FIOMOT SCHOOLS PREPARING TO MOVE TWO HOUSES TO CAMPUS



Green Thumb Tips

Most seeds do not come up overnight, although a few, like beans seem to. The seeds of most annual flowers take be-tween a week and three weeks to


tween a week and three weeks to germinate, so don't be in a rush to replant a row. The precise length of time it takes seeds to sprout depends on many conditions such as air, temperature of the soil and mois-ture in the soil. All of these must be just right. be just right,

All vegetables are gluttons for fertilizer. It has been said that most gardeners could pro-duce twice as much in half the space if they would, give their plants sufficient fertilizer. Directions as to quantity to use are on the package. Read them,


