





Seedsman Develops New Dwarf Marigold

Yellow Nugget Marigold

PHILADELPHIA, PA. A new kind of marigold called Yellow Nugget is the latest horticul-tural achievement of David Burpee, famous Philadelphia seedsman. It's the first and only dwarf, triploid species hybrid marigold, and is the best of all marigolds for beds, borders, pots, and window boxes.

For an ideal edging and border subject gardeners always wanted a dwarf marigold with large double flowers. Dwarf plants with small flowers are common-place. They wanted the plant to stay low and compact, yet to have the vigor to literally cover itself with bloom. If such a large-flowered dwarf were extremely early and everblooming, so much the better. These are the very qualities that have been combined in Yellow Nugget. Bright yellow, double flowers are 21/2 inches across, covering 12-inch mound-shaped plants that begin blooming in 35 days from

seed and remain prolific even when moved inside to avoid frost in the fall. Burpee's Yellow Nugget is a

cross between two species, a giant American marigold (Tagetes erecta) and a dwarf French marigold (Tagetes patula). Because the chromosomes of the two parents are out of balance it cannot go to seed. It tries, but instead just blooms and blooms and blooms. While this may be frustrating to the plant it will be a delight to every gardener. Yellow Nugget Marigold is being introduced in 1966 on the front cover of the Burpee Seed Catalog.




