First Lieutenant Walter A. Moeller, 28, Army Air Forces, was reported killed over Middleburg, New Guinea April 10, 1945, according to an official message from the Secretary of War received February 19, 1946 by his wife, Mrs. Beulah Kistler Moeller, of Muleshoe. He had previously been reported missing.

Lieut. Moeller enlisted with the Air Corps in April 1942 and was sent overseas in April 1944 to the South Pacific War zone, being based first in New Guinea, the Solomon, and finally the Philippines. He was a P-38 Lightning pilot and flew with Brigadier General Earl W. Barnes' 13th AAF Fighter command's top-ranking Sunsters Lightning unit, the 339th fighter squadron. A flight leader since November 1944, Moeller completed a total of 112 combat missions over the South Pacific area. He had received the Air Medal and two clusters.

Lieut. Moeller was reared in Muleshoe and was manager of the Valley Theatre here when he entered the service. He is survived by his wife and three year old son, Walter A. Moeller, Jr., his mother, Mrs. Anna F. Moeller, of Muleshoe, three sisters, Mrs. Wilma Singer, of Littlefield, Mrs. Hertha M. Walker, and Mrs. Betty R. Swint, Muleshoe; and one brother, Eric F. Moeller, Wheeling, West Virginia.

Memorial services will be given later.

Local Hatchery Is Enlarged

Completion of an addition to the building of the Muleshoe Hatchery was announced this week by Tye Young, owner.

The addition carries the building on back to the alley. It is 40 feet by 25 feet, making the building overall dimension is 25 by 120. The extra space will be used for brooder rooms and for storage of supplies, Young said. The addition is of tile and has a concrete floor. The Muleshoe Hatchery, which has been operated for several years by Mr. and Mrs. Young, uses a modern Jamesway electric incubator, with an egg capacity of 60,000. Hatching is now in full swing.

Sterile lamps overhang the brooder batteries to insure a healthy start in life for baby chicks. The company buys cream eggs and poultry, and handles poultry remedies, poultry supplies and a complete line of Merit Peds.

FHA-GI Loans Available Now

F. H. A. and G. I. loans for home building are now available in Muleshoe. These loans run for 25 years and bear only 4 1/2 per cent interest. R. L. Brown has been appointed to contract these loans and anyone interested may obtain detailed information by calling upon him. According to present information, FHA guarantees 80 per cent of the loan and the Veterans Administration guarantees 20 per cent.

Mr. Brown has the application blanks and will be glad to assist veterans with their loan. Under the present set-up veterans wishing to build homes have priority over others on building materials. It is felt that every home the veteran builds will help by that much to relieve the housing shortage which is critical throughout the nation.

Purebred Gilts Have Produced 9 Pig Average

A Poland-China fat barrow of the same blood lines as gilts used in the current Con-Hog-Hen program in Bailey County won the championship of the Amarillo Fat Stock Show in his division. County Agent J. K. Adams announced upon his return from the show this week.

This indicates that the right animals were selected for the local program. Pure bred gilts were distributed last spring to eight Bailey County 4-H Club boys: Richard Barnes, Jimmie Williams, Teddie Harrison, Max Self, Olan Parker, Merlin Ray Carr, Duane Key, and Jimmie Wiltedring.

Six of the gilts have farrowed and averaged 9 pigs per litter. Mr. Adams said.

Under the program top gilts of each litter will be distributed to other club boys and so purebred swine in Bailey County should continually increase.

Mr. Adams says the boys have done a wonderful job with their gilts this year, considering the tight feed situation.

Proper Foods May Prevent Pellagra

That the inclusion of proper foods in the daily diet plays a very important part in the maintenance of good health was stressed in a statement issued this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"One of the most dreaded of all diseases, pellagra, is caused entirely by not eating the kinds of food which would insure a properly balanced diet," Dr. Cox said. "The public is prone to overlook the serious nature of pellagra. At best it is an

uncomfortable and unpleasant disease, but aside from this, there is one possible result that can be very tragic. All too frequently pellagra leads to serious mental disturbances," Dr. Cox warned, "and in some cases actual insanity."

Sidelights From Washington

By GEORGE MAHON

This is being written as I return from Perryopolis, Pennsylvania, where I have been to attend the funeral of Congressman J. Buell Snyder, who died suddenly at the age of 68. Mr. Snyder was chairman

of the House Subcommittee on Military Appropriations.

Having served on this Subcommittee myself with Mr. Snyder, I was one of the group appointed by Speaker Rayburn to attend the funeral. Several Pennsylvania members, including Senator Guffey, were present. The Secretary of War also in attendance.

It was Mr. Snyder's committee that handled the atomic bomb project, appropriating the money and cooperating with the War Department on the venture. One of the highlights of my association with

Mr. Snyder was in connection with this subject was the trip which we made through the atomic bomb plant in Tennessee last May.

Mr. Snyder had long been a resident of Perryopolis, a little town of 1500 people in an agricultural and coal mining area of Pennsylvania. There was character and kindness in the faces of the people at the funeral. I was reminded once again that the rural areas and little towns make a large contribution to the greatness of America.

Today the House Appropriations Committee put the final touches on the Annual Agricultural Appropriations Bill. The bill is scheduled to be voted on in the House on March 6th and go to the Senate for action there.

Some of the provisions which we have put in the bill which will interest West Texans are the following:

AAA funds which are paid to producers for cooperating with the soil conservation program will be about the same as last year—\$30,000,000. This is, of course, the largest single item in the entire bill.

An additional \$250,000,000 is provided the REA for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946. When this is added to other funds recently made available, it will insure a tremendous expansion in rural electrification.

The sum of \$25,000,000 is proposed for loans for veterans who wish to buy farms under the Farm Security Administration. An additional sum of the same amount is proposed for the regular loan program to farmers seeking to purchase farms under the F. S. A.

The sum of \$1,000,000 is provided for the purchase of surplus dirt-moving equipment by the Soil Conservation Service for loan to the Soil Conservation Districts.

Months ago I thought we were going to be able to get large quantities of surplus dirt-moving equipment transferred from the Armed Forces to the Soil Conservation

Service for the use of local Soil Conservation Districts. Unfortunately, our efforts in that direction have thus far been blocked.

The Appropriations Committee, in my judgment, made a serious mistake in failing to grant the total sum requested by the Department of Agriculture to combat pink bollworm. The pink bollworm has a firm foothold in the Rio Grande Valley and Old Mexico, and is the most dangerous pest known to cotton production.

A few pink bollworms have been discovered from time to time in our 19th Congressional District and certain precautions have been taken. However, our writers are sufficiently cold that the threat to the West Texas-Plains area is not so great as in the milder climate in East Texas and the Old South.

If the major cotton producing areas of the South should become infested with the pink bollworm, the consequences would be disastrous.

RIBBLE'S RIPPLES

In the days of the apostles of Christ, there was no such thing as "denominational Christianity." Such was also unknown as late as the 6th century when the great state-church of Roman political origin began to function from Rome. Until such times men and women were simply Christians—never striving to be anything else. Never willingly known by other titles than those of the New Testament writers.

Some of the dissenting Christians were stigmatized and branded with ruman to ms, but not with anything like the common consent of the disciples of Christ. Orchard, a historian says: "After the destruction of the Jewish capital, the Christian church enjoyed for sever-

al years outward peace. Its inward harmony was often disturbed during this century by advocates of unscriptural doctrines, these circumstances occasioned dissidents, yet at this period, each party tenaciously held the name of Christian, and had strong aversions to any other." Orchard, Vol. 1, p. 12.

"The Christian societies i. e. churches, S. A. R. were united only by ties of faith and charity. Independence and equality formed the basis of their internal constitution though the churches sustained a primitive character for more than one hundred years, yet during this century, the introduction of various rites borrowed from the Old Testament by these and other expedients the purity of the original institutions became sophisticated; and when once the ministers of religion had departed from the ancient simplicity of the gospel and sullied the

native purity of Divine truth by a motley mixture of human inventions it was difficult to set bounds to this growing corruption." Orchard, Vol. 1 pp. 22-23.

reached the age of 65 in an effort to help them avoid any loss of benefits through delay in filing claims.

Any person who has worked enough in private industry and commerce to be insured under the old-age and survivors insurance program can file a claim at age 65 to peg his benefits at a point below which they cannot fall. Then, if he keeps working, or if he gets a new job and his wage record would produce higher benefits at a later date, he may file a request to have his benefit recalculated to give him the higher rate.

Mr. Palmer pointed out that his office has been urging workers for some time to confer with the Social Security Board officials upon reaching age 65, in order to protect full benefit rights.

"A great many workers have done just that," Mr. Palmer said, "but many have not. They have been under the impression that once a claim is filed, the benefit could not be changed even though subsequent work might produce a higher potential benefit figure.

"That was true for a time, but last year the board inaugurated a method of recalculation which will keep benefits from going down once a claim is filed, but will not keep them from going up. If workers and former workers in private industry and commerce, who have passed the age of 65, will just come to see us, we will give them the information and help necessary to protect their full benefit rights."
