Third Lake Built On Holmes Creek

Pictured above is newest lake in this area, completed on February 28, and located on the Bert Hawkins land about 4 miles northwest of Quitaque.

The new lake is the third lake to be built on Holmes Creek, being located almost 2 miles above Lake Theo.

When full, the new lake will be 29 feet deep at the drawdown tube and will contain 145 acre

feet of water. 3500 yards of dirt was used in making the dam.

Bert and C. A. Hawkins financed the project.

Plans are for stocking the lake for fishing provided a permit can be secured, according to C. A. Hawkins. Thus another link in the chain of irrigation and fishing lakes in our immediate area.

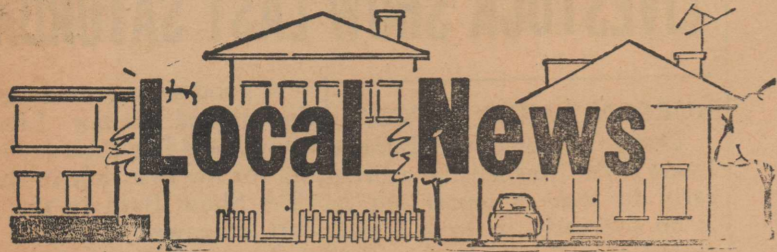

 goods and services we buy..

They swell the Federal treasury
 by billions of dollars—by an
 estimated \$10.2 billion in the
 current fiscal year. And excise
 taxes—by which the Federal
 government "excises" (or slices
 out) its share of the purchase
 price—constitute a problem for
 consumers, retailers, and manu-
 facturers, as well as the tax
 collector who is faced with a
 jungle of complex regulations.

The focus of Congressional
 effort to bring new sense and
 balance to the nation's tax
 structure likely will fall next on
 excise taxes—and, in my view,
 a sweeping review of the subject
 is long overdue. Congressman
 Wilbur Mills, the chairman of
 the House Ways and Means
 Committee, has announced that
 public hearings will be held later
 this year on excise taxes. The
 purpose of the hearings, he said,
 will be similar to that which led
 the Committee to give thorough
 review to the income tax struc-
 ture. That study directly result-
 ed in the recent enactment of the
 income tax reduction and re-
 vision bill.

My prediction is that from
 the hearings to be held will
 emerge a major revision—if not
 an outright repeal—of the ex-
 cise tax structure. Certainly there
 will not be time this year to
 complete hearings and commit-
 tee study in the House and Sen-
 ate, drafting of bills, debate and
 decision on the floors of both
 Houses of Congress. Possibly
 the matter will come to a deci-
 sion next year, in the First Ses-
 sion of the 89th Congress. I'd
 expect that certainly before the
 end of 1966, major changes—
 if not repeal—will have been
 enacted. Aside from the time-
 consuming aspect of Congress-
 ional procedure on this kind of
 very involved matter, an im-
 portant reason why action will
 not be taken swiftly is because
 the Congress and the country
 will want to judge the effects of
 the income tax reduction bill
 signed by the President last
 month. If the income tax re-
 duction measure lives up to its
 promise to give the nation's
 economy a major boost, justifi-
 cation will be strong for a sim-
 ilar action affecting excise taxes.

Excise taxes are a legacy of
 World War II. Billed as "lux-
 ury taxes," they were first en-
 acted into law in 1941. Con-
 gress stated as its objective in
 imposing them that they were
 for raising revenue and for
 "other purposes." The "other
 purposes" were, in some instan-
 ces, to discourage the production
 and sale of items whose com-
 ponents consisted of vital war
 materials. Luggage and jewelry
 were two such products. The
 excise tax was employed not
 only to raise revenue but also to
 control, retain, and divert the
 use of supplies needed in the
 war effort. Obviously this pur-
 pose, if not that of raising reve-
 nue, has outlived its original
 intent.

Excise taxes are levied on 50
 major categories of retail goods
 including thousands of different
 kinds of articles. Among them
 are jewelry, furs, luggage, toilet
 preparations, cameras and film,
 theater admissions, mechanical
 pens, revolvers, sporting goods,
 telephone calls, tobacco, travel
 tickets. On some items, such as
 light bulbs, the tax is levied on
 the manufacturer. Because the
 manufacturer has paid the tax,
 the fact that it is taxed is not as
 apparent to a purchaser as is the
 fact that he must pay a Federal
 excise tax when he purchases a
 suitcase. But the tax is there—
 although hidden—on light
 bulbs and many other items you
 wouldn't suspect would carry a
 "luxury" classification.

I've heard that some retailers
 refuse to handle articles on
 which an excise tax must be
 collected directly because they
 wish to spare themselves the ex-
 pense of being tax collectors.
 Many retailers can't avoid the
 chore. A jeweler, for example,
 must levy the tax of 10 percent
 whether the sale is 10 cents or
 \$1,000. His advertising must
 carry the notification that jew-
 elry is taxed. He must make sep-
 arate bookkeeping entries for

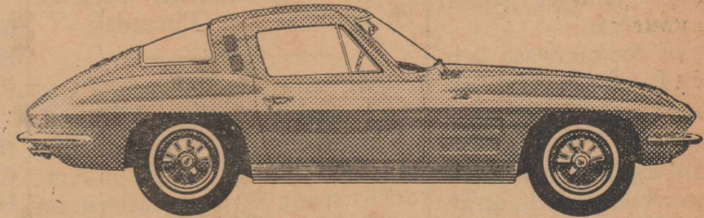

The bride is a student at Monterey High School. Her husband attended Quitaque High School and is employed by the Coca Cola Bottling Co.

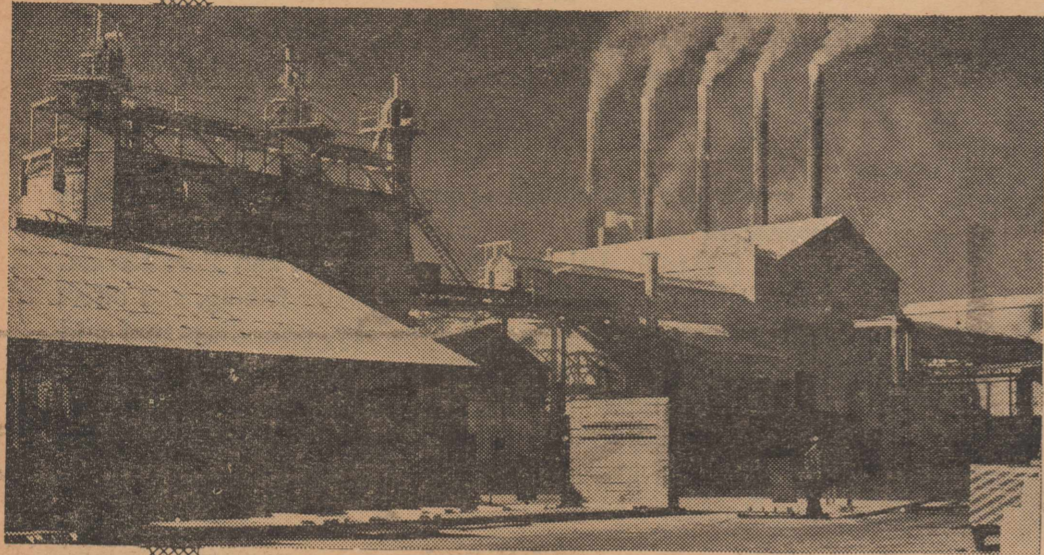

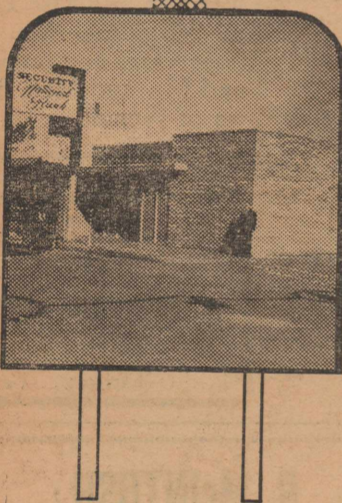
