### O. R. STARK TO SPEAK AT STATE MEETING

O. R. Stark, Jr. will appear on the annual program of the Texas Agricultural Workers Association, which will meet in Corpus Christi on November 4th and 5th.

O. R. will speak in the section of the program "The Future of Rural Communities." The general teme of that section of the program is "change" and O. R. will speak on "Meeting the Changes In the Rural Communities.

Dr. Gerald W. Thomas, who is Dean of the Texas Tech School of Agriculture and Vice-President of the Texas Agricultural Workers Association, tendered the invitation to speak on the program and in his letter, Dr. Thomas said in part "many persons have been impressed by the attempt that Quitaque is making to build a rural community in the face of population changes in our state . . I sincerely hope that you can accept this assignment. I know that you are well qualified to make this presentation.'

Sales out of the fund to private investors under new provisions in the Act began October 11 w ith a \$1 million purchase by the Commerce Trust Company of Kansas City. The Act permits returns to investors of up to 5 percent; previously the ceiling was 41/2 percent. The interest paid by borrowers remains 5 percent. The notes are currently being offered at 4:75 percent with the lender agreeing to hold the note for five years.
