SCHOOL NOTES

The local school board recently took action on the Civil Rights Act of 1965 (HEW-441) stating that they were in full compliance with the act.

This was necessary to the school because we were already in certain programs sponsored by the Federal Government, such as Vocational Agriculture, Vocational Homemaking, National School Lunch Room Program, and others.

On April 15, 1965 the school was notified that the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare had accepted the Quitauque Independent School District's "Assurance of Compliance" statement.

It is of interest to note that out of 1200 school districts in Texas only about 70 have been accepted. Quitauque is one of those few that were accepted without revision.

This approval entitles the district to submit new or additional applications with the Tex. Education Agency for participation in Federally Assisted Programs in the future, if we so choose.

Among some of the more important business of the Quitauque Independent School District discussed by the Board at its last meeting was the fact that the school would lose another CTU (Classroom Teaching Unit) this next year. These CTUs are assigned on the basis of the number of students in daily attendance. For each 24 children, or a major fraction thereof, 1 CTU is allowed. The school has been operating on the basis of 11 CTUs and hiring one CTU out of local taxes.

The Board decided that if the school was going to continue to operate on the premise of continued improvement it must not fall down in the need-on personnel. Of course this means that we will be paying for two teachers out of the local tax budget, but it was felt that it is better to do this than to have one teacher for two grades or some other lesser solution to the problem.

The cost of education, like any other business, is continually on the rise and we must be prepared and willing to meet these costs for our children. It is a known fact that our children have only one opportunity to go to school—if they are not well prepared while here, they will never have this opportunity again.
