## New Basketball Season Just Three Weeks Away

My special thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Ermine Bray, Mrs. Dorothy May, Mrs. Sherrod Arnold, and Mrs. Keith Rogers, for their special assistance in my office.

It has been a distinct pleasure to serve this community as its physician. If I may be of assistance professionally or personally at any time, please do not hesitate to call on me.

### RECORD ENROLLMENT AT CLARENDON JC

The largest number of students to enroll at Clarendon Junior College was completed with the last day of registration September 23 showing a final total enrollment of 190 students. The night school enrolled a total of 47 students, and the day school enrolled 153. Ten of these students were enrolled in day and night classes.

This growth represents a determination of all the individuals who continue to work for a growing college in our community. The increased student contact program that began in February, 1964, is one of the major reasons for this increased enrollment. ## Flomot Water System Now In Operation

A brief dedication ceremony was held at the location of Flomot's new city well last Saturday and water was turned into the new lines which will serve the school, business, churches and homes in and around Flomot. At the present time there are 61 meters being served by the water system.

The 30,000 gallon storage is located about a mile north of town at a good well which pumps 60 to 65 gallons per minute. The plant has a pres-

sure system and an automatic chlorinator.

Work began on the system about a year and a half ago. Farmers Home Administration and the money was furnished by the First National Bank of Quitaque. The cost of the new water system was \$55,000.

Biggs and Matthews of Wichita Falls were the engineers for the project; Rhode Pipe Co., Silverton were line contractors and S. J. Braselton Co. of Roaring Springs was the well

contractor.

Serving on the Motley County FHA committee are J. C. Franks of Flomot, D. P. Keith of Matador and W. H. Marshall of Roaring Springs. Alfred A. Harrison of Floydada is Motley and Flomot County supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

The Flomot Water Supply Corporation is composed of Leon Cloyd, President; John F. Speer, Secretary-Treasurer; J. H. George, Malcolm Turner and Harmon Moseley, members.

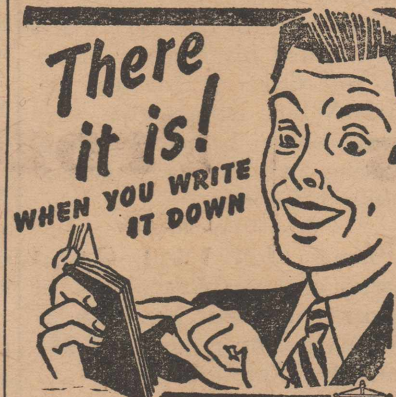

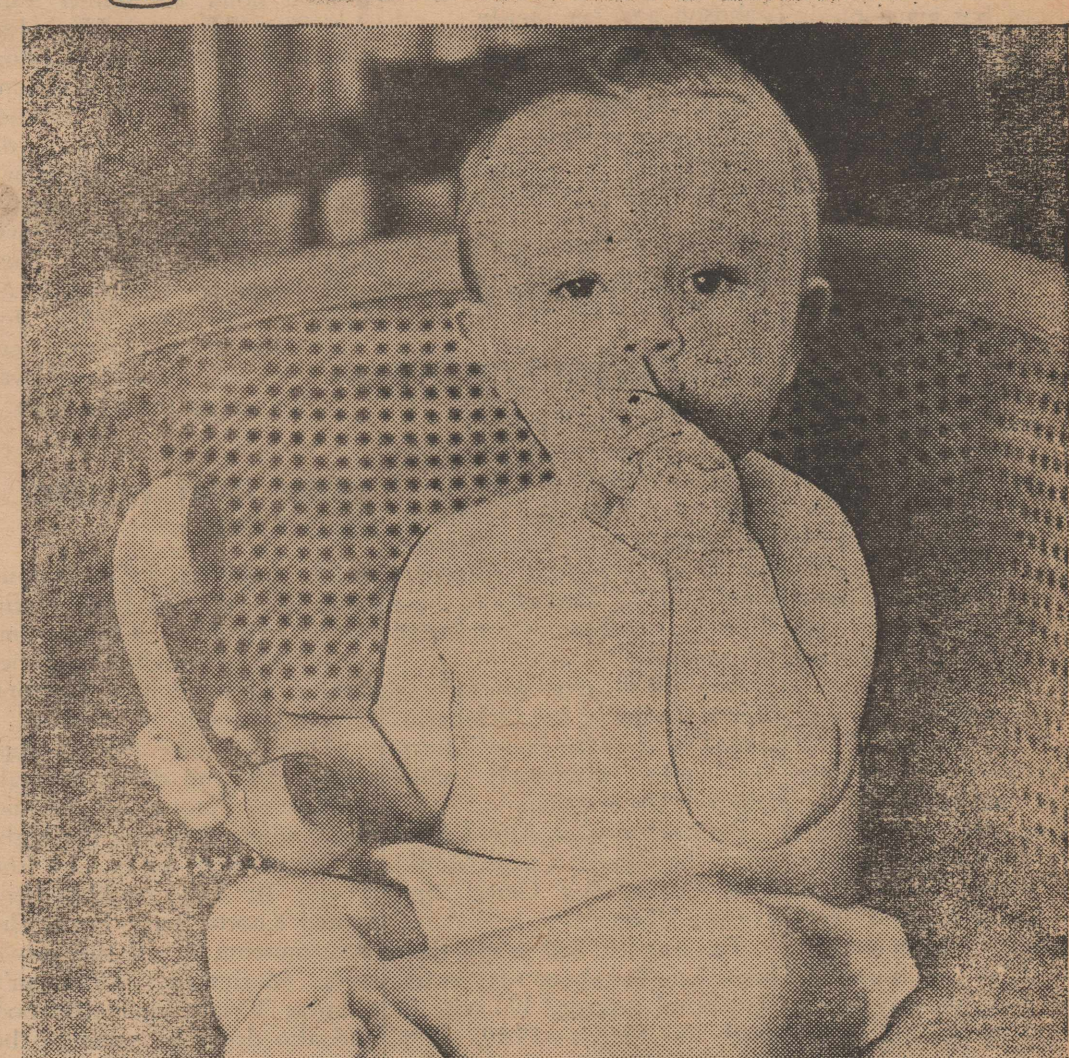
