TELEPHONE BILLS TO BE REDUCED **EFFECTVE JANUARY 1st**

All telephone bills will be reduced effective January 1, 1966, E. H. Danner, president of General Telephone of the Southwest and Southwestern State Telephone Companies, reminded telephone customers ter and children who live here. this week.

The Federal excise tax on local telephone service and long distance calls will be lowered from the present ten per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation approved by Congress and signed into law last

On each succeeding January 1 an additional 1 per cent cut will occur so that by 1969 the entire 10 percent Federal excise tax on telephone service will be

'We are pleased that the resulting savings will be received by our customers," the president commented.

Danner reminded customers that no excise tax revenues have ever gone to the telephone company. "The telephone company has merely collected the money for the United States government since the tax was put into effect as a 'temporory' measure during World War II, Danner stated.

'We are pleased to have contributed to the efforts to end this discriminatory tax and believe that the legislators who assisted are to be commended,' Danner commented.
