Constructed of limestone slabs and adobe, the structures housed as many as 60 to 100 families. Archaeologists say the pueblos are a blend of the types of structures used by the Indians of the Great Plains and those of the arid Southwest. It is believed that about 1400 A. D., possibly because of a change in the climate, the pueblos were abandoned. But nomadic Indians continued to use the flint quarries until approximately 100 years ago when they began to acquire manufactured tools and weap-


