

Hearty Picnic Partners



Fill the picnic basket with an easy-to-fix supper — Quick German Potato Salad, knackwurst or bratwurst ready for the charcoal grill, relishes, fruit and cupcakes. Don't forget a cooler of sparkling 7-Up. Cover the hot potato dish with foil and wrap in many layers of newspapers to keep it warm. Or, reheat the potatoes in a foil pan on the grill. Be sure to select fully-cooked German-style sausages. Simply brush with oil and grill until browned.

- QUICK GERMAN POTATO SALAD 6 slices bacon /2 cup chopped onion
- cup chopped green pepper 2 tablespoons flour 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

1 bottle (7 ozs.) 7-Up 4 lbs. potatoes peeled, cooked

Fry bacon until crisp. Drain bacon on absorbent paper, then crumble. Reserve 3 tablespoons bacon drippings. Saute onion and green pepper in drippings. Stir in flour and seasonings. Cook over low heat, stirring until smooth and bubbly. Remove from heat. Slowly stir in vinegar and 7-Up. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil for 1 minute. Stir in potatoes and crumbled bacon; heat thoroughly. Makes about 16 servings.







In the garden, you can cut down weeding by mulching around plants with organic material such as peat moss, fine. ly ground compost or grass clip-pings. Besides discouraging weeds, a mulch conserves moisture, keeps root systems cooler in hot weather and makes flower beds more attractive.

Weeds are not the cause of a poor lawn but the result of one. Weed seeds often live in the soil



sprout. The aim in weed control, Air Sprayer of course, is to establish a thick, vigorous-growing turf that will keep weeds from invading in the first place.
While the time-honored method of hand grubbing is still an effective way to control weeds, once they have started, it is time consuming and usually just plain drudgery. The National Sprayer & Duster Associa-tion suggests that an easier, more efficient approach is to let chemistry do the work for you. You can start off with a pre-emergency treatment on crab-grass, then, as needed, follow up with post-emergence weed

killers, such as 2,4D.
Success with chemical weed killers depends a lot on knowing which one to use and how to use it. One essential is to folmanufacturer's directions carefully. From early spring inrough early summer is the most effective time to apply

Weed killers come as sprays or granules. You will find that sprays are generally more economical and provide more

thorough coverage.


For more extensive lawns, a small power sprayer will provide versatile equipment for effortless spraying.

Crabgrass is about the peskiest lawn weed. It's an annual that takes off on its growing spree in the summer, but turns brown and dies in fall, leaving bare spots during winter and early spring. And like other weeds, its seeds can remain for years and still sprout when temperatures are warm enough. There are several crabgrass killers available under various

trade names. A pre-emergent crabgrass preventer, which you can apply to an established lawn in early spring, before weeds sprout, will destroy germinating seeds in top layer of soil. Usually one lawn application is enough. As soon as broadleaved weeds

appear in the lawn, use a 2,4-D or similar weed killer to eliminate them. By catching these rascals while they're young, they will do less damage. Usually spot control will take care of the broadleaved lawn weeds, unless they are too numerous.

Where weed infestations are widespread, it is best to spray the entire lawn thoroughly. Use from less than 20 inches. With the nozzles set to apply coarse droplets at low pressure, just enough for a clean pattern, you will get uniform wetting and minimum drift. Apply weed killer on a calm day, preferably when the temperature is between 700

How To Enjoy Bug-Free Outdoor Living

Summertime is outdoor living time. It's the time for barbecues on the patio, splash parties in the pool—or just stretching out in a lawn chair, relaxing with family and friends. To enjoy scratch-free, slap-free outdoor relaxation, you can get rid of those insects that constantly analyses that the results of the results are the results of the results are results. noy or bite you.

A good start is to eliminate places where insects breed. If possible, drain all stagnant water in the area. Check especially for stopped - up roof gutters, fa-vorite breeding

The most effective way to control pests is to apply a light, residual coat of pesticide on the surfaces where they rest. Mosquitoes rest during the day in the cool of shrubs, hedges, flowers and lawn. Spray or dust these places and also walls and fences up to 6 or 8 feet in height. Be sure you get under the leaves of plants, favor.

Spray or dust under the porches and crawl spaces. Treat garbage cans and compost piles, places where flies. Avoid getting

pesticides in the bird bath, fish Plunger pond or on surfaces where food will be handled or served. If not washed off, coatings will remain effective for weeks.
The best time to spray or dust

is in the morning or evening when the air is calm. Also the dew on foliage helps dusts stick

the compressed air sprayer. This versatile sprayer (it can be used for most all yard and garden spraying) has a tank which holds 1½ to 4 gallons. A few strokes of the pump builds a Sprayer

head of compressed air in tank so that you can spray for an extended period without repumping. It has a long discharge set consisting of a hose and extension tube with nozzle. Usually the nozzle can be adjusted for both spray pattern and the angle of discharge. The sprayer can be carried by hand, over-the-shoul-der with a strap, or mounted on a handy, 2-wheeled cart. If you want extra spraying

convenience or have a larger area to treat, investigate a power sprayer. A power sprayer not only has a large tank capacity (10 to 50 gallons and over), but it also provides a constant pressure which drives spray into foliage for thorough coverage. By eliminating hand-pumping, it does most of the work; it also does the job much faster. Multi-nozzle booms of broadpattern nozzles are available to further speed up the job on the lawn or plants.

Dusters are available from handy types which hold about a pound of dust to crank-operated
