MICRONAIRE READINGS TO BE ADDITIONAL QUALITY FACTOR

Micronaire readings, commonly referred to as "mike", are an additional quality factor for 1965 - crop cotton under price-support loan, the U. S. Department has announced.

Louie Kitchens, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee of Briscoe County points out, however, that loans disbursed after October 31 on cotton classed prior to that date on which the classification cards do not show micronaire readings will be made without regard to micronaire.

Mike readings determine the fineness and maturity of the fiber. These qualities affect the spinnability and value of the

The micronaire premiums and discounts will be in addition to premiums and discounts for grade and staple announced earlier this year.

Quitaque's High School basketball teams won 5 of 6 games played the past three outings, the Pantherettes taking three wins and pushing their record to a fine 9 wins and 2 losses while the Panthers won two and lost 1.

Last Friday night the locals were hosts to the Paducah High teams and in the first game of the evening, the Pantherettes upset the Dragonettes 55-52. Sherry Stark led the scoring parade in this one with 17 points; Patricia Brunson was close behind with 16 and Jill Johnson notched 13; Carol Myers dropped in 4 points, and Barbara Chandler added 3 to round out the scoring.

The Panthers humbled the Dragons to the tune of 83-41 with Monte Stephens sparking the way with 28 points. Coach Gene King cleared the bench, giving every squad member a chance to see action.

Monday night Silverton invaded Quitaque for a couple of games and Quitaque won both of them.

The Pantherettes - Owlletes

game was a good one, the final score being 48-42.

Silverton led most of the first half and at the intermission were ahead 25-19. The Pantherettes pulled even at 30-30 and 32-32 in the third quarter but still trailed the visitors 32-36 at the end of the third stanza. The Pantherettes went ahead about midway of the final period and won going away.

Bobby Cochran bombed the baskets for 29 points in the first half and added one more point in the second half to lead the Panthers past the Owls by a score of 82-48.

Tuesday night the locals drove to Paducah for a return match with the Dragons and Dragonettes.

The Pantherettes defeated the Dragonettes 60-54 in a close, rough game that saw Patricia Brunson score 27 points to win scoring honors for that game. Jill Johnson hit for 18, Sherry Stark was next with 10 and Barbara Chandler made 5.

Lynette Taylor, Shirley Dowd and Barbara Reagan went the route at guard posts

and did goods jobs of holding three good forwards.

The boys game was a very loosely-called rough and tumble affair that was more farce than basketball. The Panthers were not playing well, none of them being able to hit the basket during the first half. Quitaque trailed by 10 points at half time, 21-31. Monte Stephens 18 points were high for the Panthers.

Next games will be on December 2, 3 and 4 when the teams play in the Kress tournament. The meet has a bit of an "if" to it however, for the school officials have notified all teams entered in the tournament that if Kress beats White Deer in a bi-district football game this week-end the tournament will either have to be cancelled or picked up by some other school.

If the tournament goes as scheduled the Pantherettes will play Olton Thursday morning at 11 o'clock.

The Panthers will play Olton at 12:30 Thursday in their first game of the tournament.

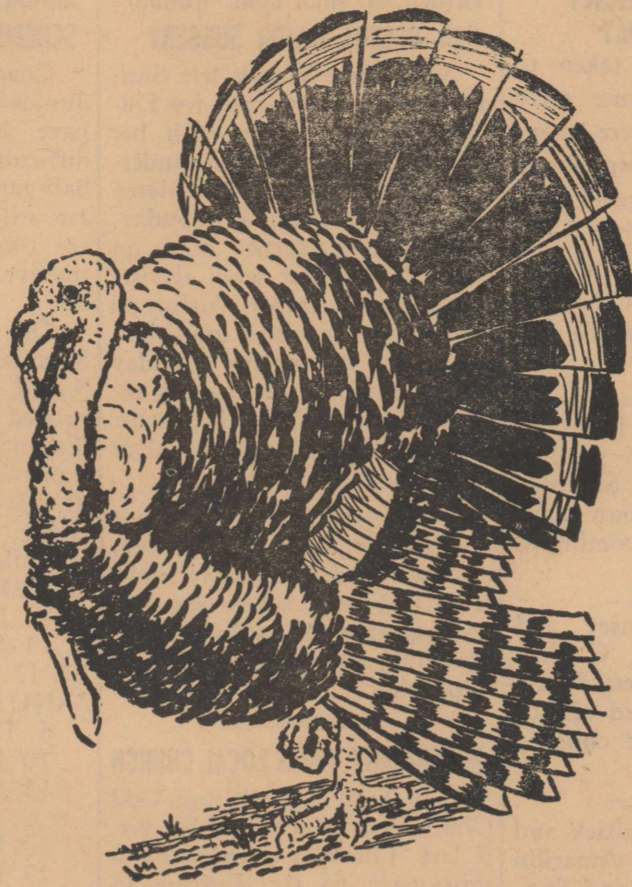

The children of Mr. and Mrs. Mark A. Martin of Hart will be hosts at open house celebrating the Golden Wedding anniversary of the couple on Sunday, December 5th. The Martins are former residents of Motley and Floyd counties. The vent will be held in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church at Hart from 2 to 5 p. m. HI-PLAINS HIGHLIGHTS

"Timing of wheat irrigation is of maximum importance in influencing the amount of take home money from wheat," says James Valliant, water engineer at the High Plains Research Foundation. "Irrigation properly applied and in balance with fertilizer is the key to profitable wheat production in the Texas High Plains. This would mean increased dollars returned per dollar invested bal-

anced with highest net return or practical efficiency."

Tascola wheat was planted on October 28, 1964, on land which grain sorghum had just been harvested. The wheat was irrigated to a stand after being planted dry. The most profitable yield was secured when irrigated at jointing, boot, head, and dough stages in 1965. This irrigation test produced 67.7 bushels per acre. The last, or dough stage, irrigation was added in 1965 due to the lack of rainfall from May 10 to June 1 at Halfway. This dough stage irrigation had not been necessary in previous years when adequate May rainfall had been received. The gross return from the four irrigations was \$91.40 per acre. The pumping cost at 75¢ per acre - foot only was deducted, giving the net return of \$73.02 per acre. Irrigation at the jointing, boot, and head stages produced 58.9 bushels per acre in 1965.

Wheat will normally use approximately 8½ inches of

moisture from November 1 to March 21. Planting on moisture from fall rains plus an irrigation after a stand is established or dry planting and irrigating to a stand appeared to provide adequate moisture for wheat. An extra February irrigation in 1965 was unprofitable as it reduced the yield to 48 bushels per acre.

Dean Howard, Assistant Agronomist, worked with Valliant in this wheat irrigation study.

Dr. Earl H. Collister, Director of the Foundation, said, "this research program on wheat irrigation was designed to find ways and means of more efficient farming for the High Plains of Texas."

Details of this experiment are found in Report No. 161 of the High Plains Research Foundation for 1965.

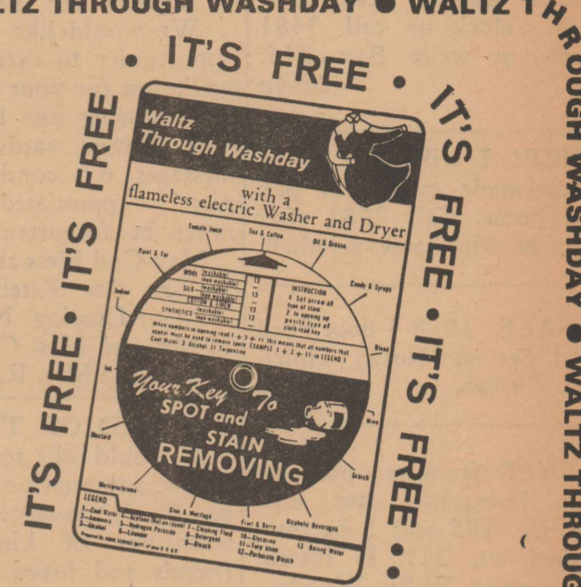

SUBTLE CHANGES HAVE OCCURRED IN THANKSGIVING MENU

College Station — Although the menu for today's Thanksgiving meal has come down through the years with remarkable likeness to the dishes served on that first Thanksgiving day, there have been many subtle changes.

Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Texas A & M University Extension consumer marketing specialist, points out that as Thanksgiving draws near, shoppers should be grateful that food is a bargain. Never before in history has food been so cheap in terms of the time one has to work to pay for it.

While many of the foods now served at Thanksgiving festivities are the same kinds that were in the holiday feast in earlier years, there are subtle differences.

Agriculture has made tremendous strides since the days of the Pilgrim. The cultural practices, varieties, the quality, the harvesting all have been updated, and transportation has improved along with the technological advances. Processing has had a tremendous effect on the food supply situation and modern food distribution.

The job of preparing the Thanksgiving dinner has been simplified and shortened for today's homemaker. There are

many varieties of food items to select from in developing the menu—and many of the foods can be purchased in prepared or partially prepared forms, Mrs. Clyatt emphasizes. Turkey prices are about the same as they were at this period last year. Fryers continue to be good buys in the poultry department.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 4 accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of October, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for three persons injured and an estimated property damage of

\$2,250.00.

The rural traffic summary for this county from January through October of 1965 shows a total of 22 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were no persons killed and 15 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$13,380.00.

November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. During the last two months of 1964 in Texas there were 80 pedestrians killed and 726 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. There are many reasons for this: longer hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of driver's and pedestrians concentration.
