The Rules Committee, considered by many the major House Committee, is composed of only eleven members. These members will have jurisdiction over the rules of the House, the Joint Rules, and all amendments proposed to either; and it has the special duty to assist in expediting the business of the House, and to assist the Speaker when called on by him, in deciding the recogniton for suspensions and such other matters concerning the Rules and orderly pro cedure of the House as might be assigned by the Speaker.

This melt-in-vour-mouth pineapple cheese cake heart carries its own special Valentine message. A rich cream cheese filling, baked in a graham cracker crust, is topped with a golden crushed pine apple glaze. The cool, refreshing flavor of canned pineapple is just right for this festive dessert. Serve it in a setting of hearts and flowers for a special Valentine Day party.

Keep the recipe handy to use year 'round. A regular cheese cake pan may be used instead of the heart shaped mold.

DELUXE PINEAPPLE CHEESE CAKE

2 cups fine graham cracker 3 eggs

34 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar 3 (8-ounce) packages cream

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin 1 (1-pound 41/2-ounce) can crushed pineapple

Blend together graham cracker crumbs, butter and 2 tablespoons sugar; press firmly in bottom and sides of heart shaped pan or mold. Thoroughly beat cream cheese with eggs, 34 cup sugar and vanilla; pour into graham cracker crust. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Chill. Invert onto lightly greased cooky sheet, then onto serving plate. Sprinkle gelatin over % cup syrup drained from pineapple; place over low heat stirring until gelatin dissolves. Cool until slightly thickened. Spoon drained pineapple over cake top and spread with gelatin glaze. Chill thoroughly, Makes 1 cheese cake.
