CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS' WASHINGTON REPORT

**THE RETURN OF CARRY NATION**

Carry Nation will be remembered always as a leader of the "Prohibitionists." Her trade mark was a hatchet with which she and her lieutenants worked over saloons, including back bars, the front bars, the whiskey bottles, and many times some of the customers. It is not anticipated that a new prohibition movement as such will be mounted in this Country. However, another movement of equal proportions is fast shaping up. This is a movement of "anti-alcoholism." Many of the states have created commissions on "Alcoholism" in an attempt to stop its spread by education and treatment. The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce of the House of Representatives, of which I am a member, is now holding hearings on several bills which propose to set up a Federal commission for study and research into the problem of alcoholism including methods and facilities available for the care, custody, detention, treatment, employment and rehabilitation of alcoholics and for other purposes.

The testimony before the Committee has been most interesting. For instance, a number of large corporations maintain alcoholism programs in order to deal with the problem as it concerns its own personnel. Many of these business organi-

zations have made substantial contributions in helping to solve this nation-wide problem, through information and research as regards their own employees. It is generally believed that most alcoholics can be found on "Skid Row." Nothing could be farther than the truth. The information developed by some of these organizations has proven conclusively that this Nation now has more than 5 million alcoholics. Only about 3 percent of these, or 150,000 are to be found as delinquents on Skid Row. This leaves more than 4,850,000 suffering from this disease. People with whom you are probably in daily contact. Over 2 million of these people are job holders and can be found at all levels of every business. On an average, 1.5 to 5 percent of a company's employees are suffering from alcoholism. This is about 3 percent of the Nation's non-agricultural work force. One witness called the attention of the committee to the fact that the U. S. Government is the largest employer of all. This same witness, in answer to one of my questions, pointed out that the large companies are well justified in maintaining an alcoholism program for the rehabilitation of these employees. His justification was based upon the proposition that it costs a large company about \$3000 to replace one employee with another; hence when an employee has been with the company a

long time and has developed into a position of value, the cost of replacement could well be \$100,000. He also pointed out that alcoholism is not peculiar to people engaged in any particular type of work or calling, but runs clear across the spectrum from a stenographer who has just finished high school to a man who may have reached the presidency of a company. Many other interesting statistics are available on the subject and I think it would be well if all communities would try to obtain these for informational purposes.

The request for participation in this problem by the Federal Government brings up the basic proposition that the Federal Government is already meddling in entirely too many areas. The proposed bills would set up another Federal commission. We already have too many Federal commissions but I am sure that no one would object to another one if it would solve this tragic problem. The cost associated with such a commission would be sizeable. Whether or not this should come out of the general tax structure is debatable. It would be my feeling that if hard liquor, the basic cause of alcoholism, is to remain legal it would certainly be in order to impose an additional tax through which to finance any undertaking by the Federal Government in carrying on activities having to do with alcoholism.

The problem is a most serious one, becoming more widely spread each day because of the population explosion. I would be most happy to have the comments of any or all who have an opportunity to read this newsletter.

**ROGERS BLASTS PROPOSED SUGAR ACT EXTENSION**

Washington, D. C. (Spl)—Congressman Walter Rogers said Saturday the Sugar Act extension bill due to come before the House of Representatives this week "perpetuates a long-standing injustice against American farmers who raise sugar beets and sugar cane."

Congressman Rogers said the bill, which establishes quotas on sugar to be sold in the United States, "continues the present high level of foreign sugar imports while seriously restricting the right of American farmers to supply the American market."

Under the parliamentary rule by which the bill reaches the House floor for debate and decision, amendments to correct the situation will not be per-

mitted, Congressman Rogers noted. "Without the parliamentary protection they so carefully work to establish, the foreign sugar interests would be stripped of their quota protection. I believe the majority of House members favor granting much larger quotas to U. S. sugar producers—but again this year they will not be given the opportunity to correct his injustice," he said.

Congressman Rogers also objected to the five-year duration of the program proposed in the bill. "The excessive length of the program was deliberately designed to prevent domestic producers from having a chance at the U. S. marketplace until foreign interests had realized huge profits."

Only two amendments to the bill are to be deliberated. One would eliminate the sugar quota for any foreign country which employs a sugar lobbyist in Washington during the life of the program. The other would permit the Treasury to recapture about \$210 million a year of profit foreign producers will make because the U. S. domestic price is pegged above world sugar price levels.

Also expected to be considered by the House this week are final version of the Omnibus Farm Bill—the bill to be cleared by the conference committee charged with resolving differences in House and Senate-passed

versions — and the highway beautification bill.

Congressman Rogers' bill aimed at insuring an adequate railroad freight car supply will be one of the proposals to be considered in two days of hearings scheduled this week by the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which the Congressman is a ranking member.

"The purpose of my bill is to encourage a freight car supply adequate to meet national defense requirements and to alleviate emergencies such as sometimes develop in the Texas Panhandle - South Plains area at grain harvest time," the Congressman said.
