In the 1966 feed grain program, producers who divert at least 20 percent of their base feed grain acreage will receive price support payments of 53¢ per hundred weight. For instance, on 100 acres, a data: farmer can divert the minimum of 20 acres, plant 30 acres to soybeans and 50 acres of feed. He can divert 30 acres, plant 35 acres to soybeans and 35 acres to feed. He can divert 50 acres and plant 50 acres to soybeans or divert 20 acres and plant 80 acres of soybeans.

The major soybean varieties planted in the area are LEE, HILL, and HINN. The new short - season PATTERSON soybean, just released by the High Plains Research Foundation, will be especially attractive to those who produce certified seed. The HINN, released last year is also in demand by some certified seed growers. The higher price received for all certified soybean seed is sure to increase planting of Foundation seed under the new program.

#### STOCKING DATA AIDS BASS FANS

stocking private waters are redelivery to authorized places in species of fish. the spring.

The deadline for catfish and other fish is August 1, with ielivery in the fall.

The Department advised prospective recipients:

"Bass will not be delivered to ponds previously stocked unpopulation removed. Channel as a major factor in the food this species does not normally reproduce in small lakes. Re commendations for stocking by Texas Parks and Wildlife De-

honored.

Here is additional advisory

"A properly stocked farm tank fish pond or small lake will provide fishing over a number of years. There is no need to restock with fish every year. Such a practice is not only wasteful of hatchery reared fish but results in an overcrowded condition and stunted, small fish. Overstocked waters produce poor quality fish just as overstocked land produces poor quality cattle.

"Small lakes and ponds should be stocked with a balanced ratio of forage fish and predators. The predators reared in State hatcheries are largemouth black bass and channel catfish. The best forage fish produced in our hatcheries is the redear sunfish. This species also provides a good panfish in many parts of the State.

"In newly built or newly renovated waters, largemouth black bass, stocked at the rate of 200 fry or 100 fingerlings per surface acres, do extremely well and should produce a fish-

Prior to its discovery in nature, synephrine was made in the laboratory and medically prescribed as a stimulant and decongestant for the relief of colds. Since 1927, it has been recommended for children and adults in minimum doses of 100 milligrams. An equivalent amount is contained in only 8 to 12 ounces of tangerine juice. the resarchers explain.

Although citrus fruits have long been recommended for warding off colds, there is the new possibility that eating tangerines can give relief from sniffles after you catch a cold.
