A low cost method of inseason control of the boll weevil will be explained by an Exten-In working up the mailing sion Service entomologist in a meeting at 7:30 p. m. March 30 in the Bank Community

> Grosdidier. Entomologist Don Rummel, of Lubbock, will discuss an inseason control system in which a few timely applications are used to keep weevil populations at low levels throughout the

Grosdidier said Rummel and other entomologists across the nation developed the new inseason control recommendations from data gathered in the diapause control program and in other research.

The diapause control program has greatly reduced the number of overwintering weevils, and Rummel believes several timely sprayings in early summer can prevent weevil

Rummel will also suggest the Mrs Jack Cheatham and use of a uniform cotton plantport on the success and significance of the 1965 diapause control program.

Grosdidier said this meeting is highly important to local cotton producers. He urges everyone interested in the weevil problem to attend this session.
