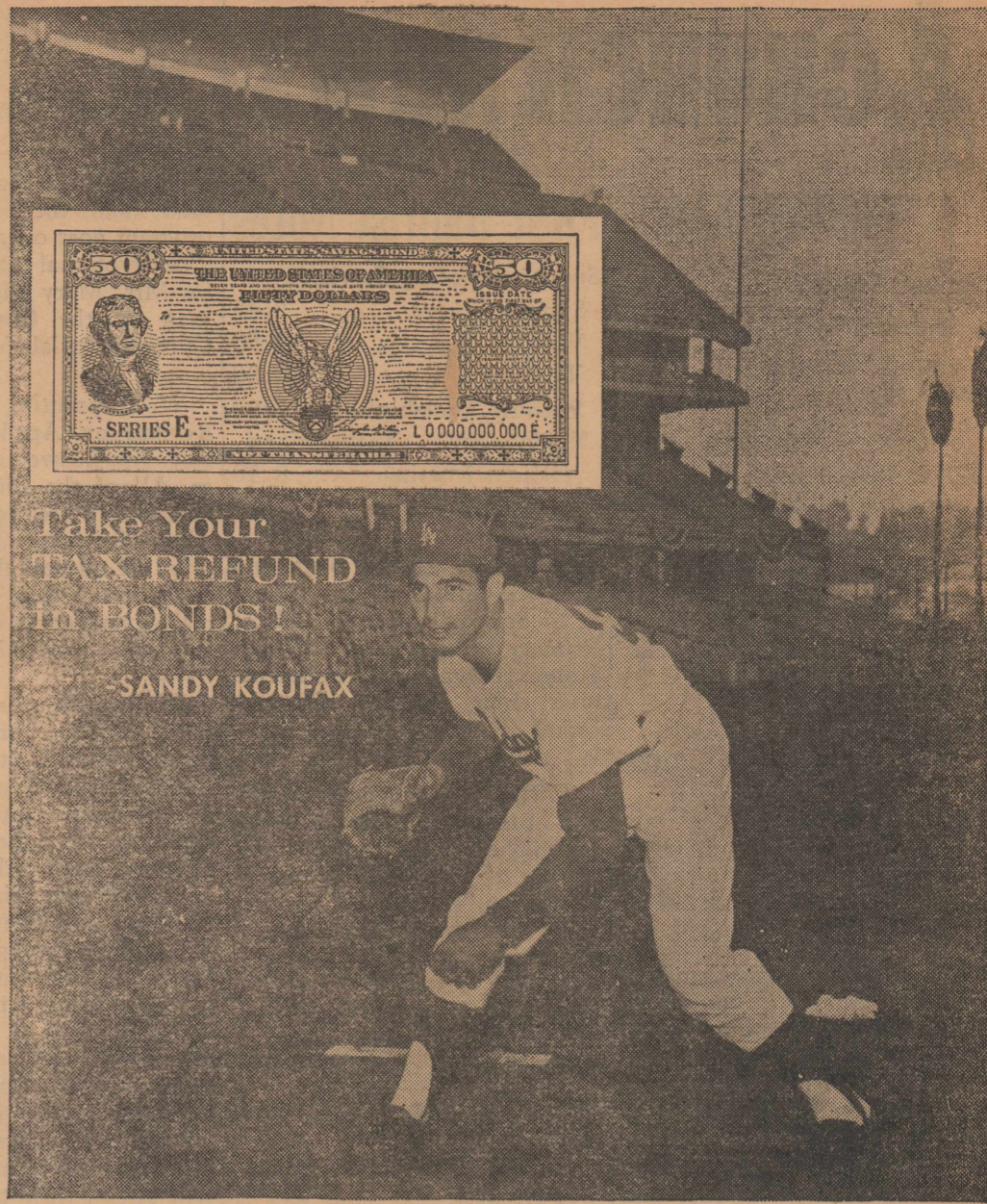
