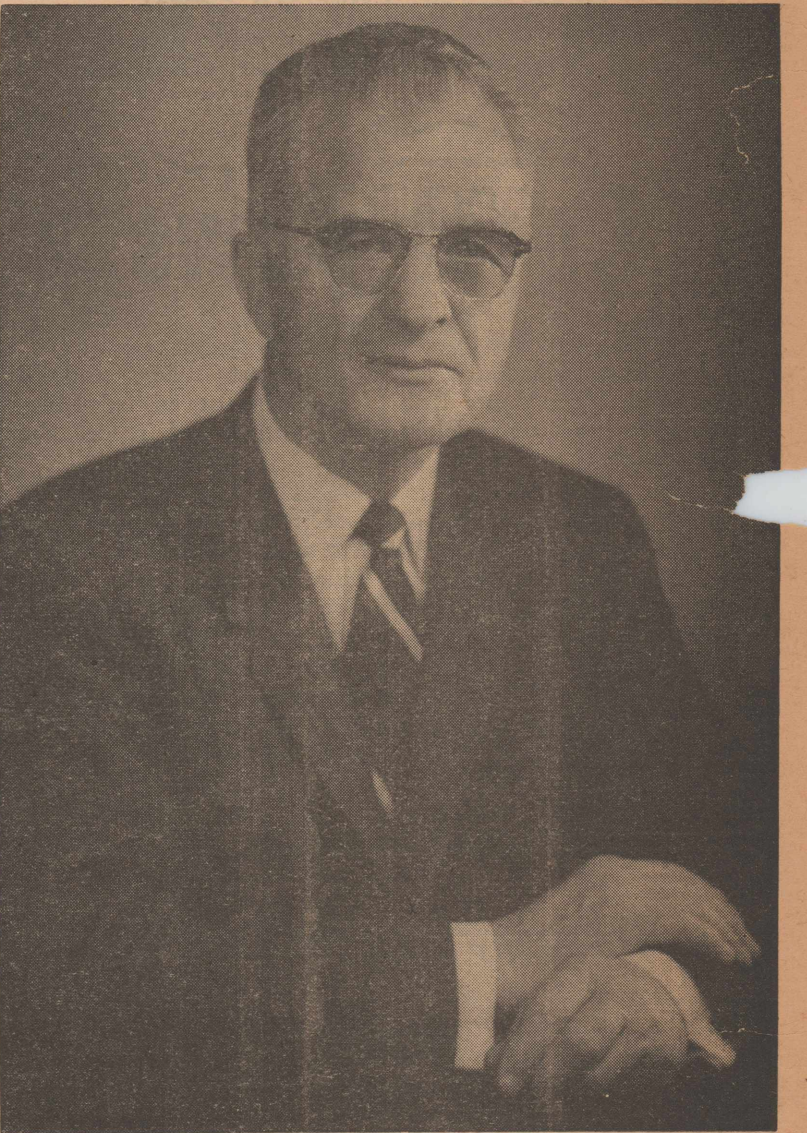

## BOYS RANCH FOUNDER TO SPEAK AT LIONS LADIES' NIGHT



Cal Farley

Cal Farley, often described as "The greatest boy's man in America," will be the guest speaker for the Quitaque Lions Club Ladies' Night program December 20 at the school cafeteria.

Mr. Farley founded the first Boys Ranch in America in 1939 at the site of the ghost town of Tascosa, 40 miles northwest of Amarillo. He is recognized by such figures as J. Edgar Hoover, who states that, "Farley is devoting his life to rescuing boys from the back alleys which lead to crime and starting them along the road to stable citizenship." In addition to his nationally recognized work in rehabilitating wayward youth, Cal Farley is also one of the best known speakers in the country. He has addressed countless organizations from coast to coast, and since the recent publication of articles about the Ranch in the Reader's Digest, Coronet magazine, and the Saturday Evening Post, he has been much in demand by civic clubs and service groups.

The end of World War I found Farley already a celebrity as a result of winning both the AEF and Inter - Allied Games championships in wrestling. On his return to the United States, he wrestled and played baseball professionally. In Amarillo he took over a tire shop that was about to go

## Panthers Take First Place, Girls Win Third At Silverton

Quitaque's Panthers rolled over Matador 68-50 in the finals of the Silverton Tournament last Saturday night to win the championship of that tourney, while the Pantherettes had to settle for third place after being derailed by the Estelline Cubettes Saturday morning in the semi-finals. The Pantherettes defeated Claude for the Third place trophy. The score in that one was 51-44.

Both teams opening-day opponents were Lockney and both teams won over the Lockney teams.

Second round opponents for Quitaque were the Kress High teams, both of them being tough and both of the teams having won their own tournament a week before. After the firing was over the Pantherettes had won by a single point, 46-45 and the Panthers had won 50-47 in an overtime contest and had played one of the better games of the season in doing so.

Saturday morning's semifinal round pitted the Quitaque teams against the teams from Estelline, who had been given byes into the semifinals.

The Pantherettes dreams of taking the district championship this year were severely jolted as the Cubettes won over the Pantherettes, 56-42. The win was a decisive one, for the Estelline crew outscored the Pantherettes every quarter in rolling up the 14 point margin. The Pantherettes also com-

mitted an awful lot of errors and just about every time they did, the Cubettes turned that error into two points. For all purposes, however, the Quitaque - Estelline game was the championship game in the girls division for Matador was no competition at all for Estelline in the finals. The Panthers took a 12-point win over the Claude girls for third place.

The Panthers played a peculiar ball game against the Estelline Cubs. The Quitaque team went ahead 14-8 at the end of the first period of play, then went cold and did not score another point until midway of the second quarter and scored only 6 points in the entire quarter. The Estelline team, meanwhile, kept plugging away and led 21-20 at half-time. During the intermission, Coach Gene King apparently had a couple of well-chosen words to say to his team for they came out firing and when the third quarter was over the Quitaque team had bombed the basket for 30 points, allowed the Bearcubs only 7 and led 50-28. From that point on it was only a question of how much and Coach King cleared the bench with the entire squad seeing action in that one. The final score in that one was 71-38.

The Panthers took a 68-50 win over the Matador Matadors in the championship game that was close the first quarter when the winners were leading

by only a 23-19 margin at the first stop. The Panthers won going away again, as Coach King once again used most of players on the squad.

Dale Ramsey sparked the winners in that game with 21 points. Dale hit 7 field goals and had a perfect night at the free throw lane, hitting 7 of 7 attempts. Larry Tipton was rugged under the baskets as he hauled down a lot of rebounds for the winners. The Panthers are looking pretty good again after going stale for several games. The Pantherettes played well for the most part in the tournament but will have to take up a lot of slack when district play gets under way after the holidays.

Barbara Reagan and Patricia Brunson were selected on the girls all-tournament team and Monte Stephens and Bobby Cochran were boys team all-tournament selections.

Next Tuesday night the high school teams go to McAdoo for a double header. The local teams won over both McAdoo teams here but as every fan knows, McAdoo is hard to beat at home and both teams should be prepared for an all-out effort in order to win.

Tuesday night's games will wind up basketball activity for the high school teams until after the holidays. Next games will be at Flomot on Tuesday night, January 4 and then that same week-end, the teams will play in the Claude tournament.

## TELEPHONE BILLS TO BE REDUCED EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1st

All telephone bills will be reduced effective January 1, 1966. E. H. Danner, president of General Telephone of the Southwest and Southwestern State Telephone Companies, reminded telephone customers this week.

The Federal excise tax on local telephone service and long distance calls will be lowered from the present ten per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation approved by Congress and signed into law last summer.

On each succeeding January 1 an additional 1 per cent cut will occur so that by 1969 the entire 10 percent Federal excise tax on telephone service will be ended.

"We are pleased that the resulting savings will be received by our customers," the president commented.

Danner reminded customers that no excise tax revenues have ever gone to the telephone company. "The telephone company has merely collected the money for the United States government since the tax was put into effect as a temporary measure during World War II," Danner stated.

"We are pleased to have contributed to the efforts to end this discriminatory tax and believe that the legislators who assisted are to be commended," Danner commented.

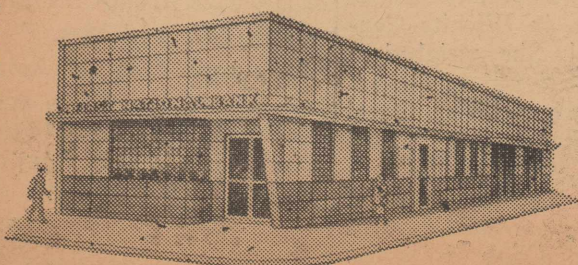

**RECEIVES APPOINTMENT TO AFRICA**

Rev. and Mrs. Roy G. Davidson, Jr., of Lorenzo, Tex., were appointed missionaries to Malawi, Africa, on Thursday, December 9, by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, meeting in Richmond, Va.

Mr. Davidson has been pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lorenzo, since October, 1964. Previously he

was pastor of First Baptist Church, Quitaque; Pinkerton Baptist Church, Rule; Morgan Mill (Tex.) Baptist Church; and Nolan (Tex.) Baptist Church and associate pastor of First Baptist Church Haskell. He also did music and educational work for churches in Big Lake, Sweetwater, and Roscoe.

He is a native of Memphis, Tennessee. Mrs. Davidson is the former Patsy Dodds, of Roscoe.

In Richmond for appointment and a week of orientation at Foreign Mission Board headquarters, Mr. Davidson said that he has wanted to be a missionary since he was nine years old. "My first memorable impression of a call to missions came at a Baptist boys' camp," he said. "One evening a missionary to Africa spoke at a lakeside. From that time, I have known God wants me to take part in His world mission enterprise. That conviction has become stronger through the years, but it was certain even then."

Mr. Davidson had a similar experience as a teen-ager, when a missionary visited her church.

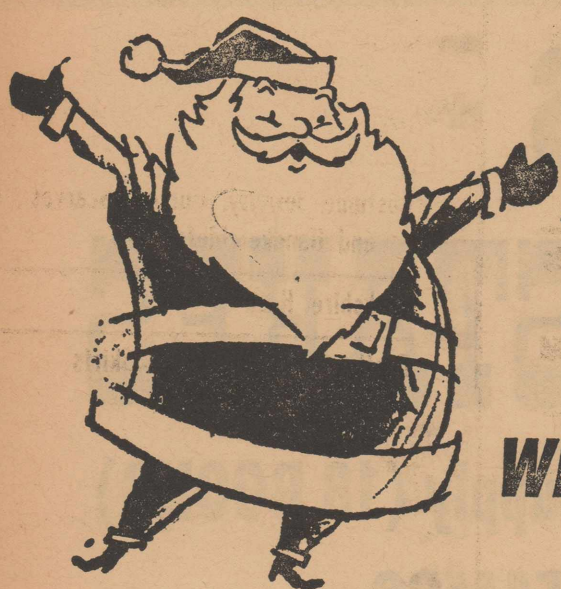

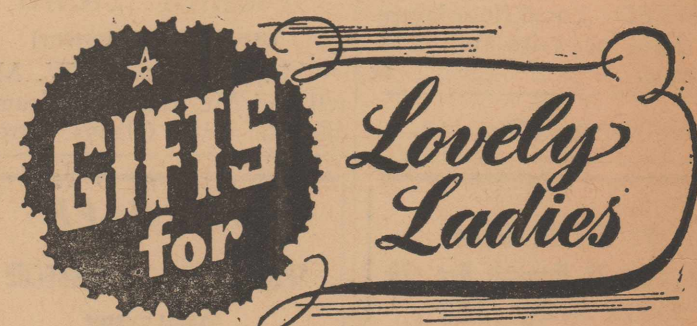
