Funeral services for Edgar Thomas Lyons, 74, of Truth or Consequences, N. M., were held at 2:30 last Saturday, Oct. 31 in the Methodist Church here. The Rev. Al Jennings officiated at the service.

Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery under the direction of the Quitaque Funeral Home.

Mr. Lyons died at 12:30 a. m. Thursday in an El Paso hospital where he had been a patient for about two months.

He was born September 9, 1880 in Kentucky. He was married to Miss Bess Simmons Dec. 22, 1923 in Sioux City, Iowa. They made their home in Laurnes, Iowa, where he was a grain elevator owner and operator until he retired in 1960 and moved to Texas. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Laurnes for 40 years.

Survivors include his wife, Bess; two brothers, Claude of Glasgow, Ky., and Lee R. of Louisville, Ky.; two sisters, Mrs. Guy Taylor and Mrs. Tommy Lawson, both of Glasgow.

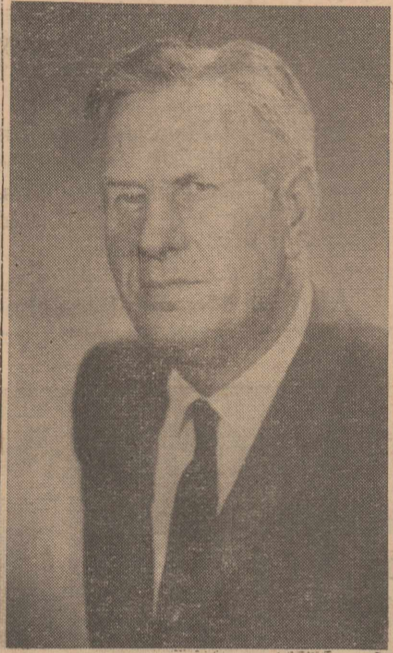

He is Gil Lamb, who is presently partner-manager of KMUL radio station in Muleshoe. He is a former actor and musician with the Harley Sadler Show, which were very popular in this part of the country during the 1930's. After losing many jobs in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico because of drink, he went to California where he had a chance to go on a national radio show, but that fell through because of one drink. For twenty years Mr. Lamb just drifted, trying, but failing to stop his drinking.

In 1952 a miracle happened. His story will be told in his talk on Sunday morning, entitled, "One Man's Battle With the Bottle." In 1957 he was chosen as Muleshoe's outstanding man of the year. He has spoken from California to New York City. He is a member of the Methodist Church and many civic clubs in Muleshoe. Everyone is invited to come and hear his story.

WEST TEXAS STATE EXES TO MEET IN LUBBOCK SATURDAY

Ex-Students of West Texas State University living in the Lubbock and South Plains area will hold an informal get-together, Saturday, November 7, prior to the West Texas State-Texas Tech football game.

Various representatives of the University and the West Texas State Ex - Student Association will be on hand for the get-together slated from 3 until 5 o'clock in the Blue Room (205-206) of the Tech Union.

Approximately 5,000 West Texas State fans from the Amarillo-Canyon area are expected to attend the 7:30 o'clock football game.

Quitaque and Briscoe County followed the national voting trend in Tuesday's General Election by giving the Johnson-Humphrey ticket their solid choice by a more than 2 to 1 margin. Quitaque and the remainder of the county went strongly for all Democratic candidates on the ballot.

Locally, Mrs. Bertha Pavlicek easily won her race for the office of County and District Clerk.

Ralph Yarborough was figured to perhaps encounter some trouble against his opposition but he won rather handily in this county. And in spite of some rather ridiculous campaigning by his opponent, Walter Rogers was returned to office as Congressman of this district. Voters apparently feel that he can do a better job of representing the district by remaining near Washington and the seat of our government than by spending his time back home at Pampa.

Ralph Wayne, running for State Representative, was the top man at the polls here in Quitaque, drawing 298 votes over his Republican opponent.

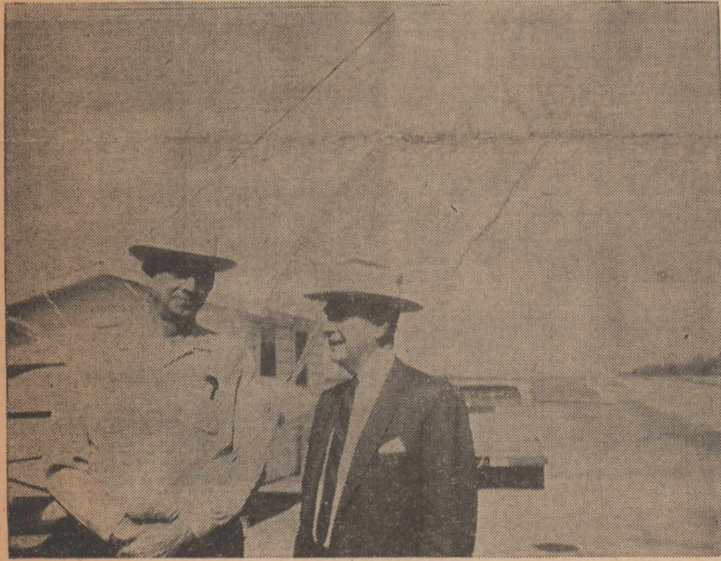
BRISCOE COUNTY ASC OFFICIALS TO ATTEND AUSTIN MEETING

Panthers Win One

Quitaque's basketball teams continue to seek a winning combination, the two teams thus far managing to win only one of ten games played.

Last Friday night at Samnorwood, the Panthers broke into the win column for the first time this season and looked as

if they might be on their way to brighter days as they fought off a second half surge by the Eagles to win 56-50. The Pantherettes, after starting slow, also picked up some steam in the second half to make a game of their tussle with the Eaglettes before bowing 43-52.

Tuesday night the local teams hosted the McAdoo High teams and Quitaque lost both games of that doubleheader. The Pantherettes were defeated 41-54 and Panthers went down by a 51-61 margin.

At Samnorwood Friday night the Eaglettes threatened to blow the visitors right off the floor, only to see them keep plugging away and come from way back to narrow the gap to the final nine points. In fact, after the first three minutes the Pantherettes outscored the Norwood team, because the score was 12-2 after three minutes of action. At several points during the game the Eaglettes pushed their lead to near 20 points. It was final period, the Panthers never trailed. The Quitaque boys started to click in final quarter but they had waited too long and time ran out on them.

Scoring wise in the Samnorwood games, Deborah McKay was tops with 18 points, with Patricia Brunson hitting for 17, Barbara Reagan and freshman Carol Myers each making 4 points. For the Panthers it was Eddie Monk who was shooting hot and he accounted for 24 points. Monte Stephens hit for 11 points; Larry Tipton and Jamie Johnson each tallied 9 points and Warren Lee Merrell rounded out the scoring with three points.

In the McAdoo games Barbara Reagan was high for the Pantherettes with 17 points. Patricia Brunson had 13 for the night, Carol Myers 6 and Deborah McKay, 5 points. McAdoo's Moore won scoring honors for the night with 29 points.

For the Panthers it was Eddie Monk who led the scoring with 12 points. Monte Stephens closely followed with 11 and Jamie Johnson was next with 10 points. Larry Tipton tossed in 7 points, Warren Lee Merrell who got into early foul trouble had 5 points, Nestor Cavazos, fine little freshman prospect made 4 points and Lonnie McDonald made a pair of free tosses for 2 points.

The local teams host the Samnorwood teams Friday night, and go to McAdoo for a pair of games next Tuesday.

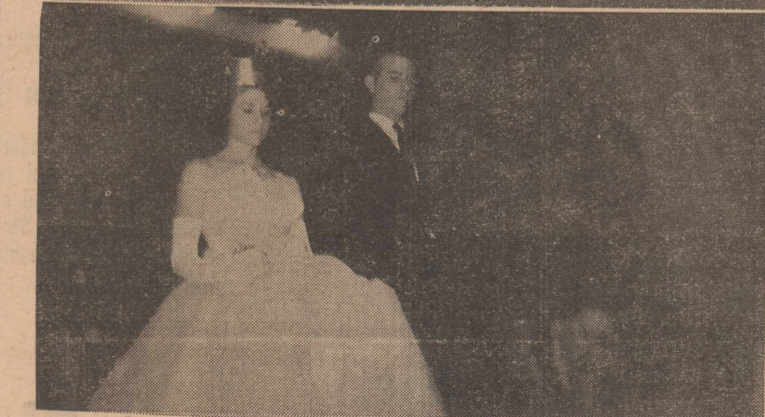

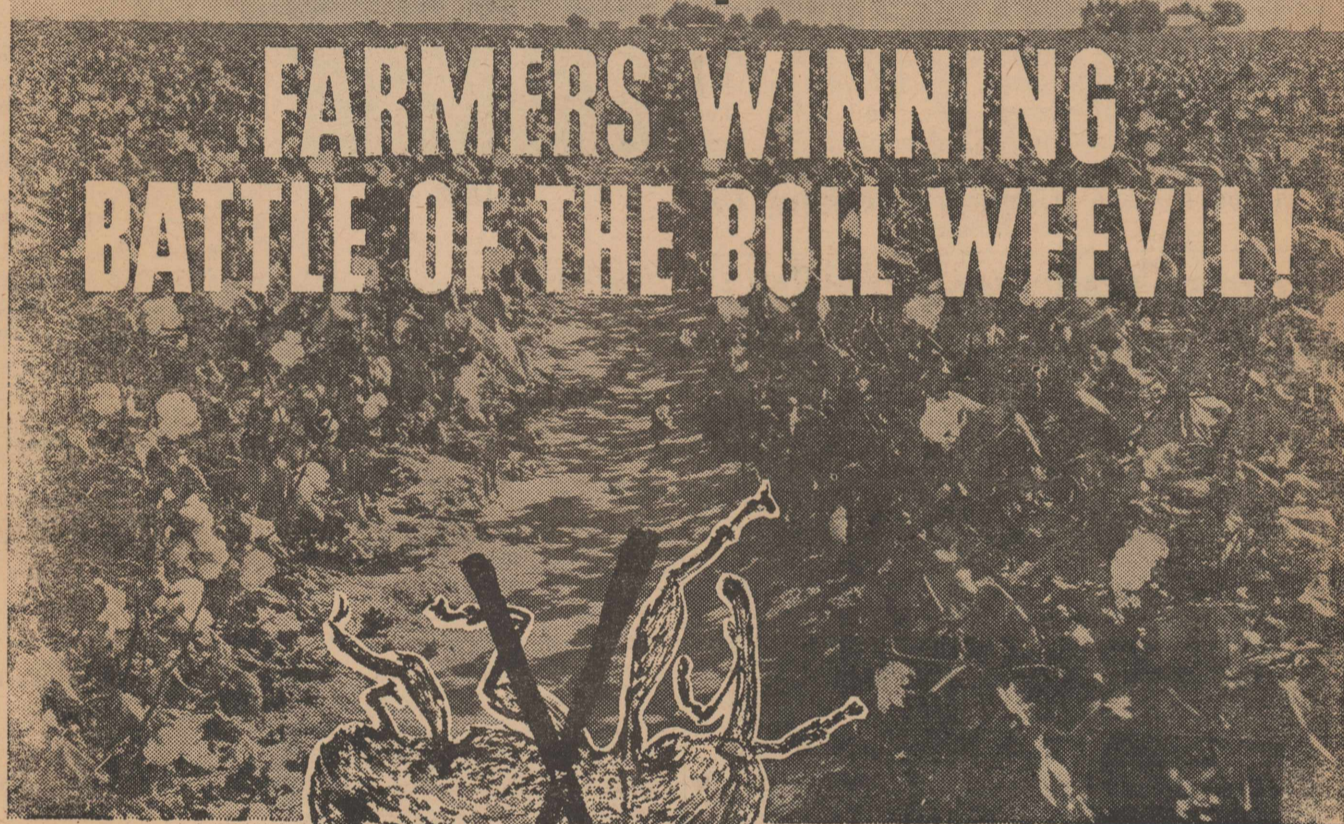

FARMERS WINNING BATTLE OF THE BOLL WEEVIL!



BATTLE RECORD TO DATE

SPRAYING	ACRES SPRAYED	COMMENT
Number 1 (Beginning Sept. 15)	303,000 acres (Originally estimated 240,000 acres. Total includes Skip-row)	First application was hampered by rain, wind, etc. Migrating weevils caused increase in size of control zone. Extremely high adult and unemerged weevil populations encountered.
Number 2 (Beginning about October 4)	281,000 acres (Reduction due to acreage desiccated or harvested)	Field checks indicated effective kill of adult weevils but continuing emergence kept new weevil population up. Additional planes brought in to speed up sprayings.
Number 3 (Beginning about October 13)	230,000 acres (Continuing harvest and desiccation)	Field examination showed great reduction in number of adult weevils, with low occurrence of weevils in diapause stage. Also fewer unemerged weevils.
Number 4 (Beginning about October 21)	190,000 acres	Few unemerged and very young weevils left. Practically no weevils in diapause stage.

CONCLUSION: Remaining unemerged and young adult weevils will be kept from going into hibernation either by frost or a fifth spraying. Entomologists agree that hibernating weevils will have been reduced by more than 90 percent by end of this year's program.

Financial Arrangements

- Compresses to collect 50c per bale, and remit to a special boll weevil control fund in bank — no connection with P.C.G. regular funds.
- While compresses collect on all cotton, the contribution is voluntary for individual farmers who may request and receive refund.
- All funds are under direction of a Certified Public Accountant firm.
- Monthly financial reports by U.S.D.A. and Boll Weevil Steering Committee will be made — Complete audit will be published at the end of season.
- Any unexpended Steering Committee funds will be placed in interest bearing account for continuation of Boll Weevil Program next season. Unexpended U.S.D.A. funds must return to Treasury, as all appropriations are on annual basis only.

**SCHOOL ENROLLMENT UP
IN FLOMOT SCHOOL SYSTEM**

The Flomot Independent School System enrolled 106 students the first day of school and 146 at the end of the first six-week period. This is slightly better than 7 percent increase over 1963, according to Supt. A. J. Barron.

The average daily attendance was 118, compared to 110 for the same period in 1963. This compares with a low of 71 in 1960-61. Flomot's trend is for growth while many other schools in this area are losing average daily attendance.

Supt. A. J. Barron tends to explain this growth to the qualifications of the faculty. Six of the eight members of the faculty have masters degrees, and only one person is teaching outside of his major field.

**NAMED CREW LEADER
FOR 1964 CENSUS
OF AGRICULTURE**

W. V. Swinburn of Tulia has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Percy R. Millard, director of the regional office of the U. S. Bureau of the Census at Dallas, has announced. The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U. S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Briscoe County to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators. Enumeration of all farms in the county will take place in November and early December.

The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce,

will mail census questionnaires to all rural boxholders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leader is a key person in conducting a Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules their work, reviews the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventories, and information on farm equipment and improvement and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published starting in 1965 for counties, states and the Nation.
