When will Congress adjourn? Possibly in late June or early July, in time for the Republican National Convention scheduled to begin July 13 in San Francisco. At the moment there is a rush in the Senate and the House to try to clear from committee consideration bills affecting local areas in the country. Many Members feel pressed about this because the Senate is preparing to begin its debate on the civil rights bill, and this debate—accompanied by a filibus. Mr. and Mrs. B. K. There is a shortage of silver that would create a prohibitive price rise if we attempt. ed to buy it on the market. To insure against the possibility of eliminating all \$1 notes from circulation, legisation was passed last year permitting Federal Reserve Banks to issue notes below \$5. Federal Reserve Banks did not previously have that authority. Some \$2 billion in silver certificates remain in circulation, however, and they are being replaced as they wear out.
