DETAILS OF CHANGES IN 1965 COTTON LOAN PROGRAM

The Department of Agri culture on April 22, 1965, an nounced changes in the 1965 Cotton Loan Program. The announcement covered broad areas of administration. There is set forth below information on how the 1964 program operated and additional information as to how the 1965 Cotton Loan Program will operate.

Operation of the 1964 Loan Program for Cotton:

A "Sample" was drawn from the bale of cotton and sent to a board of Cotton Examiners and classed. It usually took two or three days for the producer to receive the official classification. The loan note (form CCC Cot-Her mother met the little ed that warehouse receipts show that warehouse receiving charges had been paid before cotton could be placed under CCC loan. In some instances this requirement resulted in an additional trip to the warehouse by the producer before his cotton could be placed under loan. len holders were required to waive liens on the crop and could be designated on the note to be reimbursed from the loan proceeds. Clerk fees for preparing loan documents were authorized. The loan note could then be signed and witnessed and the loan proceeds disbursed whether by an approved lending agency, by an Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county office or by the New Orleans Commodity Office. If the loan was disbursed by an approved lending agency, such agency was financially responsible for an ineligible cotton tendered to CCC after disbursement by a lending agency or county office, loan notes and warehouse receipts were sent to the New Orleans Commodity Office. To redeem cotton from the loan required the producer to have a release of warehouse receipts form validated by his ASCS county office. This form was then mailed to the New Orleans Commodity Office by the pro-

It is expected that for the most part, producers of coton will utilize the services of their local ASCS county office or approved loan clerks at convenient locations in the county. 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
