

game increased. Two years earlier, in 1928, a crowd of only 80. fans, witnessed a game between the Chicago Bears and the New York Giants, the same two teams that in last year's NFL championship game drew tens of thousands of sports fans. Today millions of fans attend National millions of fans attend National Football League games each
