SILVERTON MAN DIES IN TRUCK ACCIDENT

Frank (Rusty) Arnold, 64, of Silverton, was killed early Monday morning when the gasoline transport truck he was driving, missed a curve just inside the southwest city limts of Floydada, hit an electrical power transformer and burst into flames. The transport truck belonged to the Alvin Redin Oil Co. at Silverton. Mr. Arnold was returning to Silverton from Lubbock with a load of gasoline, according to reports received here.

Funeral services for Frank M. Arnold, a resident of Briscoe County for 49 years, were held at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church at Silverton with the Rev. Clyde Cain, pastor officiating.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery under the direction of Silverton Funeral Home.

Mr. Arnold moved to Silver ton when he was 15 years of age. He married Stella Baird at Silverton on August 9, 1919. He was a member of the First




