On April 15. 1965 the school vas notified that the Den't of Health. Education and Welfare had accepted the Ouitaque Independent School District' 'Assurance of Compliance' statement.

It is of interest to note that out of 1200 school districts in i Texas only about 70 have been accepted. Quitgaue is one of those few that were accepted without revision.

This approval entitles the district to submit new or additional applications with the Tex. Education Agency for participation in Federally Assisted Programs in the future, if we so choose.

Among some of the more important business of the Quitaque Independent School District discussed by the Board at its last meeting was the fact that the school would lose another CTU (Classroom Teaching Unit) this next year. These CTU's are assigned on the basis of the number of students in daily attendance. For each 24 children, or a major fraction thereof, 1 CTU is allowed. The school has been operating on the basis of 11 CTU's and hiring one CTU out of local taxes.
