> The application blanks are beng made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 4.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare lives depend in the future.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and onehalf million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,-000 post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

costs \$3 per month and provides doctor bill and other beneffits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.
