

Soil Chemist C. D. Welch of Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service, says both forms of plant food have their advantages and disadvantages. They'll both get the job done if applied in the correct

amounts and by the recommended methods, he says. Since the same chemicals are used in both forms, major points of comparison, he says, should be the cost per unit of plant supplied and the convenience and cost of handling.

COTTON SEEDLING DISEASE

Cotton seedling disease causes more losses each year in Texas than any other single disease of cotton. And research shows it can be controlled by the use of in-furrow fungicides and good management practices, say plant pathologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The control program should start with the planting of only high quality seed. The pathologists suggest that cotton producers check with their local county agent for detailed information on the use of chemicals and management practices.

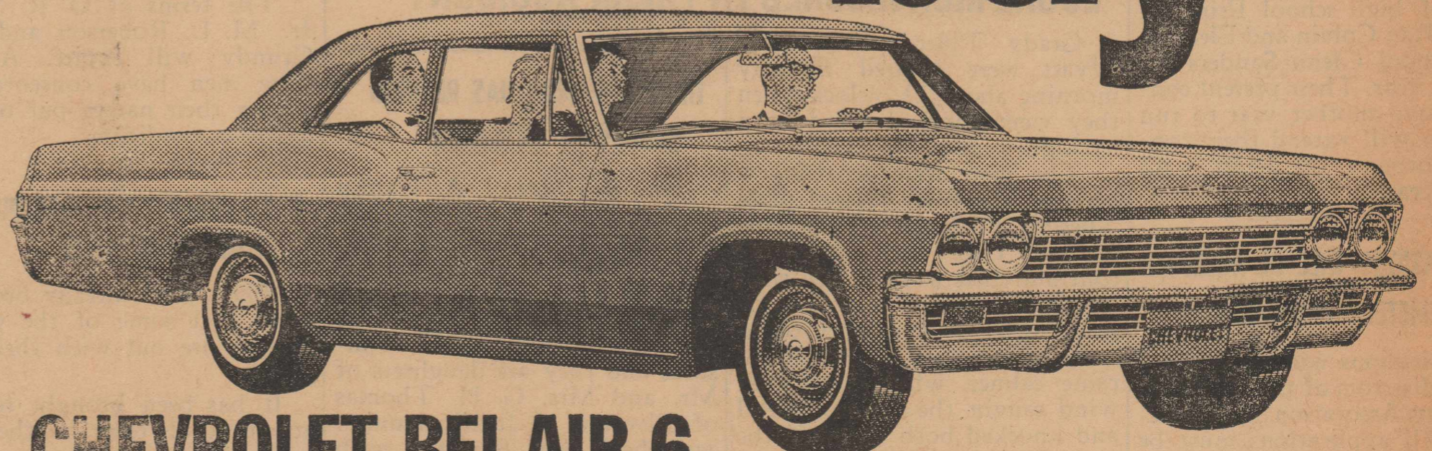

Congressman Walter Rogers' Newsletter

Imports have long been a source of bitter controversy in our country. Throughout our history we have generally found goods, wares, and products available from foreign sources at a price cheaper than prevailed in this country. This is so primarily because of the high standard of living that we in this country have built up under our philosophy of government. This standard of living is not confined to one group or one segment of our economy. It is available to all, regardless of the economic strata in which they

find themselves, as compared to counterparts in all other countries of the world. Our particular 18th Congressional District of Texas is directly affected by this import problem in oil, cattle, and in sugar. All of these are national problems of great consequence, but are of particular interest to our Panhandle because any adverse action relating to any of these products is immediately felt in our local economy.

The oil import is presently under study by the Department

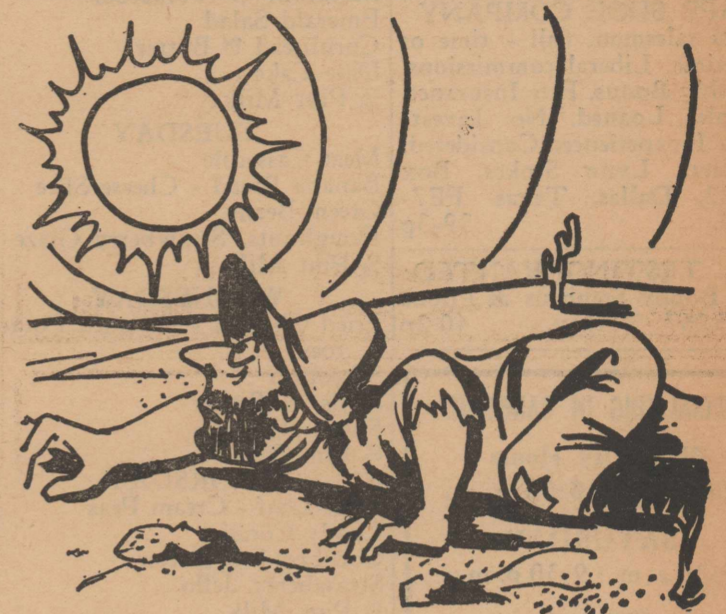
Department of the Interior, it can be expected that import control legislation will be sought.

The oil import problem is only one facet of the larger problem of imports generally. In the past it has been the practice of those affected by imports to remain separate and apart from other segments of the economy and to try to press for action in their own separable problem. This meant that there was no coordination between the domestic producers of cattle with the domestic manufacturers of pottery or bicycles or clothespins or steel, or the farmers trying to produce sugar, to name only a few of the groups that find imports a constant threat. The percentage of imports varies with the different products, even as regards those products in which this country could be wholly self-sufficient.

For instance, it would not be necessary for this country to

import cattle, yet between 10 and 15 percent of the beef consumed in this country is imported. This country could produce all of its sugar and enough to export, yet it is importing from foreign countries approximately 43 percent or almost half of our domestic consumption. One person admonished me for supporting a reduction in sugar imports. He told me that the foreign sugar could be acquired much cheaper than domestic sugar. My reply to him was that the same rule would apply to everything from oil to automobiles and from hairpins to cattle, which happened to be this fellow's business. I told him about a former Member of Congress who made a speech almost every day advocating "Buy American." Every afternoon this same Member would pass me on the way home, driving his Mercedes-Benz.

**LEGAL NOTICE**  
 NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR AN ACT CREATING HOSPITAL DISTRICT OVER BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS

TO THE RESIDENTS OF BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1965 for the passage of an Act Creating a Hospital District over Briscoe County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purpose and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

AN ACT providing for the creation of BRISCOE HOSPITAL DISTRICT with boundaries coterminous with those of Briscoe County, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) for its maintenance, support and the payment of bonds issued by it and the indebtedness assumed; providing for the transfer of hospital facilities and the assumption of indebtedness and assets; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for the refunding of such bonds; providing that such bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District; its powers and duties and the tenure of its members; withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by Briscoe County or any city located therein, enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency.
