

This crisp cookie, delectable with flaked coconut and pecans, is spiked with cinnamon; it's a perfect accompaniment to tea for the grown-ups, milk for the youngsters, or just for good eating any time. For a change, chill this cookie dough until it can be handled easily; then form into small balls and place on greased baking sheets. Flatten with the bottom of a glass dipped in flour. Bake as

Coconut Crisps

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon double-acting

baking powder teaspoon baking soda 1 tablespoon cinnamon

1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 cup granulated sugar

1 tablespoon milk 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans 11/3 cups (about) flaked coconut

2 eggs

1/2 cup firmly packed brown

Sift flour with baking powder, soda, and cinnamon. Cream butter, gradually add sugars, and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well; then add flour mixture. Add milk and blend well. Add pecans and coconut. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 375° for 10 to 12 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes

In a full year, these reductions will amount to an estimated -1.75 billion. A second series of excise tax reductions and eliminations to go into effect on that date amount to \$1.7 billion. With certain other reductions and eliminations due to take effect on January1 1967, 1968, and 1969, the aggregate drop in excise taxes is expected to be \$4.8 billion.

For years, I have campaigned to bring about a major revision in the tax structure. Excise taxes are a legacy of wartime, enacted in the first place to discourage the production and sale of items made with vital war materials as much as to raise revenue. Jewelry and luggage are and they are two of the four categories of items on which 10 percent retailers' excise taxes are to be repealed tffective July 1. The others are furs and toilet preparations.

In addition to the retailers' taxes, manufacturers' excises of 5 and 10 percent will be repealed on a long list of items effective July 1. These items are involved: Air conditioners, business machines, cameras and film, electric and gas and oil appliances, freezers, musical instruments, pens and mechanical pencils, phonograph records, playing cards, radios and phonographs, refrigerators, sporting goods (except fishing equipment), and television sets. Also due for complete repeal July 1 are taxes on the rent of safety deposit boxes, a seemingly small item but one which has netted \$7 million annually in tax rev-

The excise tax reduction concerning automobiles calls for reductions in the 10 percent man-ufacturers' tax to 7 percent on July 1 (refunds will be granted to May 24); to 6 percent on
