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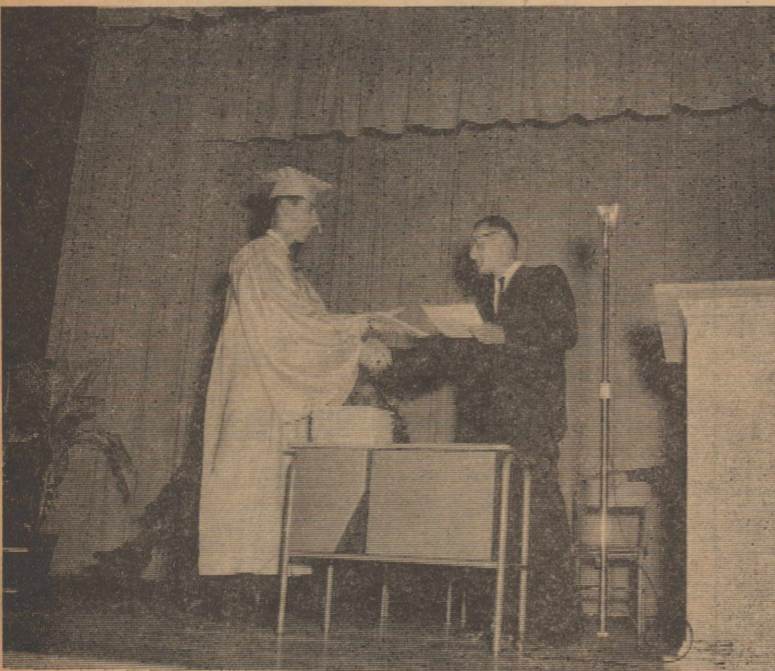
Commencement Speaker

Mrs. Rubye Partain of Pascagoula, Miss. was recently chosen by the District 6 Nurses Association of Mississippi State Nurses Association, RN, as Registered Nurse of the Year. Mrs. Partain, who is in charge of the medical department at Ingall's Shipbuilding Corp., has served the district organization as treasurer.

Mrs. Partain is the former Rubye Hawkins, daughter of Bert Hawkins and sister of Chester and Frank Hawkins.

Qualifications set forth for this honor include personality, highest moral conduct, education, membership in the district, state and national nursing association. A spokesman for the association said judges considered hobbies which are not only for her own recreation but which serve to bring her closer to family and friends. She must also be a Christian, the spokesman said.

Mrs. Partain, who lives with her husband John at 450 East Live Oak Ave., Pascagoula, graduated from her hometown high school in Quitaque in 1929. She completed her studies at the Plainview Nurses Training School in Plainview in 1933, and began work immediately at the Children's Texas Hospital in Plainview. REPRESENTATIVE RALPH WAYNE WRITES FINAL NEWSLETTER FROM 59TH SESSION OF LEGIS.

Dear Friends:

This is my final newsletter from the 59th session of the Texas Legislature in Austin. I am addressing these letters to those of you who have contacted me in some fashion during the session on various subjects.

First I would like to state to you that I have wholeheartedly enjoyed being your Representative and that I have appreciated the honor of representing you.

I feel the 59th session has been a very productive one. Among the measures that have been passed by the House are:

1. The Teacher Pay Raise Bill.
2. A tax bill on cigarettes to finance the Teacher Pay Raise.
3. Legislative, Senatorial and Congressional Re-districting.
4. Central Coordinating Board for Education in Texas.
5. Re-vamping our Water Commission and Water Development Board and creating a statewide Water Planning Program.

Measures that I either carried or supported include:

1. H. B. 11 (Wayne), increasing gross limits on cotton trailers.
2. H. B. 113 (Wayne), creating the Swisher Memorial Hospital District.
3. H. B. 622 (Wayne), creating the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.
4. H. B. 153, increasing pickup speed limits to 70 mph.
5. H. B. 65, protecting agricultural areas on assessment of land for agricultural purposes only.
6. S. B. 31 (Hayne) Labeling Imported Meats.
7. HJR 3, creating the new Texas Department of Mental Health.
8. HJR 11, providing \$85,000,000 for student loans.
10. H. B. 14, creating the Texas Tech Medical School.
11. S. B. 50 (Hayne) 5-day Sick Leave for Public School Teachers.
12. S. B. 75, Grain Products—oleo from grain sorghum oil.
13. S. B. 130, Program for eradication of tuberculosis.
14. S. B. 404. (Wayne) Setting up procedures for county-wide re-districting.
15. H. B. 278 (Wayne), District Attorney secretary pay raise—64 Judicial District.

I was fortunate in being appointed by Speaker Ben Barnes to represent Texas at the Southern Governors' Conference on Economic Development in Miami, Florida, and later participate in an inspection tour at Cape Kennedy, Florida.

I have answered over 11,000 letters in the 140 days we have been in session, and during that time I have traveled over 30,000 miles—most of that mile-

Quitaque residents north of town were almost buried by a hailstorm which began falling around 6 o'clock last Friday morning. One of the most peculiar storms ever to hit this area, the falling hail woke a great many residents.

Here in town many were jarred from slumber when the marble-sized hail started bouncing off rooftops and air conditioners, creating quite a din. The cloud which produced the hail was quiet and was not preceded by a lot of thunder and lightning as is usually the case.

Cookies - Crisp And Coconutty



This crisp cookie, delectable with flaked coconut and pecans, is
spiked with cinnamon; it's a perfect accompaniment to tea for the
grown-ups, milk for the youngsters, or just for good eating any time.
For a change, chill this cookie dough until it can be handled
easily; then form into small balls and place on greased baking
sheets. Flatten with the bottom of a glass dipped in flour. Bake as
for drop cookies.

Coconut Crisps

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour	1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder	2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon baking soda	1 tablespoon milk
1 tablespoon cinnamon	1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
1/2 cup butter or margarine	1 1/2 cups (about) flaked coconut
1 cup granulated sugar	

Sift flour with baking powder, soda, and cinnamon. Cream butter, gradually add sugars, and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well; then add flour mixture. Add milk and blend well. Add pecans and coconut. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 375° for 10 to 12 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes about 5 dozen cookies.

ethics.

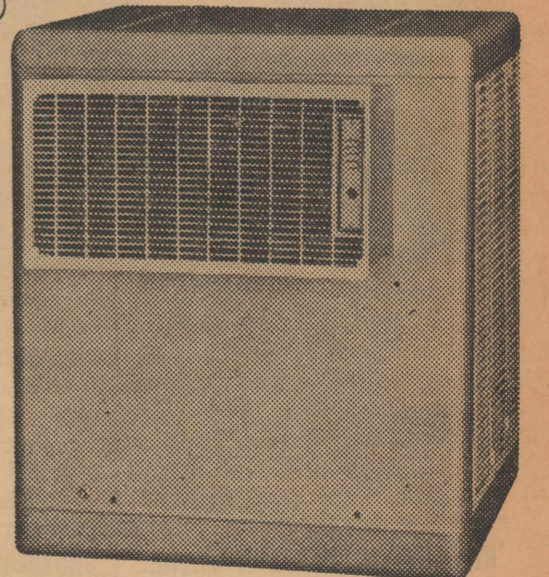
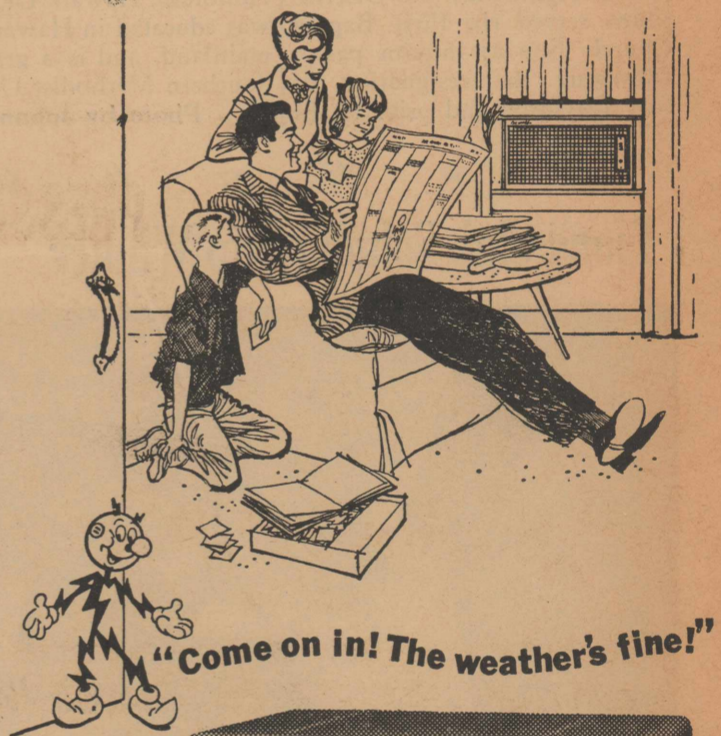
After capping, HDSN stu-

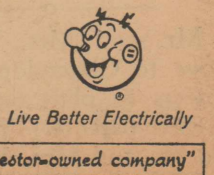

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS' WASHINGTON REPORT

January 1, 1966; to 4 percent on January 1, 1967; to 2 percent on January 1, 1968; and total elimination as of January 1, 1969.

It is good to know that progress is being made in reducing to some extent the heavy tax burden on the citizenry. However, I am disappointed that further success has not been obtained in reducing income taxes. I have long advocated an increase in the individual and dependent's exemptions. I proposed an increase in this exemption from \$600 to \$1,000. Anyone with children knows that a \$600 exemption from income taxes is completely unrealistic. Actually, an exemption for dependents should be closer to \$2,000. If this increase in the exemptions could be accomplished the additional money available to the low and middle income classes as a result of this income tax reduction would in

my opinion provide substantial added vigor to the economy. It would serve to create additional purchasing power in those segments of our economy where additional spending money is needed. It would contribute to the betterment of large families and would serve in many instances to help relieve the poverty which we are supposed to be warring against.

When I first introduced this legislation during my early years here in the Congress, I had six dependents. Some of the other Members of Congress facetiously called this "a bill for the private relief of Walter Rogers." However, my dependents have grown up and I have only two left. My desire and advocacy of this type of legislation has continued to grow stronger each year, and I hope to see it enacted.

MCKENZIE WATER BILL SIGNED INTO LAW

House Bill 622, by Representative Ralph Wayne of Plainview was signed into law last Friday by Governor John Connally.

This law empowers the cities of Tulia, Lockney, Floydada and Silvertown to plan for and meet their water needs in a unified effort within the McKenzie Municipal Water Authority. The Authority will be governed by an 8-member Board of Directors, two appointed from each city by the governing body of each city. The Authority will be able to acquire and develop ground water, but may not produce over two acre-feet of water per surface acre acquired. Water rights must be acquired by purchase or lease, the same

as anyone else. It is specifically spelled out that the Authority does not have the power to condemn underground water rights. The law is to take immediate effect.

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

An important addition to the physical facilities of the High Plains Research Foundation, made possible through a generous grant by the Moody Foundation, has been announced by the Board of Trustees of the Foundation. The Moody Education and Communication Building will soon be under construction on the premises at Halfway, Texas.

In a meeting of the Executive Board on Saturday morning May 1, 1965, a contract was awarded to Lampe Construction Company, who was the low bidder.

The proposed building will be of modern design, as outlined by Kerr & Kerr, architects of Plainview, with outside dimensions of 60' x 75'. Contained in the building will be facilities for radio, newspaper, and television work, along with an eventual Agricultural Library and office space. The addition of this plant will release badly needed space for scientific agricultural research.

According to Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Board, the Moody Memorial Education and Communication Building is a giant step forward for the High
