If marketing quotas are approved, marketing penalties will apply to any excess cotton of growers who exceed their farm's these voting is necessary in or- effective allotments. Price Supder to put the quotas into ef- port (at a level within 65 to 90 percent of parity) will be available to growers who do not exceed their effective allotmenits, and additional pricesupport payments will be made to growers who voluntarily reduce their cotton acreage to the. farm's domestic allotment. (In general, the farm marketing quota — which a farmer may market free of penalty - is the production from the farm's effective acreage allotment).

If quotas are not approved, the regular allotment program will remain in effect, and price support at 50 percent of parity will be available to growers who do not exceed their effective allotments. Without quotas, the domestic allotment program providing additional price-support payments would not be in effect.

Marketing quotas for the Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hunter 1964 crop of upland cotton were approved by 94 percent of warming at their new home in the growers voting in a referendum in December, 1963.



Perfect Partner for Steak



Families in the rice producing states (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas) like big, thick, juicy steaks just as much as families in other parts of the country. But what they like to eat with their steak may differ from the steak accompaniments served elsewhere.

served elsewhere. As you may have guessed, rice is a frequent partner for steak in the southern states which produce most of the rice used in this country. For example, Mushroom-Almond Rice, a favorite recipe from the files of a Texas homemaker, is often served with steak, and with roast beef, too. It is a savory mixture of rice cooked in beef bouillon with onion then mixed with sauteed almonds and mushrooms, and it takes lots less time to prepare than it does to broil a thick beef steak. Indeed, families of the men who produce rice in this country like to eat rice in every conceivable way and rice is kept on hand at all times, uncooked and cooked — the latter stored in their refrigerators and home freezers. They know how easy it is to cook rice and how simple it is to reheat refrigerated and frozen rice. The magic 1-2-1 method of cooking rice, originated in the

rice. The magic 1-2-1 method of cooking rice, originated in the rice belt, is as follows: Combine 1 cup regular milled white rice, 2 cups water, and 1 teaspoon salt in a saucepan. Heat to boiling, stir once, cover, lower heat. Simmer 14 minutes. Do not peek. To reheat cooked rice, add 2 tablespoons liquid to each cup and cook, covered, for 4 to 5 minutes.

Mushroom Almond Rice 1 cup chopped onions 4 tablespoons butter or ¹/₄ teaspoon pepper ¹/₂ cup sliced almonds ¹ can (4¹/₂ oz.) sliced margarine 1 cup uncooked rice 2 cups beef bouillon

Cook onions in 2 tablespoons butter until tender. Add rice and continue cooking until golden. Add bouillon and pepper. Stir well. Heat to boiling. Cover pan, reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes or until liquid is absorbed. Saute almonds and mush-rooms in remaining butter. When rice is tender, add almonds and mushrooms and toss lightly. Makes 6 servings.






