LAKE McCLELLAN FACILITIES BEING IMPROVED

Lake McLellan in southern Gray County is one of the most attractive recreation spots in the Panhandle. For several years I sought approval for new, needed construction work at the dam to preserve the recreational benefits provided by the lake and to protect property below the dam from occasional flash flooding. In my capacity as chairman of the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation of the House Interior Committee, I have long advocated that it's just as necessary to maintain existing water projects as to build new ones. I had felt that Lake McLellan was being neglected; recurrent floods proved it.

I am glad to say that the U. S. Forest Service, which has administered Lake McLellan since 1954, will open bids June 11 in needed work on the dam and Albuquerque to provide the spillway. The project, to be completed in 300 days after the contract is awarded, will include construction of a new, enlarged concrete spillway and extending the dam across the existing emergency spillway. Since 1959, the Forest Service has improved facilities at Lake McLellan by adding 49 "family units" (fireplace, table, and benches), two boat ramps, two miles of improved road, a rehabilitated concession building, among others. In the current fiscal year, the Forest Service began a project to add additional picnic tables and fireplaces, sanitary facilities, a boat trailer parking area, boat ramps, and another mile and a half of roadway. Based on periodic counts by the Forest Service, approximately 110,000 visits are made to the lake each year.

When projects planned or underway are completed, the goal of upgrading facilities at Lake McLellan will be attained.

Hearings are expected to begin about June 8 on the U. S. sugar supply question—an issue that shapes up as one of the hottest remaining to be decided in this 88th Congress. The House Agriculture Committee will consider bills I and other Members of the House have introduced to permit American sugar beet farmers and cane growers the right to serve a larger share of the American market. Americans are the world's best sugar consumers. This quantity of sugar now is being received from "off-shore"—foreign—sugar producers. As I have predicted for many months the fight will be a tough one. The off-shore interests seeking to preserve the status quo include shippers and refiners along the East Coast. They will muster powerful support, as they did in 1962 when Congress resolved the same question in their favor. But his year I see signs of growing strength for our economic position a very unfair situation.

HARVE FOSTER IN HOSPITAL

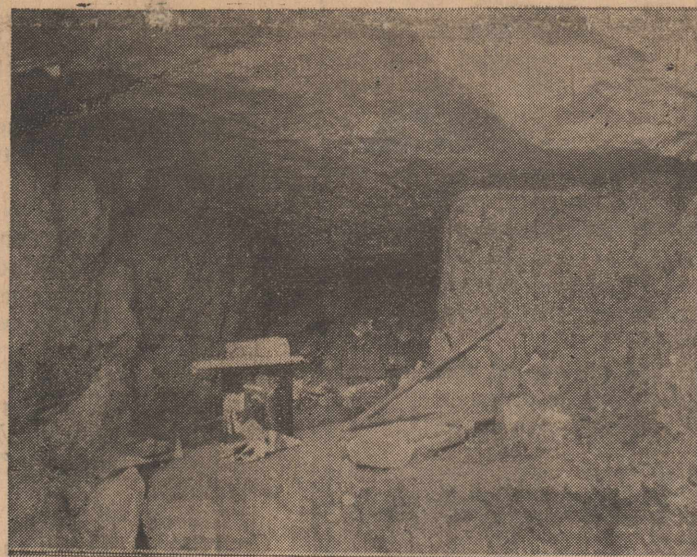

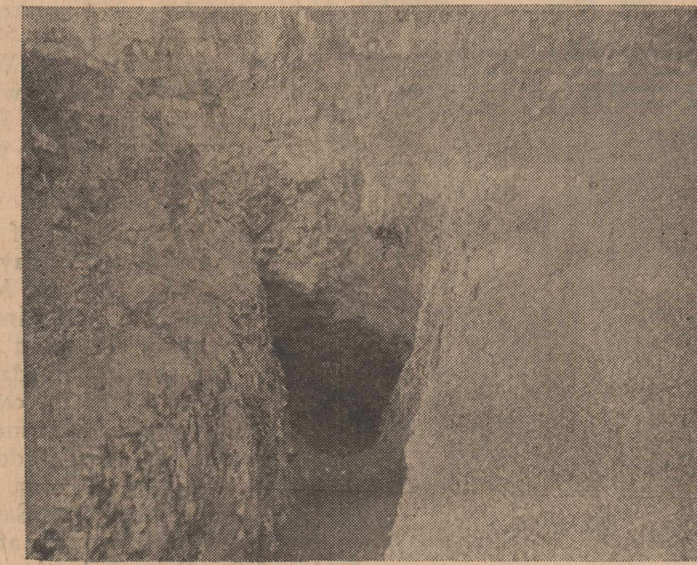
A Mine? Here At Quitaque?

We wonder how many know about the "mine" located just a few miles from Quitaque? These pictures were taken on the Hawkins property north-west of town about five miles, and is located near the newest Hawkins Lake. Pictured below

is the entrance to the main part of the diggings. There have been tales of buried treasure in the brakes surrounding Quitaque making the rounds for many years. We don't know what is expected to be found in this particular mine.

All qualified voters are urged to vote Saturday in this important election. Your vote might be the one to elect a favorite candidate.

FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION DISCUSSES PRESIDENT'S PROGRAM

The measures proposed by President Johnson to eliminate rural poverty was discussed at a three-day regional meeting of the Farmers Home Administration which was held in Dallas, June 2-4. L. J. Cappleman, Texas state director for the federal agricultural credit agency announced today.

At the meeting the federal officials will also discuss steps being taken to help young farmers take over the farms of retiring elders, progress made in developing rural community water systems, and the housing assistance given senior citizens in rural areas.

During the past three years under a vastly expanded program the agency has advanced \$2 billion for the strengthening of family farms and rural communities. The \$613 million loaned in the first 10 months of fiscal 1964 was nearly 100 per cent greater than the amount loaned during fiscal 1960. Washington officials attending the meeting will include Howard Bertsch, FHA Administrator, and Division staff members.

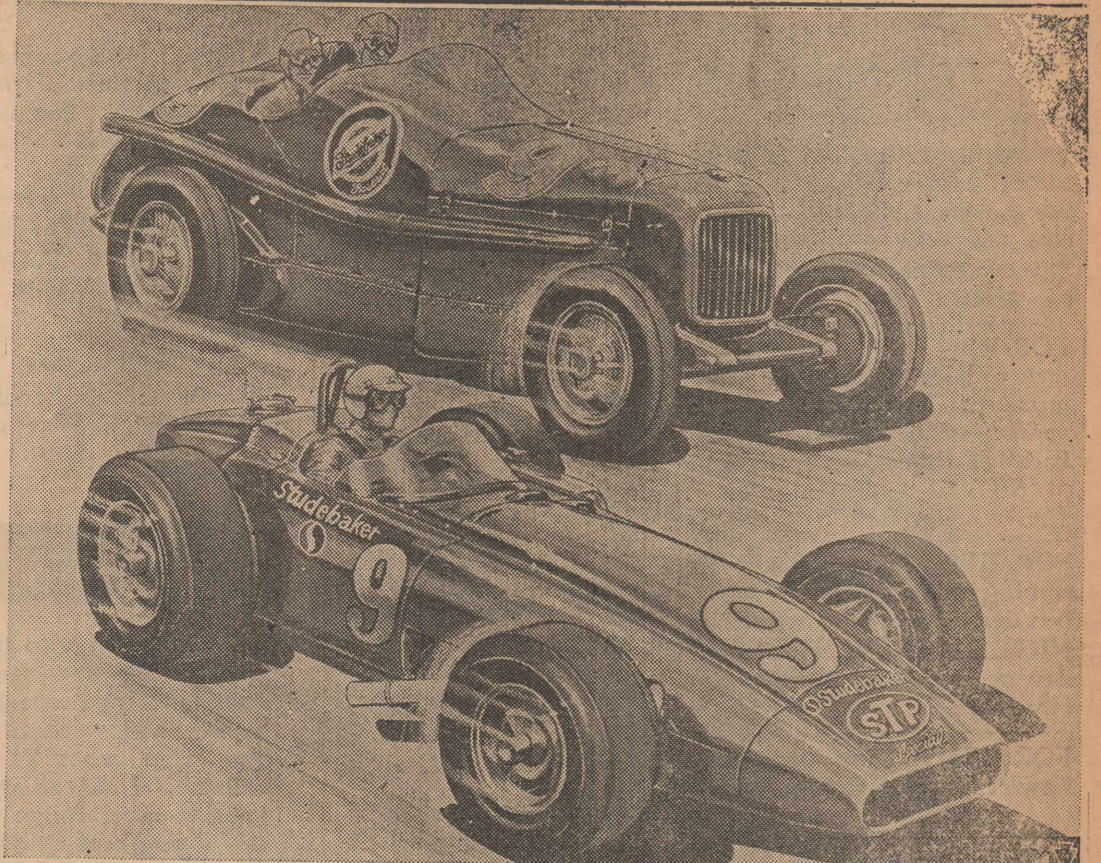
State leaders of the agency participating in the conference will be FHA state directors and staff members from Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

The Farmers Home Administration through a network of 1,500 county offices located through rural America provides credit assistance in farm and financial management to owners and operators of family farms and aids farmers and rural residents in improving rural housing and other rural community facilities.

The agency's funds supplement the credit provided by other lenders. State directors and county supervisors of the agency serve as chairman of RAD technical action panels organized to help rural communities develop their local economies.

During the past three decades the Farmers Home Administration and its predecessor agencies have loaned nearly \$7.4 billion. Approximately \$5.9 billion in principal and interest have been repaid. Interest collections far exceed the amount written off.

HERE COMES THE BRIDE



You can create beautiful table decorations for a bride's party using fabric softener bottles, 2 3/4" styrofoam balls and odds and ends of household articles. Materials suggested by the makers of NuSoft fabric softener include net, ribbon, paper doilies, colored tissue paper, old beads, sequins, heavy weight paper and artificial flowers.

Cut off top of bottle at lowest groove. Gouge hole in ball to fit bottle neck. Cut paper oval 2 3/4" x 1" and pin to top of head. Using yellow tissue paper for bride and darker color for bridesmaid, make hair by cutting four 7/8" x 1" strips and four 7/8" x 3/4" strips for each. Curl ends of paper strips on knitting needle or similar object and pin haircurls on paper oval. Sequins and colored paper form facial features. Cut paper to go halfway around bottle and attach with cellophane tape. Pleat three 6"

doilies and attach around waistline. Four doilies cut in half and pleated fill in bottom of skirt. Double thickness net 14" x 8" is attached over doilies with shirring string and ribbon sash used as waistband also ties on bouquet. Colored doilies, ribbon and paper should be used for bridesmaid. Tiny pearls accent both costumes. A 24" circle of net folded in half is pinned to bride's head for veil. Wreath of tiny artificial flowers matches bouquet. For bridesmaid's hat, cut 5 1/2" paper circle and cover on both sides with 6" colored doilies. Cut out 2 1/4" circle in center and pin hat on head. Complete with artificial flowers and ribbon streamer. The bridal decorations can be given to the bride. Include a bottle of the fabric softener in her gifts to make her laundry chores easier and her clothes soft, smooth and wrinkle-free.

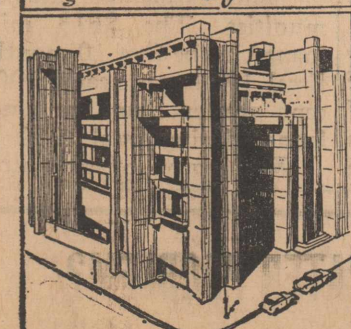
SUMMER SESSION STARTS AT CLARENDON JUNIOR COLLEGE
