**ELECTION ORDER**

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF BRISCOE

ON THIS, the 17th day of April, 1964, the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Silverton, Texas, the following members of the Court, to-wit:

- M. G. MORELAND, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding; and
- L. H. WATTERS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1
- Mrs. EDNA EVELYN HAWKINS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2
- A. D. ARNOLD, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3
- ROY S. BROWN, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4

being present, and among other proceedings had by said Court, were the following:

WHEREAS, a petition has been duly presented to the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, wherein the petitioners, alleging themselves to represent more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Briscoe County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and praying this Court to order that an election be held in said County to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$185,000), bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, and to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY FIVE (25) years from their date, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a county hospital to be located in or near the city of Silverton, Texas, and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 as amended; and whether or not a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principle thereof at maturity shall be levied on all taxable property within said County, and

WHEREAS, this Court, upon due advice and investigation, has ascertained and determined that said petition is signed by more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of Briscoe County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and that such petition should be granted, and that the election as prayed for in such petition should be ordered; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS: THAT an election be held in said County on the 9th day of May, 1964, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified

voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$185,000), to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY FIVE (25) years from the date thereof, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, for the purpose of establishing and equipping a county hospital to be located in or near the City of Silverton, Texas, and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution and Chapter 1, Title 22 and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and all persons who are legal voters of said Briscoe County, Texas, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF HOSPITAL BONDS AND THE LEVY OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF HOSPITAL BONDS AND THE LEVY OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

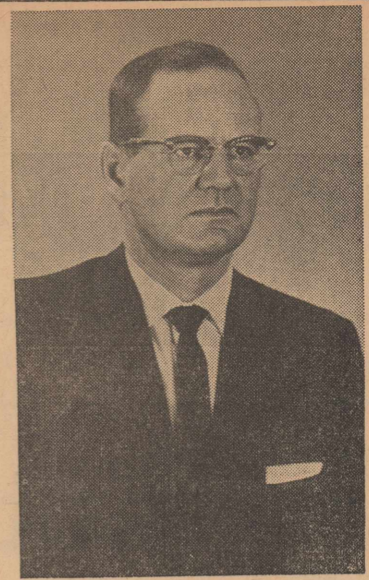
AS TO THE FOREGOING proposition each voter shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition so that the remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

THE MANNER of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

A COPY of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of such election.

NOTICE of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF HOSPITAL BONDS." Said notice shall be posted in each of the election precincts of the County of Briscoe, and at the County Courthouse, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in Briscoe County, the first of said publications to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the day set for said election.

The above and foregoing order having been read in full it was moved by Commissioner Watters and seconded by Commissioner Brown that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Watters, Hawkins, Arnold and Brown; and none voted "NO."

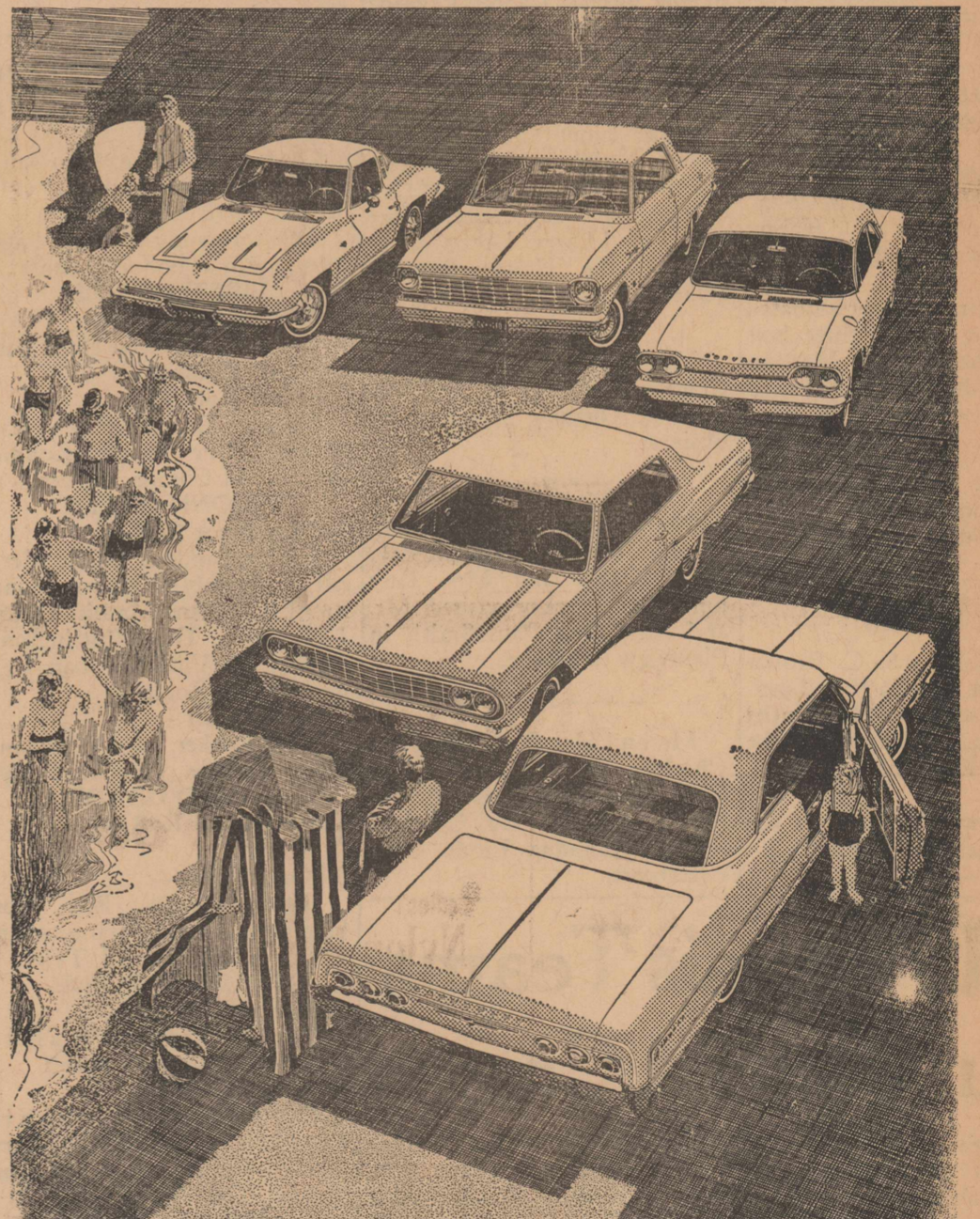

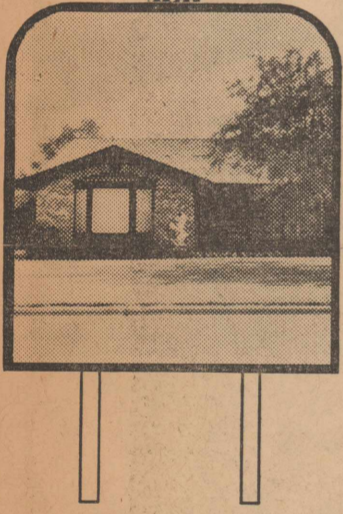

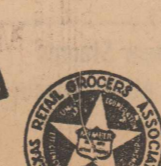
