Record Vote Expected Tuesday

Funeral Service Held Last Sunday For Former Local Baptist Pastor

Funeral services were held last Sunday afternoon in the First Baptist Church at Vernon for Rev. Claude Withrow, former pastor of the Baptist Church here in Quitaque. Rev. Withrow died about 5 p. m. Friday in a Vernon hospital following a brief illness.

He was stricken while visiting in the home of a daughter, Mrs. Dorothy McAlister, who resides in Vernon.

Services were conducted at 3 p. m. with Rev. H. T. Harris of Childress, retired Baptist minister officiating, assisted by Rev. J. C. Wade, pastor of Pearl St. Baptist Church in Vernon.

Burial was in East View Memorial Park under the direction of Henderson Funeral Home of Vernon. Honorary pallbearers were deacons and ministers of his former pastorates.

Rev. Withrow, a native of Cleveland, Tenn., served as pastor of churches in Vernon, Eldorado, Okla., Bethel, Okla., Wichita Falls, Lakeview, Quitaque and Lockett. He was pastor at Goodlett at the time of his death. He was pastor of the local church during the mid-1950's.

He attended Wayland College in 1930, Baylor University in 1941 and Oklahoma Baptist U. in 1942.

He was married to Miss Velma Hundley of Hollis in Hollis, Okla. Nov. 27, 1927.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. McAlister of Vernon and Mrs. Beth Fox of Urbana, Ill.; four grandchildren; three brothers, Howard of Lubbock, John of Sudan, and Lloyd of Lockney; four sisters, Mrs. Etter Gunn of Sudan, Mrs. Wilma Grantham of Lockney, Mrs. Delia Taylor of Canton and Mrs. Zora William of Lubbock.

Now for the facts:

In the four big-city counties surrounding Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth,

there were 1,182,976 qualified voters. This spring, only 38 percent—or 452,135—voted.

In the 231 so-called rural counties, there were 1,132,067 Texans eligible to vote and 769,697 voted. That's nearly 69 percent.

In the middle counties, described as urban because of their population, the percentage was 51.5 percent. Out of 794,224 voters, 409,321 went to vote.

That's a mighty fine record. But since politics has been pretty steamed up in the big cities, we folks in the country are going to have to double-up this fall in our voting turnout.

So tie a string around your finger—don't forget to vote next Tuesday! Vote for the candidate of your choice—but be SURE to vote.

Local Teams Looking For First Win

Quitque's Panthers and Pantherettes are still winless in the young basketball season, both teams losing two games each in games played Friday and Tuesday nights.

The teams journeyed over to Quail last Friday night and the Pantherettes lost 29-42 after threatening to make a game of it for a period and a half.

The Panthers, however played a terrific game before being nudged 69-63 in a fast, hard-fought game.

Tuesday night the teams took on the Owls and Owllets at Hedley in a return match and once again lost to the Hedley teams.

The Pantherettes were beaten 43-27 while the Panthers were once again nosed out by a 6-point margin, 46-52.

Deborah McKay led the Pantherette scoring attack against Quail with 15 points. The Bobwhites pulled away to an 8-2 lead at the end of the first period, only to see the Pantherettes rally and score 6 straight points to tie the count at 8-8 and again at 10-10, but from

that point the Quitaque team fell farther behind and it was no contest from then on.

Barbara Reagan was runner-up in the scoring with 7 points, Patricia Brunson made 6 points and Lynette Taylor made one free toss.

Starting guard Brenda Whittington was lost to the team for the season during the second quarter when she suffered a knee injury. Brenda is a senior. Her loss will hurt the team, already having a rough time getting in the groove.

The Panther-Quail will have to be one of the most exciting game that will be played this year.

The Quails have at least three starters back from last year's district champions and everyone on that team was shooting hot Friday night. However, the boys from Quitaque came to play and matched them shot for shot during the first half, the score being tied nine times during the first two periods. The Quails led 28-25 at halftime.

The Panthers hit a cold streak at the beginning of the

fourth period and the Quails built up a 12 point lead but the lads from Quitaque refused to fold and battled back to within six points at the final whistle. Given another two or three minutes of play and the Panthers might have won it for the Quails seemed to be tiring in the fading minutes of the game for the Panthers had applied pressure the entire game and were still going strong at the end.

Coach Gene King stuck with his five starters of Johnson, Merrell, Tipton, Monk and Stephens and all five played well. Jamie Johnson played a terrific game, hitting the bucket for 24 points to spark the Quitaque lads. Eddie Monk hit for 15 points, Warren Lee Merrell hit his stride in this game and racked up 12 points, Monte Stephens tossed in 12 points and Tipton made 4 points. The Quails' Dale Morris, who gets higher off the floor than anyone should, won scoring honors for the night with 29 points.

The entire Quail team were hitting real well Friday night and it would have taken a very fine team to beat them that night and the Panthers almost pulled the trick.

We might add here that the Quails beat McAdoo a week earlier by the same 6 point margin by which they won over the Panthers. However, according to a newspaper account of that game, the Quails were not hitting too well against McAdoo.

At Hedley Tuesday night the story was quite different for both the Pantherettes and Panthers did not play as well as was expected. However, this should have been looked for because Quitaque teams never play well at Hedley from some cause. Last years Panthers had to scramble from behind to eke out a win.

The Pantherettes played their poorest game of the season at Hedley as nothing seemed to work for them. The Pantherettes hustle, make no mistake, but thus far they just haven't been able to get the job done. They will probably start to click after a bit, however, and live up

to what was expected of them. Deborah McKay again led the scoring for the Pantherettes. Patricia Brunson chalked up 7 points, Barbara Reagan, 2 and Carol Myers made 3 points.

Donna Bedwell, Jill Johnson and Shirley Dowd started at guard. Charlene Bailey went in at guard during the second period and played most of the remainder of the game.

At one point in the game Coach King had three freshmen in the lineup and all three girls are fine prospects. They are Shirley Dowd, Carol Myers and Lynette Taylor.

The Panthers had their bad moments at Hedley Tuesday night, also. They weren't as sharp as they were at Quail, especially scoring-wise. The boys from Quitaque played on even terms for the first period and trailed by only four points, 10-14 at the end of the period. The Owls increased their lead to 29-21 at halftime. At the end of three periods of play the Owls led 46-33 but the Panthers, sparked by Lonnie Mc-

Donald, rallied to within six points as time ran out.

The Panthers outshot the Owls from the floor, making 18 field goals to the Owls 15. The difference was in the free throw department, the Owls making 22 to the Panthers 10.

Eddie Monk dropped 12 tallies for the Panthers, Merrell 7, Johnson and McDonald 6 each, Monte Stephens 10, and Tipton 5. Nestor Cavazos did not score. Merrell and Tipton fouled out in the fourth period.

Friday night the teams go to Sannorwood for a pair of games and then next Tuesday night the local teams host the McAdoo teams in a pair of games. The Quitaque McAdoo rivalry has developed into one of the hottest in this part of the state. There will be no let-up of this rivalry Tuesday night and the games should be good.

Fans are urged to vote for the candidates of their choice earlier in the day, then go out and see their favorite basketball teams win over McAdoo!

The USDA cooperates with food and livestock industries in intensive eat more beef promotion. Beef production is at record levels, and per capita consumption this year is likely to reach 100 lbs., five more than in 1963.

2. Special beef purchase program began March 2 to channel more frozen and canned beef—choice and lower grades—into school lunches and to feed needy families. Purchases thru Oct. 1 were 257 million lbs., cost \$145 million. Funds come through Sec. 32, P. L. 320— from duties U. S. collects on imports.

3. Export markets are being sought in an intensive Government-industry effort, and are expected to show three-fold increase over 1963 level this year. Exports won't be subsidized.

4. Food for Peace Program is helping utilize big beef supplies. First P. L. 480 contracts to Shili, Israel and United Arab Republic are for 40 million lbs., to be paid for in foreign currency and/or on long-term credit for dollars.

5. Defense Department is buying more beef in U. S. for bases here and abroad.

6. Voluntary agreements with Australia, New Zealand and Mexico, and changes in the supply-demand situation reduced U. S. imports of beef 19% the first 7 months of this year compared to 1963 period. Imports for year are forecast 25% percent below 1963.

7. New meat import quota law (P. L. 88-482 signed by president on Aug. 22) will provide means of limiting future imports.

8. Expanded Food Stamp Program (law signed by president on Sept. 1) will improve beef buying power of many low income families. USDA economists estimate that if income of all families now below \$3,000 per year were raised to that figure national beef consumption would be increased 3 1/2%.

9. Hazard of forced sales of livestock during period of severe drought in many areas of the Nation has been offset by several actions: (1) making available grazing and having privileges on lands retired from pro-

duction under supply adjustment programs; (2) sales of CCC-owned grain at reduced prices in certain emergency situations; (3) providing emergency loans to buy feed, seed, etc., in designated areas where natural disasters have brought needs for credit which can't be met by private lenders.

10. Cattlemen who have participated regularly in ACP cost-sharing to build better pastures, improve water facilities can clearly see benefits of continuing conservation practices when drought strikes. In more favored areas they gain in many obvious ways, plus the ability to carry calves longer on grass while awaiting more favorable market.

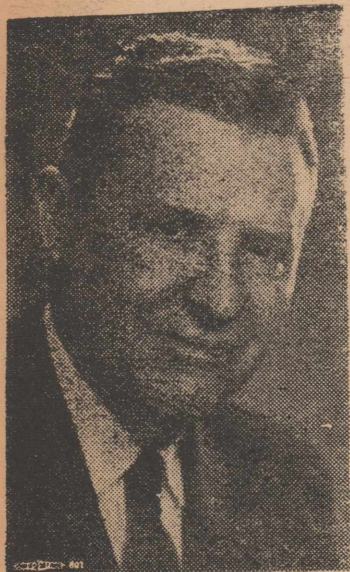

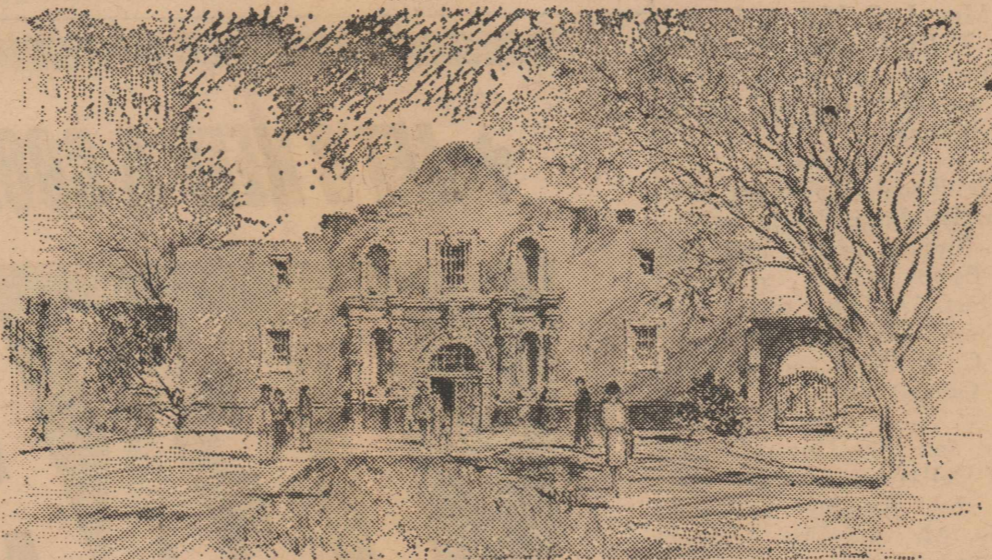
