PRINCIPAL'S REPORT


Schools

Attendance for the first half of the school year has been good. The ninth grades' first semester percentage of attendance is 99.61, while the Tenth grade has the low average with 96.77. The Eleventh Grade has bit of work and ingenuity, we a daily average attendance of 98.73, and the Senior Class average is 99.23. These figures do not give the complete story, however. One student is responsible for the major part of the Tenth grade's low percentage. That can't be helped, for it is an ill-health situation.

In the Senior Class, of the original students enrolled, there has been one-half a day's absence, which gives the seven students a percentage of attendance of 99.92. Six of the seven have perfect attendance for the first semester. A girl from downstate that was enrolled for 241/2 days was responsible for the other absences.


