Bailey County Planters Busy After Section-Wide Rainfall

Hundreds of planters were going in Bailey County this week following a rain Sunday which covered a large portion of this section and brought sufficient planting moisture. It was the first time such a condition has existed this year and farmers quickly took advantage of the situation to get their fields seeded. Although too late for cotton, there is ample time for feed crops to be made.

At Muleshoe precipitation amounted to .96 inch. Heavier rains are reported north and east, south and southeast of town with the heaviest fall reported in Needmore community, from 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 inches and in Lazbuddy and Big Square communities where the fall was 1 to 1 1/2 inches.

West and southwest of Muleshoe the rain was lighter. West Camp had only a light rain. Stegall reported one half inch and Balleboro one half to three quarters.

Circleback had fine rains as did Bula and Enochs. The fall extended to Morton on the south.

Sunday's rain covered a large territory and while the drought is not broken, the situation has been relieved.

Local seed men reported a rush on their stocks of seed Monday as farmers prepared to plant every acre they can while moisture is available.

Goodrich Store For Muleshoe

A Goodrich store will be established in Muleshoe in the near future by W. M. Pool, II, and Randolph Johnson, both local boys.

The building, formerly occupied by Muleshoe Coffee Shop on Main Street is being refitted now for the new store.

The store, to be owned by the two men, who are brothers-in-law, will handle the Goodrich line of automobile supplies, tires, household items, etc. as well as kindred lines of other merchandise.

Merchandise already has been ordered, and the store opening date now depends upon the remodeling work on the building and arrival of merchandise, but the two men hope to be open by the latter part of July.

School Site Vote Held Saturday

A majority of voters favored the south site for the new high school building in the preference election held last Saturday. There were 149 for the south site, 120 favored the west site.

Fairview community did not vote. The officials could find no one to hold the election, consequently the box there was not open for the election.

Can I join the Auxiliary? You are eligible if you are:

1. The mother, wife, sister or daughter of a member of the American Legion.
2. The mother, wife, sister or daughter of a man or woman who was killed or died while serving in World War I or II.
3. The mother, wife, sister or daughter if a veteran of either war who has died since discharge from war service.
4. Yourself a woman veteran of World War I or II.

Local Road Work To Begin In Next 60 Days

VENEZUELA DAIRYMEN VISIT MULESHOE PLANTS AND FARMS

Raphael Urdaneta of Maracibo, Venezuela and George Rojas of Caracas, Venezuela spent the weekend as guests of J. K. Adams, county agricultural agent. Mr. Urdaneta was a student of dairy husbandry at Texas A and M with our agent from 1927 to 1941. Mr. Rojas is now enrolled in the graduate department at Texas A and M working toward a Master's degree in dairy production. Both men are leaders in dairying in South America. Urdaneta having a milking herd of fifteen hundred mature cows. The cows obtain their entire ration from 8,000 acres of irrigated native grasses which remain green the entire year. A butter and ice cream plant owned and operated by Urdaneta processes the milk from the Urdaneta and adjoining herds.

The visitors were extremely interested in the irrigation projects around Muleshoe and made many stops for close inspection of alfalfa fields.

The McAdams dairy and the Malone creamery also came in for close inspection and favorable comment. Hoace McAdams was told that he had the nearest and most practical dairy enterprise they had visited in their many stops in Texas.

The county agent accompanied the visitors on a tour of registered dairy herds Monday afternoon. Highlight of the trip being a visit to the Chester Eliff herd at Tulia where several state and national champion milk producing Jersey Cows were appraised.

Urdaneta plans to return to South America soon with his third group of registered bulls and Poland China hogs which he will use to further improve his native stock in South America.

W. M. Pool, II, Is Discharged By Navy

W. M. Pool, II, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Pool, Jr., has been honorably discharged from the U. S. Navy after serving thirty months. He was a seaman, first class.

He served at Pearl Harbor, Guam, and at stations in Japan and China. He was aboard the sub-tender USS Holland. Pool enlisted January 31, 1944, on his eighteenth birthday.

He will be associated with a brother-in-law, Randolph Johnson, in the ownership and operation of the Goodrich store which they are now establishing here.

Muleshoe Lions Club was represented at the District 2-T Convention in Big Spring last week by Lee Pool, Rufus Gilbreath, Irvin St. Clair and Ty Young.

AUSTIN-June 25 Low bids for two Farm-to-Market roads in Bailey and Cochran Counties were announced Tuesday by the State Highway Commission.

Kay Williams of Midland submitted a low bid of \$72,578.28 for a 11 mile project on F. M. Highway 54 extending from Enochs to the Lamb County Line, connecting with the existing pavement into Littlefield. The proposal calls for grading, structures, flexible base and asphalt surface.

Kerr and Middleton of Lubbock was low with a \$48,065.62 bid for 6.7 miles of F. M. highway 596 connecting Maple in Bailey County with U. S. 290 into Morton. The Maple road proposal calls for grading, drainage, structures, roadbed treatment and asphalt construction.

It is estimated construction of the two projects will begin within 30 to 60 days, provided formal contracts are approved and executed by the Highway Commission and concurrence obtained from the Public Roads Administration.

The Bailey and Cochran County projects are two of 35 involving 281 miles of Texas Farm-to-Market road which bids are being received Tuesday and Wednesday. It is a part of the State Highway Department's three year \$60,000,000 Federal Road Program which together with school improvements to the primary highway system, will bring 62% of all Texas rural dwellings within one mile of paved road; 74% will be within two miles.

Through the June letting the Commission has asked for bids on 123 similar projects since the program was released for contracting in January. Eight of these roads have been completed and now serve the hundreds of farmers and ranchers living along them. Other areas rapidly nearing completion.

The first postwar Farm-to-Market project to be completed in the nation was in the Texas Panhandle. The Texas three-year program of 837 Farm-to-Market projects is nearly double that of any other state.

Hurst Purchases Magnolia Station

C. M. Hurst has purchased the Magnolia Service Station here in Muleshoe from C. L. Kersey and has assumed its management, changing the name to Hurst Service Station. He will continue to handle Magnolia products and expects to stock a complete supply of canned oil.

The station repairs tires and tubes, fixes flats, etc. It is located on Morton Highway, across from the telephone office.

Levelland Ready For Annual Rodeo

Levelland has taken on a colorful air this week in preparation for the July 3, 4 and 5 annual rodeo, with early reports pointing to record attendance for an outstanding show.

In addition to the regular events, a full three-day entertainment program has been planned by local committees. President W. J. Robertson of the Levelland Rodeo association said today. Afternoon shows will be presented all three days at 2 o'clock and night shows will begin at 8 o'clock July 3 and 4. Added prize money totals over \$1,850 in seven events. Saddle bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, bulldogging, steer riding and sponsor contests will find top cowboys and cowgirls competing in the Levelland show.

The entertainment program will include a pair of Fort Worth feminine trick riders and ropers, Miss Velda Tindall and Miss Effie Corbin, who have performed for major shows in Cheyenne, Wyo., and Madison Square Garden, New York City, and others, will present specially acts at all five performances.

Wiley McCray of Canadian, familiarly known as the "Canadian Kid," will be in the clown role.

Cecil Dykes Given Navy Discharge

Cecil Dykes, F 1/6, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Dykes of Farwell, received his honorable discharge from the Navy, June 8, at Camp Wallace, Houston, Texas.

He served with this branch of service for two years, overseas 1 1/2 years in the Pacific. He helped load and unload troops in Japan and other islands of the Pacific.

He attended Muleshoe high school and plans to finish his education at Portales.

Older Workers Are Advised On Status

Thursday, John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board in Lubbock, was in Muleshoe for the purpose of assisting persons who had questions regarding Social Security benefits, or who needed Social Security account number cards.

Any person who has worked enough in private industry and commerce to be insured under the old-age and survivors insurance program can file a claim at age 65 to peg his benefits at a point below which they cannot fall. Then, if he keeps working, or if he gets a new job, and his wage record would produce higher benefits at a later date, his benefits may be re-calculated to give him the higher rate.

Mr. Palmer pointed out that his office has been urging workers for some time to confer with the Social Security Board officials upon reaching the age of 65, in order to protect full benefit rights.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

A. W. Blaine

This column was written and submitted to The Journal for publication by Rev. A. W. Blaine, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Much of what is being done today in our complex world is based on the theory that the end justifies the means. On this basis many evils are tolerated and even encouraged which should be condemned as unchristian and vicious in their far-reaching results.

We hear much of the gambling craze that is sweeping our country. Not that we do not have anti-gambling laws, but that they are not being enforced. Such activities, even though the money thus raised is used for a worthy cause, creates disrespect for other laws as well as anti-gambling laws.

Many boys and girls get their first taste of gambling through lotteries and sale of chances sponsored by organizations that are supposed to be public-spirited and work for the highest interest of the community. Of course, many of those who tolerate or encourage such practices are definitely opposed to gambling, but thinking of what the money is to be used for they lose sight of what they are planting in tender and impressionable hearts. They also seem to forget that the principle of gambling is always the same, no matter what the money is used for.

Two small boys walked into a place where gambling devices were displayed and operated, paid five cents for a chance and won twenty-five dollars. They got something for nothing and with that idea in their hearts they may go on the rest of their lives trying to get something for nothing.

A question was raised as to laws prohibiting the display and operation of such devices. A citizen of that town remarked, "What can we do about such things when the school and even the churches sponsor sale of chances in order to raise money?"

Many people seek to justify gambling by saying that life is a gamble, anyway. They say that a farmer is gambling when he plants a crop. Let us note that the farmer, though he runs a risk, is not trying to get something for nothing, and that his gain will not be another's loss.

Let us keep in mind that the end does not justify the means and that God's Word does not approve a man who takes part in or tolerates such business. Those who sow in the field of gambling, regardless of what the money is used for, will reap a harvest of broken lives. Christians, wake up! Keep yourselves unspotted from the world.

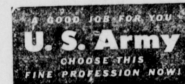

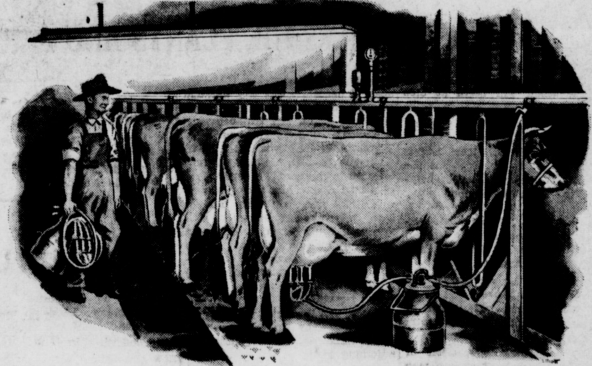

CALL FOR CANNERS

College Station, June 25—More home food preservation than ever before is being urged as food insurance for the coming winter and spring. Gwendolyn Jones, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, reports that this year's goal is to exceed the record of four billion jars of food canned by 25 million housewives in one war year.

To safeguard American diets during the months to come when wheat products will continue to be in less than full supply, more vegetables especially will be needed to replace some of the food values and the "filling" quality of the wheat that goes abroad. The more garden vegetables that are put up in homes and in community canning centers the better the food insurance for this country.

Prospects so far are for good vegetable and fruit crops this season but production predicted so early in this season can rise or fall as weather hurts or helps the crops. Adequate supplies of glass jars, jars and closures are expected. The supply of pressure canners has been increasing steadily. Housewives are advised, however, to lay in supplies of containers and equipment now to enable manufacturers to gauge demand and keep up production as needed.

CHERRIES KEEP BEST WHEN COOL AND DRY

Try to use cherries as soon as possible after purchase. Meanwhile, keep them in a cool dry place. Moisture and heat lead to rapid spoilage.

Cherries will keep better if they are not washed until just ready to be used. If you do not wash them, drain and dry them thoroughly. Then spread in shallow pan and keep in the refrigerator.

Sidelights From Washington

It would, of course, be incorrect to assume that primary elections in all states will be held this year on July 27, the date set for the Texas primary. The fact is that as of the date this is being written, June 27, primary elections have already been held in 18 states, involving a total of 213 seats in Congress. A total of four members of Congress have been defeated in the primary elections held thus far.

The earliest primary was held on April 9 in the state of Illinois. Primaries were held in Massachusetts and Michigan this week. On Monday the primary will be held in Maryland, Mississippi and Oklahoma hold their primaries on July 2.

Yesterday afternoon the House passed the War Department Appropriation Bill. This bill was writ-

ten by the eight-man committee of which I am a member. We devoted six weeks to the job of conducting the hearings, writing the bill and passing it through the House. It required a printed volume of 1183 pages to record the testimony of the witnesses.

The bill involved more money than any bill presented to Congress this year, and we felt that six weeks of work was not too long a time to devote to such important matters as were involved in deciding how much money should be spent for national defense by the War Department during the next twelve months.

In my remarks in the House of Representatives, I discussed in some detail the program of research and development, particularly with respect to aviation. I said:

"If this committee has its way, you will find that our Nation, which is already out in front in the field of aviation, will go forward, ahead of the parade, in order that we may be more secure in the future and

that no nation will dare challenge us at some future time. While we talk of money, airplanes, weapons, and research and development, we realize that military might alone cannot insure peace and security of this nation and the world."

This is the fourth major bill which I have helped write in Committee and pass through the House this year.

The Hobbs Anti-Racketeering bill, which passed the House months ago, was finally approved last night by the Senate. It now goes to the White House. The measure prohibits violence in Industry-Labor controversies involving interstate commerce.

The present law permits a United States national debt of 200 billion dollars. This is the first time that the Federal Government has taken such a step in a number of years.

Roughages Can Fill The Gap In Feed Supplies

COLLEGE STATION, Plenty of good roughage is about two-thirds of the job of feeding a dairy cow and G. G. Gibson, dairymen for the A. and M. College Extension Service, urges use of more good home-grown roughage. With supplies of concentrates short and the prices high, every effort should be made to replace as many pounds as possible with good roughage.

Highest quality hay is pasture with the water taken out so that it can be stored until needed. This means that hay should be harvested at as near the best stage for grazing as possible.

The difficulty lies in the small yield obtained at this stage which is best for grazing. By allowing the plants to reach the point where they are beginning to bloom, more tonnage will be obtained without sacrificing too much feed value. The man who wants to harvest hay until the plants have matured loses very much feed value although the yield might be higher. The season yield will be less, however, because plants cut when mature will not keep growing as plants cut earlier will do.

Although it does not take the place of hay and pasture, silage can be used to advantage on every farm. Silage is another source of cheap nutrients which can replace some of the high priced nutrients. The crop that yields the largest tonnage per acre should be used for silage. The better the feed that

goes into the silo, the better the silage that comes out. Three tons per cow will be good feed insurance when grazing is short.

PITTSBURGH, PA. — This bomb-like "flying eye," which helped win the battle of the Atlantic, will usher in a new era of oil exploration from the skies. Originated by Gulf Oil research as a magnetic detector for aircraft, it can "see" submarines hidden underwater — or "look through" the earth's crust to chart the underground magnetic structure. As the first practical airborne prospecting device, it opens to oil exploration hitherto inaccessible jungle, mountain and ocean regions; and will tremendously speed-up discovery of the world's remaining oil resources. 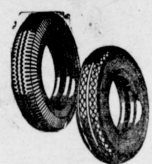

Naval Air Reserve Activated Monday

GLENVIEW, Ill., June 24—Thousands of Naval pilots and enlisted men, former combat airmen who have returned to civilian life, again associate themselves with the Navy Monday, July 1, when the Naval Air Reserve peacetime program for national air security is activated at 22 Naval Air Stations throughout the nation.

The national peacetime program for these men, who will spend approximately one day a week in refresher flight training, will be participated in by more than 6,000 Naval pilots and more than 20,000 enlisted men.

Open house will be the order of the day on all the 22 Naval Reserve air stations on Sunday, June 30. Additional information on the program will be given in a nation-wide broadcast over CBS network Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, EST, with ranking Navy officers and Movie Star Wayne Morris, one of the reserves who will be participating on the program.

Air groups which will furnish the flight personnel for inactive units of the fleet, will be kept in training on these stations so that in the event of another national emergency a potent Naval air striking force will be available within 30 days. Made up entirely of Reserves on inactive duty, the Naval Air Reserves will provide a "second team" to back up the regular units of the fleet.

Strategically located throughout the United States to serve the largest centers of population the air stations are situated in every section of the country. These stations are: Squantum, Mass., New York, N. Y., Willow Grove, Pa., Anacostia, D. C., Norfolk, Va., Jacksonville, Fla., Miami, Fla., Atlanta Ga., Grasse He. Mich., Glenview, Ill., Columbus, Ohio, St. Louis, Mo., Memphis, Tenn., New Orleans, La., Dallas, Texas, Olathe, Kans., Hutchinson, Kans., Minneapolis, Minn., San Diego, Calif., Los Alamitos, Calif., Livermore, Calif., Seattle Wash.

Men who participate in the regular part-time duties will be en-

listed in the Organized Reserve of the Navy and will be paid on the basis of their rank and rate for the time they serve.

In addition there will be a large group of inactive Reservists who will serve in the Volunteer Reserve without pay. They will not be on a

definite schedule and will report whenever possible to participate. Included will be both officers and enlisted men.

The stations where the Air Reserve program will be in operation are manned by a station keeper personnel, Reserves on active duty, who

are enjoying the privileges of active duty in the Navy but still are not subject to transfer to other stations.

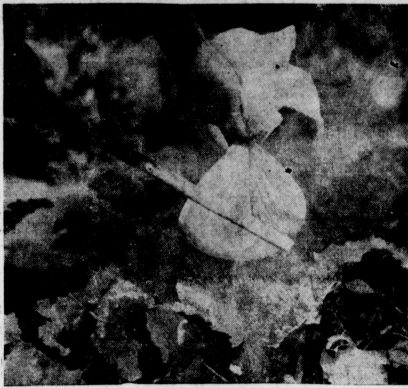

Spray or Dust — For 'Peace' In the Garden

Watch for destructive insects as soon as the first little leaves poke through the soil in your garden. They are unusually ravenous for tender young foliage, shoots, and buds, and the smart gardener will be on hand with the proper control even before the pests show up.

Two types of insect are well known nuisances—those that suck the juices or sap of the plant, as aphids or plant lice, and those that chew or bite off bits of the plant. The work of the first is seen in general droopingness and unhealthy appearance of the plant; the work of the second shows up in actual riddling of the leaves and other plant parts.

For sucking insects the spray or dust must hit and cover the insect, actually smothering it. Stomach poisons are required for destroying chewing insects. The material is dusted or sprayed thoroughly on all surfaces of the plant so as to make a deposit. When the insect starts to eat the plant, it also takes in some of the poison and is killed.

Either dusting or spraying can be effective if properly done with a good insecticide. Now that the war is over, many of the old brands and various new ones will be plentiful. You may want to adventure with some of the new ones, but always follow directions. In small gardens dusting is perhaps even easier than spraying. Here's a simple apparatus for applying insecticide dust which you yourself can easily prepare:

Take a square of cheesecloth, a strong string, and a slender stick. Spread the cheesecloth on a flat surface and pile the insecticide dust in

the center. Gather the cloth by the four corners and tie the string securely around it, leaving the contents resting loosely inside.

Hold the bag with one hand directly over the plant and strike it gently on one side with the stick (see illustration). Part of an old broom handle will do nicely. The dust should cover all parts of the plant. It will stick better if put on when the plants are moist with dew, rain, or water from the hose. Do not put it on just before a shower or your work will be useless. By taking a little extra care, the dust will reach the underside of the leaves as well as the upper surfaces. It is important to choose a day when no wind is stirring.

If you spray instead of dust, see that the leaves and other parts of the plant are dry so that the solution will not be diluted as it strikes the surface. A hand spray with a glass jar attached is simple to use. The glass can be readily cleaned after using, and strong solutions cannot corrode it as they might a metal container. In using a spray, the same as with a dust, be sure to reach the underside of the foliage where insects are even more likely to be feeding than on top.
