Important Meetings Set For Area Farmers

PLANS BEING MADE FOR BRISCOE PARTICIPATION IN SCREW-WORM ERADICATION PROGRAM

The Briscoe County Screw-worm Eradication Committee is laying plans for this County's participation in a concentrated drive to raise \$300,000 from the Texas Livestock industry for the Screwworm Eradication Program.

"The goal for our county is \$1,440," according to Ben Whitfill, chairman of the local committee. He pointed out this goal can be attained if every farmer and rancher will contribute on the basis of ten cents per animal unit. An animal unit consists of one beef or dairy animal, or one horse, or five sheep, goats, or hogs.

The fund drive is now on and will conclude Monday, April 12. Livestock producers can leave their contributions at the First National Bank at Quitaque and the First State Bank at Silverton.

The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May and June. The Texas Legislature has already voted \$250,000 and Congress is expected to appropriate \$550,000 for the three-month period. These government monies cannot be spent, however, unless producer money is also made available.

The screwworm fly has been eradicated from the the Southwest, but a barrier of live, sterile flies must be maintained along the U. S. - Mexico border to prevent fertile flies from Mexico reinfesting the U. S. If funds are not made available, the Southwest stands to lose the gains that have already been made.

Leon Grosdidier, County Agricultural Agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producers.

One case of screwworm infestation was detected in this county last year.

Congress is considering a U.S.D.A. request for \$5 million which would make the program financed entirely by the Federal government beginning on July 1.

Decorating Tips For a Lovelier Home

Do you know what they're saying around the house these days? It's "take it off!" But before anyone gets on the party-line, we have to admit that this stripping act is highly respectable.

It involves the new wallcovering, VARLAR, which now is stripable . . . yes, this wall covering can be peeled off the wall, whole sections at a time, just like skin from a banana. Imagine how easy it will be to redecorate . . . no wallpaper steamers, no scraping, no mess.

VARLAR, by the United Wall-paper Company, is made of a specially developed resin impregnated stock that has high wet strength. Not only can it be peeled off the wall if desired, but it won't rip or tear during the hanging process.

The new wallcovering is vinyl coated so that is impervious to household stains such as grease, pencil and crayon marks and shoe polish. This vinyl coat also seals in the beauty of the design.

The wallcovering is installed by using wheat paste or VAR-LAR adhesive, either available at wallpaper dealers. The only tools needed are a yardstick, razor blade cutter, paste brush and smoothing brush.

The collection contains 118 side wall patterns, three soft borders and many designs have matching fabrics. The Lantree pattern, for instance, is an exact copy of the Toulouse-Lautrec posters which kicked up a storm in the turn of the century France. The vivid colors used by the artist are captured by the exacting printing requirements of VARLAR.

Brown County, Indiana, with its covered bridges and quiet countryside has inspired a soft toned design which will delight the traditionally minded.

Bright touches, textured effects, dramatic damasks, quaint provincials, fluttering butterflies and gay gingham abound in the collection. And probably when you have given your house this bit of cheer, you won't want to "take it off" for years.

Bake the raisin tart in a continental fluted pan with a removable bottom to give it the very distinctive looking crust. If a tart pan is not available, use a 9-inch cake pan with removable bottom.

Beat eggs until fluffy. Beat in sugar, salt, flour, spices, lemon peel and juice. Stir in sour cream and raisins. Turn into pastry lined 9 or 10-inch fluted tart pan. Bake, below center, in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 40 to 50 minutes, or until filling is barely set in center. Cool; garnish with whipped cream if desired. Makes 8 servings.

SOME SUGGESTION ADVANCED AS TO HOW COUNTY HOSPITAL COULD BENEFIT EVERYONE
(By Mary Ann Sarchet)
A group of interested citizens, representing many of the clubs in Briscoe County, met recently in the Silverton school cafeteria to discuss the lack of medical facilities in this area. Included in the group were representatives of the cities of Silverton

and Quitaque, County Commissioners, the County Judge, school officials, teachers, ministers, businessmen, farmers, ranchers and the Silverton doctor.

The group discussed the hospital which has been recently opened at McLean, which was built at an approximate cost of \$200,000 without the assistance of Hill - Burton funds. Many of those present were of the opinion that a project of this type would be most practical for the people of this county. Since a hospital district must be created before further plans can be made, several citizens have become signers of a document which requests the State Legislature to give the people of Briscoe County permission to have an election, the purpose of which would be to create a hospital district within the boundaries of Briscoe County.

Because someone has to sign a request of this type, the signers are Jim Mercer, Dr. Robert N. Muckleroy, William Strange, Gene Morris, Kenneth Tate, Leon Grosdidier, Mrs. Marvin Montague, Mrs. O. C. Rampley, and Mrs. Charles Sarchet.

The citizens agreed to be responsible for the expense of drawing up the papers and submitting it to the Legislature.

E. A. Birdwell agreed in further action to be responsible for setting up a meeting time and place in Quitaque at which the citizens of Silverton and Quitaque may try to resolve their differences in the matter of medical facilities. It is hoped that the matter can be discussed at length, and that all citizens will offer suggestions for a solu-

tion to the problem. It is hoped that if a fully accredited hospital can be secured it may be possible for the people of Quitaque to secure a resident doctor at some future date. If two doctors were practicing in the county, the medical problems would be greatly lessened.

It will take much work, much personal sacrifice to accomplish such a goal. But by providing our own medical facilities, the people of Briscoe County can:

Reduce the number of miles traveled to the hospital facility.

Patronize an institution in the county instead of an institution located in another county.

Strive to gain resident doctors for both towns involved.

Reduce the expense of driving to a hospital located further away, eliminate the need for lodging expenses (or as much expense for lodging), while at the hospital.

CASH RECEIPTS DOWN IN '64 FOR TEXAS FARM MARKETINGS

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR AN ACT CREATING HOSPITAL DISTRICT OVER BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS TO THE RESIDENTS OF BRISCOE COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the under-

signed intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1965 for the passage of an Act Creating a Hospital District over Briscoe County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purpose and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:
AN ACT providing for the creation of BRISCOE HOSPITAL DISTRICT with boundaries coterminous with those of Briscoe County, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the

questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) for its maintenance, support and the payment of bonds issued by it and the indebtedness assumed; providing for the transfer of hospital facilities and the assumption of indebtedness and assets; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and or any and all such purposes,

and for the refunding of such bonds; providing that such bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District; its powers and duties and the tenure of its members; withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by Briscoe County or any city located therein, enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this act; providing a severance

clause and declaring an emergency.
