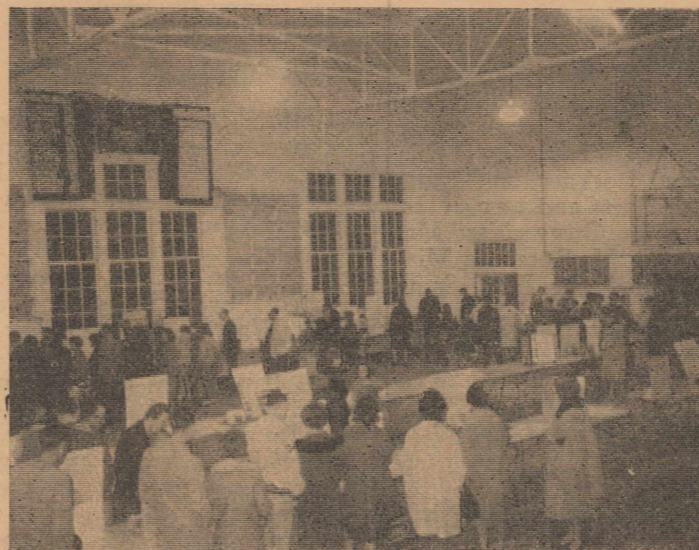
MRS. OLIVER CLARK IS HOME FROM HOSPITAL

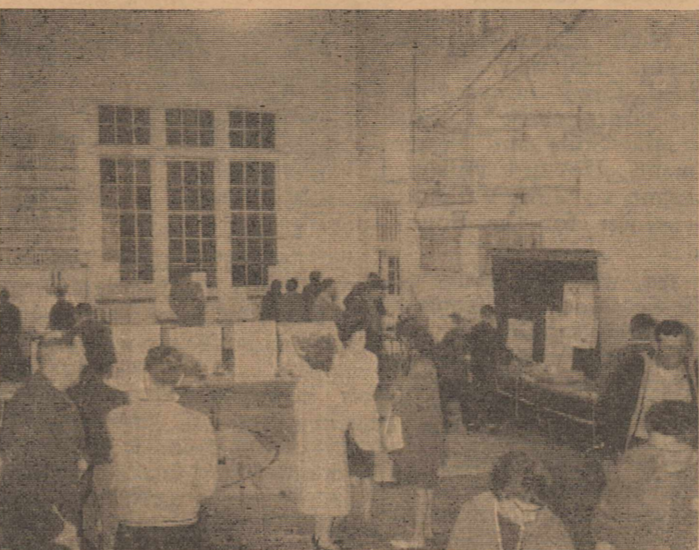
H. S. FOSTER OBSERVES 79TH BIRTHDAY THIS WEEK

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

The High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, Texas has added Dean Howard as Assistant Agronomist to its staff in the Soils and Water Department. Howard will be an assistant to Jim Valliant, water engineer for the Foundation.

Howard, who is a native of the Plainview and Hale County area, has been farming in the Finney Switch area since 1957. Dean received his B. S. in Agriculture from Abilene Christian College in Abilene in 1954. In December 1954, Howard entered the U. S. Army, where he spent a two year hitch of active duty.

After discharge from the service, Howard returned to the Plainview area, where he started farming north of Plainview. In 1962, Dean was the runner-up for the Area Young Farmer's Award, sponsored by the Plainview Young Farmers.

In speaking of the new addition to the staff, Dr. Earl H. Collister, Director of the Foundation said "Dean's experience as a local farmer and his college background will make him a very valuable member of our staff. The Department of Water here at the Foundation is the most important single department that we have and we are looking forward to Dean's assistance in finding some better ways to save water."

Dean, his wife Loma Faye, and their three boys live on their farm in the Finney Switch community.

JANUARY SAVINGS BOND REPORT

January Savings Bonds sales in Briscoe County totaled \$23,379, according to O. R. Stark, Jr., Chairman of the Briscoe Savings Bond Committee. This

represents 25.9 percent of the 1965 goal of \$90,000.

Briscoe County's 25.9 percent leads all other counties in Area I, percentage-wise.

In announcing the sales figures for the county the chairman pointed out that the rallying cry of this year's bond campaign is "Practical Patriotism."

"The purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds is 'practical' because it is easy and sure. It is patriotic because the purchase of bonds are a mark in the faith of our country and its future. 'Practical Patriotism' is just good common sense and I urge all the citizens of our county to buy bonds where they work or bank," the chairman said.

COTTON TRAILER BILL AWAITS GOVERNOR'S SIGNATURE

Cotton farmers across the state received good news from the Capitol last week with final passage of House Bill 11, increasing the gross weight on cotton trailers from 10,000 to 15,000 pounds. The measure, authored by Representative Ralph Wayne of Plainview, now awaits the Governor's signature. It provides that cotton trailers, used to haul seed cotton from the field to the gin, can now be loaded to capacity because of the increase in the gross weight.

Wayne stated "with the apparent termination of the bra-

cero program, it's necessary for use to assist the farmers in every way possible because of their pending increase in labor costs.

"The increased weight in the cotton trailer gross weight will allow our farmers to fully utilize the full capacity of our cotton strippers and to get the cotton out of the field to the gin early, and thereby avoid possible field deterioration."

Wayne's measure received full support of several statewide organizations, including the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union, Texas Independent Ginners, Texas Cotton Ginners, Texas Ginners Association, and the Plains Cotton Growers. Under his bill, there will be NO additional increase in the registration fee, and NO brakes will be required. The bill is expected to be signed into law by Governor Connally early this week.

THE THREAT TO FAMILY FARMING

"Don't let them sell us out!"

A Panhandle farmer wrote to me recently. Like many of our people, he senses a developing crisis in American agriculture. The crisis is developing because more and more non-farm Americans apparently are becoming convinced that the United States can get along very well without farmers. We are told that farmers as we have known them are not needed, that flesh-and-blood farmers, farmers with families and farm houses and mortgaged tractors, are inefficient, unproductive, a drain on the American taxpayer. We hear increasing talk that the solution to what these "experts" term the "farm mess" is to promote corporate farming. They say, in effect, that all of our farm problems could be solved if agricultural production were handled by corporate farms of vast acreage, their policies set by absentee boards of directors, their operations directed with cold and scientific efficiency by hired managers overseeing crews of specialists.

They prescribe the doom of rural America — not only of family farms and family farmers but also of the cities and towns which now serve primar-

ily as the distribution and trade centers for the Nation's farming areas.

The exodus from the farms of America has been going on for a generation. In 1940, there were 6,350,000 farms in our country. Now there are 3,500,000 farms. In ten years, the number of agricultural workers employed and the number of farms in the U. S. have declined by almost a third, and the decline in farm numbers has been mostly in small farms. In the past decade, well over half of all rural counties experienced a net loss of population. We all have seen this trend in our own Panhandle.

Should it continue at this pace, encouraged and accelerated by a combination of economic punishment and unwise government policy, the depopulation of rural America would be completed, as would the corporate takeover of American agriculture, in the lifetimes of boys no busy in 4-H and PFA activities. Now, today, only one of every ten boys growing up on American farms can expect to earn his living as a farm operator.

The challenge is to preserve and develop economic opportunity in rural America. The challenge is to enable people

who want to stay on the farm and in their home communities in rural America to make a decent living there. Farm programs enacted by Congress have been designated to this end, in recognition of the fact that before a hungry world America's agriculture is our greatest success story, and in recognition also of the fact that our free enterprise system is best exemplified by the family farm. Congress has NOT enacted farm programs as a handout, as welfare programs. The purpose has been to assist that segment of our economy most vulnerable to the abuses of industrialized segments to attain and maintain fair levels of income. And yet, each passing election returns to the House and Senate fewer and fewer members with any real comprehension of the meaning, worth and problems faced by our farmers. The shift of population has shifted representation to the cities and suburbs and away from rural America. In this 89th Congress, fewer than one-third of my colleagues in the House of Representatives

speak for districts in which more than half the population is classed as "rural."

The farmers, and the folks who supply their goods in nearby cities and towns, are suffering a loss of voice in Congress and in their State legislatures. Recent Supreme Court rulings hasten this trend. As I have in the past, I urge all of my friends in agriculture to be well aware of these shifts and to recognize that fights on behalf of the farmer are becoming more and more difficult to win in Congress. The days of the famous Congressional 'farm bloc' of the 1930's are dead and gone — and Congress is now dominated by the "big city bloc" with little sympathy and understanding for our rural people.

Thomas Jefferson called the farmers "the chosen people of God." I wish that more of our fellow Americans could see farmers in that light, could appreciate the wonderful bounty in food they provide, could help preserve strength, stability, and opportunity in rural America.

NO EXTENSION TO BE GRANTED FOR VEHICLE INSPECTION

There will be no extension of the Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection deadline of April 15, 1965, announced Captain Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, for this area.

"Only two million of the five and a quarter million vehicles registered in Texas have been inspected. This leaves over three million vehicles to be inspected in about five weeks," said Captain Johnson. Many thousands of vehicle owners can expect to wait in long lines in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline.

It is almost apparent now that many vehicle owners have waited too long for the inspection stations to safety inspect their vehicles by April 15. "Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 without a valid 1965 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law," stated the Captain.

The DPS supervisor said, "The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident, and by removing the link, prevent the accident."

TO THE RESIDENTS OF BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1965 for the passage of an Act Creating a Hospital District over Briscoe County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purpose and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

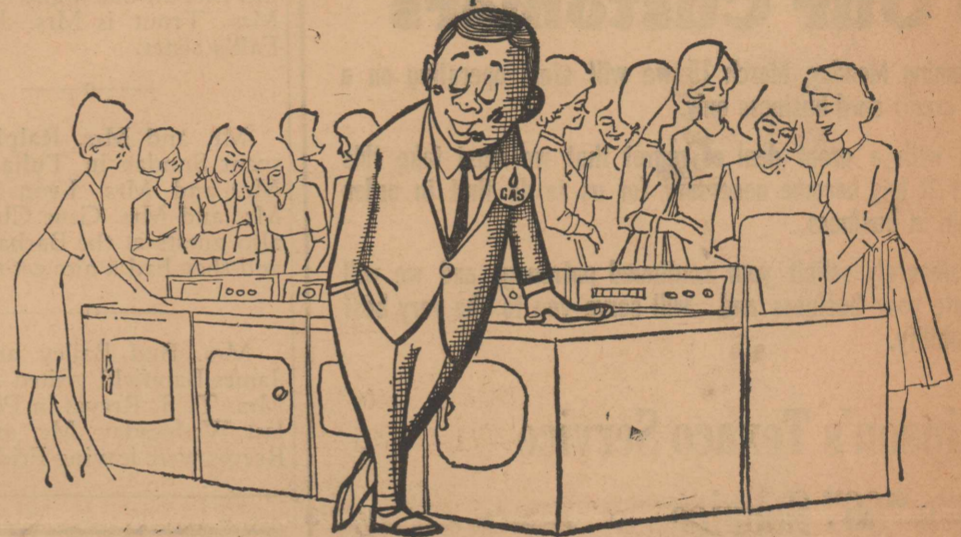
