## BASKETBALL GAME TO BE PLAYED HERE SATURDAY NIGHT AT 7:30

Basketball comes to Quitaque Saturday night when the Quitaque Blackhaws meet the Sanders Sisters at 7:30 in the local gym.

The Quitaque Blackhaws is an "outsider" women's basketball team organized, sponsored and coached by P. John Monk.

Most of the young women who make up the roster of the Blackhaws live in Quitaque but one of the girls lives at Silverton and two at Flomot.

The Blackhaws' opponents in Saturday night's contest are just what the name says: the Sanders Sisters, all daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sanders of Hedley. There are eight of the Sanders girls, seven of whom will play in Saturday night's game, and all of them are graduates of Hedley High School and played basketball on Hedley High teams. One of them, Jean (Mrs. Jarrell Rice) is a member of the Blackhaws team ordinarily but will play with her sisters Saturday night.

## RANDALL HAMILTON TAKES PART IN NATO DIRECTED EXERCISE

SEVENTH U. S. ARMY, Germany (AHTNC) — Pfc. Randel L. Hamilton, son of Mr. Leroy W. Hamilton, Quitaque, and other members of the Seventh U. S. Army participated in Exercise FALLEX 64, an eight-day NATO directed and controlled training exercise in Germany, ending September 28.

The bi-annual exercise was designed to test and evaluate coordination procedures and command communications with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) military structure in Europe. Orders and communications between headquarters command posts and the dissemination of information to lower headquarters were stressed to insure maximum proficiency during the extensive training exercise.

Hamilton is assigned as radio repairman in Company B of the 385th Military Police Battalion near Kornwestheim, Germany.

The 23-year-old soldier entered the Army last January and completed basic training at Fort Polk, La.

He is a 1959 graduate of Quitaque High School and attended West Texas State University, Canyon.

After officers were elected the membership requirements were established, limiting membership to small towns of no more than three floral shops. This limitation was made because small town floral shops have problems which occur in only in small towns. Thus, the common problems and interest would be the objective of the group.

A name for the organization was not decided at Tulia Saturday, but it was decided that an award would be given to the member who presented the accepted name.

The next meeting of the group will be in Amarillo on October 25, 1912.

## Spray Program To Be Speeded Up

Quite a number of farmers in the area have wondered as to the reason for the delay between sprayings of cotton in the Diapause Control Program which has been underway for about a month now.

According to some reports as much as two weeks have passed between sprayings.

When inquiries continued to be made at the bank as to the reason for the delay, banker O. R. Stark decided to try to find out for himself what the reasons were.

He called the Texas Department of Agriculture and put the question to them. That Department then called the USDA for the reasons and this is their report:

Due to a shortage of planes in the area, they could not get around to spraying all of the crops as fast as had been anticipated. In addition to the shortage of spray planes, the bad weather experienced by the Panhandle for several days caused further delays.

However, the Department report stated that the number of spray planes in the area have been doubled this week and the feeling is that spraying now will continue at the rate anticipated in the beginning of the program.

### FAITH IN AMERICA

The United States of America is the finest and the greatest nation in the history of mankind. No civilization, modern or ancient, can produce any comparable accomplishments in the government of mankind. No country in any civilization in the history of mankind has approached our country and its philosophies in guaranteeing, insuring, and preserving the basic rights and dignity of the individual man.

Because of our position, brought about by the blood, the sweat, the tears, and the devotion to duty of our ancestors, we have living evidence to substantiate the faith and confidence we should all have in our philosophy of life, in our form of government, and in our understanding of the needs of man. As far as I am personally concerned, this faith and confidence is absolute and concrete, and it is my wholehearted feeling that we can, as a nation, meet and destroy any challenge from without or within. I believe that a great majority of other Americans feel as I do, and it is because of this that my confidence in the future is and shall remain unshaken.

On the other hand we have a vocal and bitter group in our own midst who continually defile our governmental structure, demean the basic principles upon which freedom has been

founded, and viciously attack their fellow Americans. It is these Americans who disturb me, not because I think they will ever mount a force sufficient to destroy America and what it stands for, but because I feel that they are contributing to the cause of those in foreign areas who are deeply jealous of our accomplishments and who would try to destroy those things which we have built.

I have no difficulty in understanding why Nikita Khrushchev would condemn and demean our institutions, our philosophy of government and our achievements. He has visited our country for only a short stay. However, he saw enough to convince him of the great strength, of the great faith, and of the great confidence enjoyed by the American people. Certainly it would be his mission to return to Communist Russia and try to belittle our institutions, our government, our resources, and our ability.

The same could be said of Mao Tse-tung, except that he has not visited our country. He, too, is a party in interest with Khrushchev to try to destroy the United States of America and all that it stands for. He is a Communist at heart and bent on the domination of mankind in this world.

The same kind of rule could be applied to Castro, who has known this country much better. (Continued on Back Page)

# Nation's PTA's Ask: Join, Help Children

## Membership Offers New Challenge

PTA's throughout the nation are offering a challenging new invitation this fall to membership in an organization that works for all children and youth.

With membership in the PTA comes an opportunity to take part in activities designed to attack the problems that most critically affect children's welfare today.

Says Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers: "The scientific, technological, and social revolution of our time make it more imperative than ever that every child receive the highest advantages in physical, mental, social, and spiritual education."

Still, she notes, "nowhere, not even in the most favored community, are all children served well or equally well."

That's why the National PTA Action Program for the coming three years is to be planned and written by PTA leaders and members throughout the nation—with counsel from leaders of other organizations that share, in some measure, the PTA's concern for children and their welfare.

The suggestions for PTA activity will be flexible enough, Mrs. Moorhead believes, so that "every community can benefit by the broad experience represented in the parent-teacher movement."

She sees PTA's as "uniquely qualified" to pinpoint each community's need for services to children—and to help meet these needs effectively.

—Do children face inadequate school facilities? The PTA may work to secure funds for new buildings, scoring like the parent-teacher association in Gaylord, Michigan, which won community support of a \$950,000 bond issue.

—Do children from deprived families fall behind in school for lack of encouragement or opportunity to study? PTA's can establish a study center like that formed by Chicago's Southeast Council of PTA's, which provides books and desks and even student tutors from the nearby University of Chicago.

—Do current movies or tele-



vision programs threaten children's moral and spiritual values? PTA's can plan a survey of TV-viewing and movie-going like the one conducted by the Valley Area Council of PTA's in Ohio—a two-year effort involving nearly 5,000 parents and students in the Cincinnati area—and make their views known to producers and distributors.

—Do children growing up in the U. S. today have too little respect for law and individual liberty? The PTA Magazine helps parents provide the basis for developing self-discipline in children and understanding better what is involved in safeguarding individual rights and liberties. And PTA's in communities large and small provide a forum for bringing together parents, educators, religious leaders and civic offi-

cial, directing attention to the needs of children and offering the seasoned leadership needed to equalize and improve services to those children.

That's the challenge implied in every invitation, "Join the PTA."

It's an invitation being offered this fall by more than 47,000 local PTA's in the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. By accepting the invitation millions of Americans will find many avenues of service to children. Through such services children benefit immeasurably—in physical and emotional health, spiritual strength, and good citizenship.

"With more children than ever before growing to maturity," Mrs. Moorhead points out, "more dedicated parents and teachers than ever before are needed in the PTA."

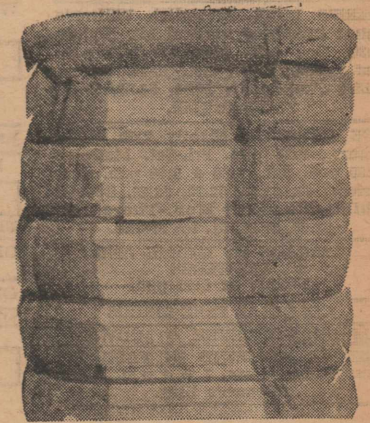
