NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

There will be four field stops in the farm tours at the High Plains Research Foundation's Ninth Annual Field Day on Thursday, September 9. Large trucks equipped with seats will transport visitors over the research farm at Halfway. The tours will continue from 1 to 5 p. m. and will give the guests an opportunity to see many of the 54 research projects underway. The trucks are loaned to the Foundation for the day by many firms handling agricultural products in the area.

Members of the staff at the Foundation will explain the research at the various stops. Guides will accompany each of the trucks and will explain many of the research programs seen enroute. The guides will be men who are professional agricultural leaders familiar with the farm problems of the area, included among the guides will be county agents, Soil Conservation and Farm Home Administration personnel. Organizing and dispatching the trucks will be Ollie Liner, County Agent of Hale County, Lee

Dent, Manager of the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce and Merwyn Igo, board member and Halfway businessman. Members of the Foundation staff who will describe the research underway at the various field stops will be Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke, Senior Soil Scientist and Assistant Director; Barry Love, B. S., M. S., Agronomist; James Valliant, B. S., Water Engineer; Jack Parks, Associate Agricultural Engineer and Farm Superintendent; Loyd Langford, B. S., Assistant Agronomist; Dean Howard, B. S., Ass't. Agronomist; and Howard Malstrom, B. S., M. S.,

Associate Soil Scientist in the laboratory to explain the functions and purposes of the equipment.

Some of the research that will be shown are: The High Plains Foundation Farming System; Soybeans and Sesame variety breeding programs; Water Conservation; Bench Levelling and Recharge Wells; Rotation Systems; Cotton Varieties; Grain and Forage Sorghum Fertilizer & Irrigation tests; Weed Control by Flame and Chemicals.

The tour will end at the farm equipment exhibit at the Halfway Community Center.

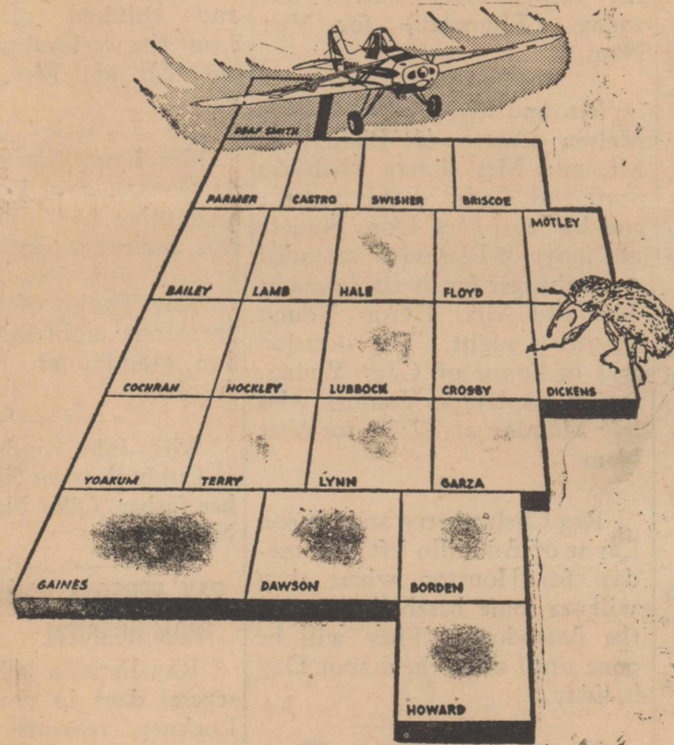

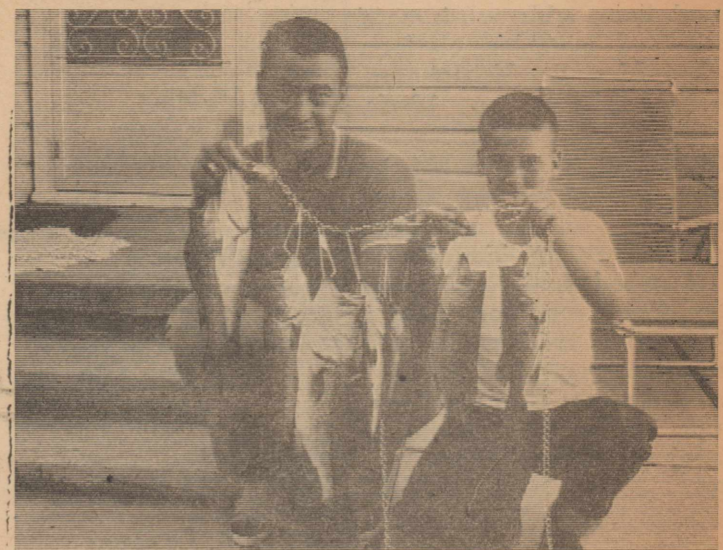
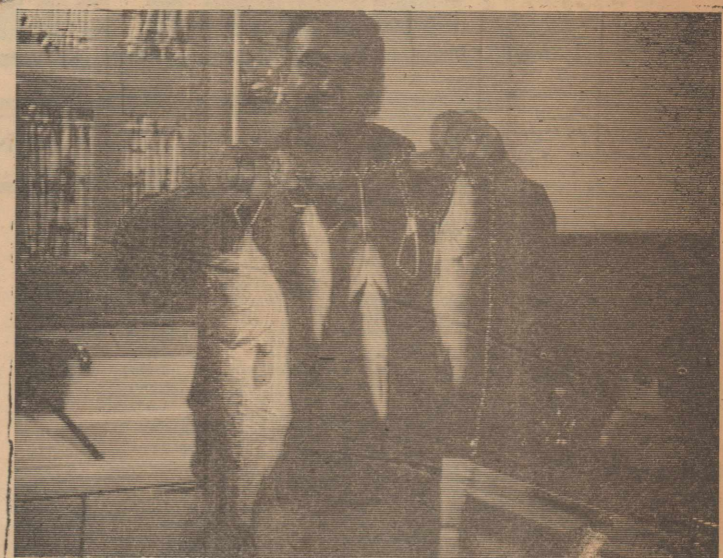
FALL WORKOUTS UNDERWAY FOR WEST TEXAS STATE BUFFS
