CLARENDON COLLEGE BEGINS NEW COLLEGE WORK-STUDY PROGRAM

Clarendon College began the new College Work-Study Program on the campus this week. Approximately 56 million dollars in federal funds have been made available as the initial allocation for this particular program. The estimated allocation for the state of Texas is \$3. 372,283, exceeded only by the states of New York and California. The program is aimed to aid, through part-time employment, students whose parents can make no significant contribution toward the cost of

nigher education. Two categories of student part - time employment have been specified: on campus and off-campus. The first includes almost every type of institutional job such as laboratory assistants, clerical, maintenance, etc. Off-campus employment may relate to non-profit organizations only (churches are not included) such as city and county ed property damage of \$1,300.

He reminded farmers that only those who participate in the feed grain program will be eligible for price support on their 1965 corn, barley, and grain sorghum crops. As last year, the support is made available through loans and price support payments.

Besides qualifying for price support, the participating grow-er also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use. Minimum diversion is 50 percent of the base or 25 acres if this is more. For diverting more than the minimum, the diversion payment will be figured at a higher rate. If the actual diversion is 40 percent or more, the higher rate applies to the whole diversion.

The Chairman reports that participants will equal that under the 1964 feed grain pro-

He urges farmers who are interested in taking part in this vear's program to call at the Briscoe County Office as soon as possible, since there are only 10 more working days left before March 26 deadline, and signing up is the first step in program participation.




