House Passes Redistricting Plan

The House of Representatives last week passed a congressional redistricting plan submitted by the Legislative and Congressional Committee. Representative Ralph Wayne of Plainview and several other members of the House of Representatives attempted to amend the bill. Wayne's amendment would have kept Floyd County in the 19th Congressional District, which is represented by Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock. The Plainview representative previously had appeared before the Redistricting Committee and presented data and information in support of his contention that both Hale and Floyd Counties should remain in the 19th Congressional District because of their common interests. Fortunately, while there were many drastic changes made throughout the State, Wayne was successful in keeping Hale County in the 19th Congressional District. He plans to work with a Conference Committee in an attempt to get Floyd County placed back in Mahon's district.

The bill, as approved by the House, now goes to the Senate for action. It undoubtedly will be amended and will then be sent to a Conference Committee composed of members from both the House and the Senate. Speaker Barnes commended the House on its passage of House Bill 67 and stated that he was appreciative of the members' sincere efforts to redistrict the Congressional Districts without the Federal court's assistance.

PROPOSALS TO ELIMINATE ONE OR TWO DISTRICTS TO BE PRESENTED AT CONFERENCE

Proposals to eliminate at least one district and possibly two, are expected to be presented to the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church when it convenes May 24 at First Methodist Church, Lubbock.

The proposal calls for a reduction in the number of districts in the conference from nine to seven. The conference determines the number of districts but the establishment of the boundaries is left open to the judgment of the presiding bishop.

Bishop O. Eugene Slater, the bishop of the Northwest Texas-San Antonio Area of The Methodist Church, will preside at all sessions.

Dr. Dow Kirkpatrick, pastor of First Methodist Church of Evanston, Ill., will be the conference preacher. Dr. Kirkpatrick was pastor of St. Mark Methodist Church, Atlanta, Ga. for a number of years before going to Evanston to succeed Dr. Harold Bosley. Dr. Kirkpatrick will preach Tuesday evening, May 25, and Wednesday and Thursday at 11:30 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

A number of prominent Methodists will speak during sessions of the conference. Dr. J. Otis Young will represent the Methodist Publishing House and Bishop Ralph Dodge, of Africa, will speak in connection with the report of the Board of Missions. Dr. Carl Stocking of the General Board of Education, Nashville, will discuss the new materials now being used in Christian education.

The committee on Conference Merger will recommend the adoption of two resolutions to aid plans for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction (Negro churches and conference).

A proposed constitution for the Northwest Texas Conference Council will be presented on Tuesday. The Council coordinates the programs of the various boards of the conference.

Baccalaureate services for the graduating class of 1965 will be held Sunday evening, May 16 at the school auditorium.

The Baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by the Rev. Al Jennings, pastor of The First Methodist Church here.

Commencement Exercises for the class will be held at 8:00 p. m. Friday, May 21 in the school auditorium with Dr. Ed Kaijara of Wayland Baptist College scheduled to deliver the commencement address. Dr. Kaijara is professor of Biology at Wayland. He served as interim pastor of the Baptist Church here last year following the resignation of Roy Davidson and prior to calling the present pastor, the Rev. Bill Curry.

At this time of the year, high school seniors from all over the nation converge upon the Capitol City in buses, trains, planes and private cars. Many plan these graduation trips for several years during their high school careers. They are happy-go-lucky and carefree at this time of life and look forward to a wonderful experience.

It is a fine feeling to see these young people visiting their Nation's Capital, inspired by its past history, which is so forcibly called to mind by the Capitol Building itself, the Washington Monument, the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, the White House, Lee's Mansion, Mount Vernon, and a thousand other points of historical value. It is hard to believe that so much danger lurks in the shadow of these great monuments — dangers brought about by a crime wave in the Nation's Capital that seems so difficult to stem. At the present time, a vigorous if not bitter controversy is in full swing between the Congress of the Commissioners of the District of Columbia. The present battle is centered in the Senate. The District Commissioners have filed an extensive report on the subject which has prompted some of the Senators to blame Congress as a whole for permitting this to happen. There will no doubt be many harsh words and heated debates on this subject before it is finally solved.

The Nation's Capital does not like to be held up in scorn before the entire Nation on the subject of juvenile delinquency and crime generally. Nevertheless, the facts must be faced, whether it is in Washington, New York City, Los Angeles, Dallas, Chicago, or Pumpkin Center. The root of the evil must be found, a solution provided, and soon. The staggering cost of crime throughout this Nation is incredible. It is my feeling that since Washington is the Nation's Capital the fight against crime generally should begin here.

In the meantime, it would be well for all those planning to visit Washington, whether adults or children, to realize the seriousness of the situation. There are very few nights in the District of Columbia that are not filled with robberies, burglaries, muggings, and more serious offenses. The streets of the Nation's Capital are not safe, despite diligent work of the available police. Anyone who walks the streets after nine o'clock in the evening is asking for trouble unless they stay within well and brilliantly lighted areas and are not alone. Any journey down a dimly lighted street or a little used thoroughfare, or through a public park is an open invitation to be knocked in the head with a blackjack, yoked with a piano wire, or held up with a firearm. Women's purses are snatched in open daylight in many sections of Washington. Old men have been beaten unmercifully and their wallets ripped out of their pants. Many of the offenders are teenagers traveling in packs like wolves. A large number, according to statistics, are school dropouts with no supervision at home, no jobs and nothing to do but roam the streets and prey upon law-abiding citizens. Outsiders are choice prey for these marauders. The chance of the assaults being identified is less, the victim usually carrying money because he is traveling, and the chances are the victim will need to return to his home before the

offender is apprehended. If the victim lives a considerable distance away from Washington, the expense of his returning to identify the offender may be prohibitive, and the chances that the offender will go free are better.

The main point is that those people coming to Washington, whether as school children, as chaperones, or as single tourists, should stay off of the streets at night, stay away from places that are not well and brilliantly lighted, should not move about alone in any areas not frequented by other people, should not carry or display large amounts of cash or other valuables, and never go out any place without letting someone else know where they are going, and when they expect to return.

GIVE FINGERLINGS A CHANCE

COLLEGE STATION — Farmers and ranchers planning to stock their ponds this spring should remove adult fish from the pond before introducing fingerlings, says Wallace Klussman, Extension wildlife conservation specialist at Texas A & M University.

"Additional stocking of a pond previously stocked is seldom the solution to poor fishing problems," says Klussman. "Bass fingerlings introduced into a pond having a few adults are almost certain to be eaten by the larger fish. Adult bass will also eat catfish and sunfish fingerlings."

One common mistake often made after stocking fingerlings is putting in a few large fish that someone has caught, hoping to produce a few "big ones" in a hurry.

These larger fish will eat the fingerlings just as would the old adult fish.

Trash fish may easily be introduced by going to a nearby creek or pond and seining fish for stocking. State and Federal fish hatcheries are the best

places to get stocking fingerlings, Klussman said.

Adult fish populations in private ponds can be removed by use of rotenone. Rotenone is not a poison. Since the fish are killed by suffocation, they are safe for human consumption.

Five pounds of 5 percent rotenone powder per acre foot of water is the usual recommendation. In warm water (65 degrees F. or above) where thorough and even distribution can be made, three pounds of rotenone per acre foot is usually sufficient. Mix the rotenone powder with enough water to make a thick paste. Then add water to increase the volume until you have a mixture about

the density of milk.

For the best distribution, pour the rotenone behind a boat with an outboard motor. In small ponds or areas of lakes that are inaccessible by boat, the mixture can be sprayed from the bank. Another unsophisticated but effective way to treat small areas is by "mud-balling" the rotenone when mixed with enough water to form a paste and then tossing these balls into the water.

"Once adult fish are removed you can be fairly certain your new fingerlings will grow to a catchable size in a short time," said Klussman. "Your local county agricultural agent has detailed information on rates and application methods."

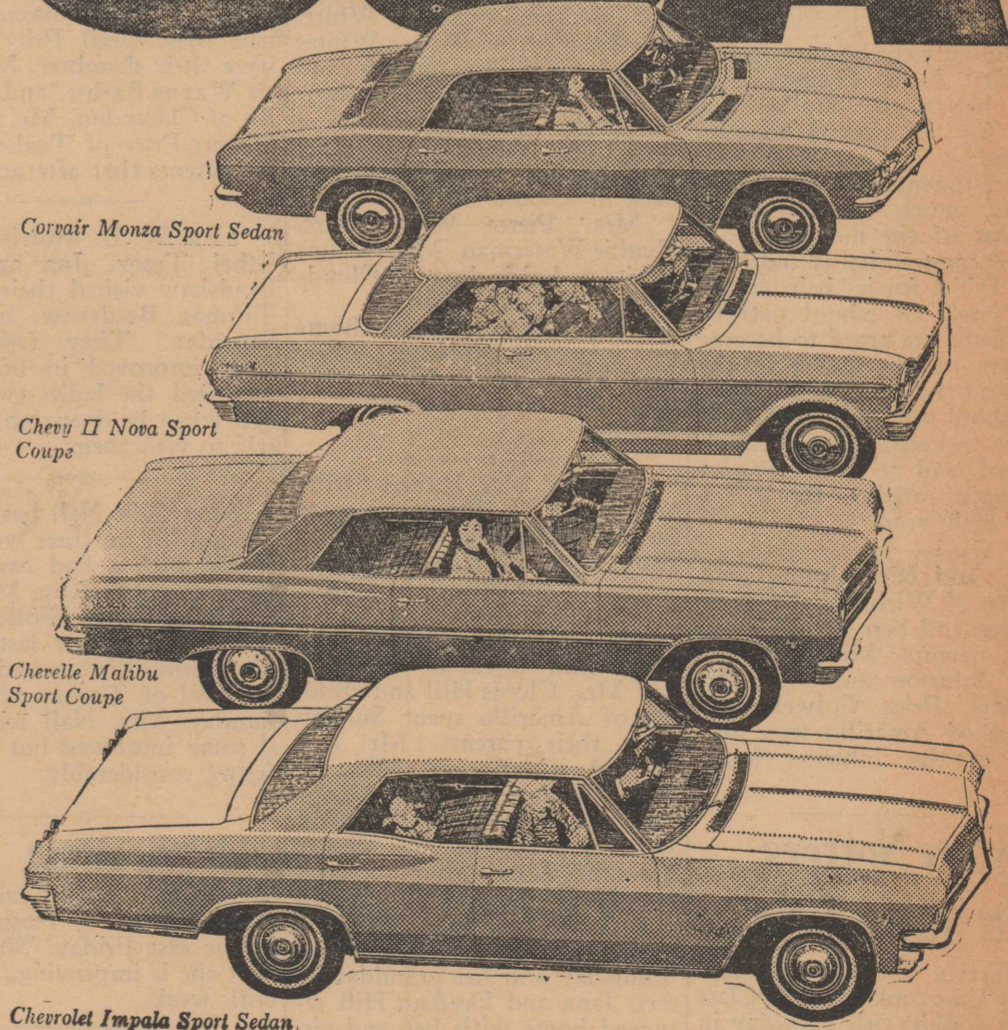

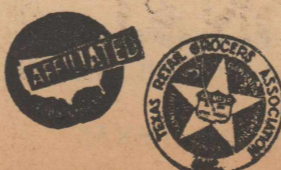

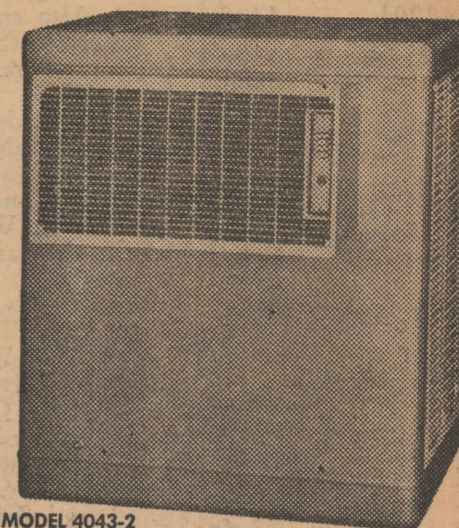
